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
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Crawford's Corner

If the worst should happen ... The Insurance Partnership

Public Liability insurance is considered essential, especially in light of today's compensation culture. Cover is provided in the event of a claim made against a choir for property damage and/or injury by a third party.

Although your risk may be low, claims can occur and the cover is worth having for legal defence costs alone.

If you use churches and external concert venues be aware that various authorities are looking to protect their property and the public by imposing substantial insurance limits. You may be obliged to have protection up to £10M. This may seem excessive but

in the event of a major incident, say an electrical fault from your equipment leading to a fire then the damage to property, and possible injury claims with legal fees, can lead to a substantial exposure.

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
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The Glasgow Phoenix Choir Scotland West

Continuing the Choir's Diamond Jubilee celebrations the Gala Concert in the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall on Saturday 17th September was packed out - the audience responding to the massed choirs and orchestra with great enthusiasm. The Choir's new organ (more about that later) nearly lifted the roof off the Concert Hall and will be of great benefit to the Phoenix in future concerts. A busy September finished with the Choir's second tour to Ullapool and the Isle of Lewis where concerts were given Ullapool Church of Scotland, An Lantair Centre in Stornoway and Martin's Memorial Church. The Choir later took part in the evening service at the church.

October was an equally busy month for the Phoenix with concerts in East Kilbride Parish Church, Orchard Park Church, Giffnock for the Order of St John, Queens Cross Church, Aberdeen in aid of church funds and St Andrew's Church Arbroath in aid of the Memorial Garden at RM Condor – the home of 45 Commando Royal Marines.

November saw concerts in Peebles Parish Church staged by Peebles Rotary Club, St Bridget's Church, Baillieston and Cadder Freestone Masonic Lodge in Bishopbriggs in a St Andrew's Night concert.

In December the Choir will be giving a charity concert in Freemasons' Hall, Edinburgh and finishing the month with Christmas concerts in the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall and Moncrieff Parish Church, East Kilbride.

As if all this were not enough the Phoenix still managed to fit in several recording sessions for the Choir's 35th album released later in the year.

Former stalwart of the alto section – Vivian Angus who sadly passed away earlier in the year, made a sizeable bequest to the Choir allowing us to purchase a new piano and the organ mentioned before. On both were placed memorial plagues. The beguest also assisted with concert tours and concerts for which the members were very grateful. The new organ is an especially invaluable addition to our equipment which, though portable, has two manuals and bass pedals allowing Accompanist and Deputy Conductor - Cameron Murdoch to show off his talents. Thanks to the bequest and the sponsorship from The Co-operative Funeralcare the Phoenix now has a very fine rehearsal piano, a touring piano and organ, portable staging, podium, and music stands together with a van supplied by our sponsors to ferry the equipment around the UK.

The NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CHOIRS (NAC) was formed in 1920 by a dozen North of England choirs. At present there are over 550 member choirs operating in all areas of Great Britain. This represents a singing membership of over 26000. The Association is a registered charity with the objective -

"Joining the Nation in Choral Music"

To achieve this, the Association provides services to its members to assist in the enjoyment, general running and development of choirs. It organises events at national and regional levels, including an Annual General Meeting & Conference held each Spring in various centres in the UK, including a Gala Concert by the local group. All members are encouraged to attend to take advantage of the opportunity to meet their voluntary national Officers, network with member choirs and to attend seminars covering all aspects of interest to choirs. These range from singing workshops through presentations on charity status to advice on copyright and performing rights issues.

At a regional level the Association is divided into geographical groups that meet on a regular basis to organise workshops, courses, concerts, etc and actively encourage inter-choir and area links. Officers consult with representatives of choirs and Groups at least four times a year at Open Forum Meetings. This enables valuable feedback to the Officers and promotes healthy discussion on the development of further benefits to choirs.

Other services provided include a regular news magazine, a music advisory service, a music purchase discount scheme, a very competitive optional insurance scheme, Health & Safety advice, legal advice and a music loan scheme – all accessible via the website.

Farm from the Earl of Burlington (later the Duke of Devonshire). After a disappointing start and the expenditure of £25,000 he purchased and leased other mines in the area, which he worked successfully. The House then became a hotel in 1892 where Lieutenant A D Macleod became proprietor. His tenure was marked by his colleagues by the presentation of a rifle which is now proudly displayed on the Lounge wall, adjacent to the Drawing room. Between 1910 and 1911 drastic alterations were made, when an entire storey was added between the existing first and second floors. The wing, which now includes the Moonwater Restaurant on the ground floor, was added and the then existing tower was removed stone by stone and reconstructed above the new storey. Since transferring from a private house to a commercial hotel the house has seen many owners and was even part of the hostile take-over by the TrustHouse Forte plc group before finally ending up in the ownership of the Corus Group.



Headlining this year's National Conference is none other than the internationally renowned David Lawrence who is one of the UK's most versatile conductors, working with orchestras, symphony choruses and national

youth choirs. He was recently nominated for a Gramophone Award for his conducting, and currently holds the Guinness World Record for conducting the UK's largest choir - 6,846 singers!

David's work has taken him all over the world. His positive and engaging manner makes him a popular guest conductor, and he is an experienced and respected trainer of choral conductors. He teaches regularly alongside Ghislaine Morgan in Portugal, and for the company Artsworks, delivers management training and team building through the media of singing and conducting. With particular experience in the field of contemporary music, David has prepared and conducted première performances by Per Nørgård, Pierre

Boulez, Iannis Xenakis, Mauricio Kagel, Graham Fitkin, James Wood, Bob Chilcott and others. As a guest chorusmaster of the Netherlands Radio Choir he has worked with conductors such as Kenneth Montgomery, Frans Brüggen, and John Adams. Working closely with Stockhausen David also conducted this exceptional choir in the German première of Scene II from his opera Sontag aus Licht. David has worked with the London Philharmonic Choir, the Hallé Choir, and the CBSO Chorus for whom he is the Associate Conductor, as well as the national youth choirs of Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales.

David has adjudicated at international choral festivals as well as for the BBC Choir of the Year and Young Musician of the Year competitions. He conducts for BBC Television's 'Songs of Praise' and directed 'The People's Chorus' for BBC Four.

As Principal Conductor of Young Voices, David directs massed choirs in an annual series of concerts with some choirs incorporating more than 8,000 singers. He continues to work with Sinfonia Viva as their Choral Advisor, a project leader and conductor, and has also directed large scale education projects with the Orchestra of Welsh National Opera, the English Symphony Orchestra, the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra. 2011 David will conduct Beethoven's Ninth Symphony with the Barrier Reef Orchestra as part of a six week visit to Queensland and in 2012 will be the principal speaker, workshop leader and seminar presenter for the National Association of Choirs National Conference.



Liz Garnett studied music at the Universities of Bristol (BA Hons, 1st class) and Southampton (PhD, 1995). She then taught at Colchester Institute's School of Music and

Performance Arts for four years, before moving to Birmingham Conservatoire where she was Head of Postgraduate Studies until 2009. Her teaching experience

is varied in subject area, delivery style and level, from lectures in Musical Philosophies to practical workshops on Playing by Ear and one-to-one tutorials in Professional Development for Musicians.

As a student, she studied piano with Christopher Northam (gaining an LRAM in piano teaching) and singing with Glynn Davenport, Duncan Robertson and Molly Petrie. She started conducting as an undergraduate, attending the Choral Conducting course at the Canford Summer School of Music at age 19, then went on to conduct the Southampton University Light Opera Society as a postgraduate.

She became involved in barbershop music after the completion of her PhD, and it became the subject of her first book. She is one of the UK's most prominent arrangers and performance coaches, having coached and/or arranged for many of the UK's top choruses and quartets, and arranged for groups from the UK, Ireland, the USA, Canada, Germany and Holland. She certified as a Music Category judge in 2000, and served as LABBS Music Category Director from 2006-2009. She has adjudicated in both barbershop and 'mainstream' choral classes at the Llangollen International Eisteddfod and the Sligo International Choral Festival, and is the founder-director of a female closeharmony choir called Magenta.

After the completion of the barbershop book, her research and practical interests focused back on conducting, leading to a five-year project that produced her second major book 'Choral Conducting and the Construction of Meaning'. The research process involved visits to more than 40 choirs in rehearsal, and these observations provided not only material for the book, but also a deep understanding of the conductor-choir dynamic in a wide variety of contexts and styles. This experience continues to nourish her work as a choral clinician, giving rich and varied insights into the problems that conductors and choirs face, and the relative success of different approaches to solving them.

A full and packed Conference awaits consisting of Trade Stands (especially chosen for the expertise and understanding of the Choral World) offering products and services required to help and assist all choirs as well workshops and seminars covering a whole host of subjects and themes.

Hadley & District Orpheus Male Choir Midlands North

2011 began with a daunting prospect for this Shropshire-based choir as its committee met to arrange its 110th anniversary year programme but aware that, like many other choirs, its numbers were diminishing.



In past years, recruitment had been via the familiar church or chapel choirs, but with church congregations and music in decline that source was gradually diminishing.

But the Hadley committee then hit on a bold idea, an idea which was to cost a large sum and, admits choir chairman Albert Higgins, one which was something of a gamble.

Spurred by the success enjoyed by Gareth Malone on the BBC2 TV programmes The Choir, the Hadley choir decided to organise a musical workshop and billed it as a chance for would-be singers to try out their vocal chords.

Publicity was arranged in local newspapers and radio stations and a choir member with the right connections arranged for the delivery of attractive specially-designed leaflets to every home in the choir's catchment area of east Shropshire.

Saturday 5 March dawned like any other day, but not for musical director, Robyn Davies, who took the bold decision to persuade all existing members to attend for a full day session with music which would be entirely new for both newcomers and existing members.

Every member was told to bring packs of sandwiches and snacks, both for themselves and the would-be member... but how many would turn up? That would be the surprise.

Hadley's Castle Farm Community Centre, the choir's rehearsal venue, was opened and within a few minutes, it became apparent to all that the day would be a success, with no fewer than 12 newcomers swelling the choir to near on 45 voices.

Pieces from Les Miserables were rehearsed; led by Robyn Davies and accompanied by 32 year-old French-born Nykko-Mickael Gregoire... the rehearsal room reverberated with that 'wall of sound' which had made the choir a firm local favourite for the past 110 years.

After all, it was the Welsh who had inspired the choir's formation in 1901 after a party of out-of-work miners from Penrryn had sung for their supper in a tour of the district and led four members of the audience to form a mini choir.

Their enthusiasm, led by conductor, Harry Jones, soon led to a boost in numbers, notably from a local car works and ironworks, and in an era before TV and film entertained the masses, the Hadley choir was soon engaged for concerts and 'smokers' (smoking concerts).

They were further encouraged when the ironworks boss, Colonel James Patchett, became the choir's first president and gave financial support and a status which they might not have otherwise achieved.

Conductor, Harry Jones, stayed for several years before handing over the baton to Raymond Lewis, an iconic figure who led to choir amazing success at the 1923 Welsh National Eisteddfod at Mold, swiftly followed in 1925 by a similar victory at the same event held at Pwlheli.

After the Hadley choir again won at the Welsh Eisteddfod in 1933 at Wrexham, the Eisteddfod organisers changed the rules, ensuring that in future, entry was restricted to Welsh choirs. It was a coincidence, of course!

Recruitment has been the keynote of the choir's programme during this anniversary year, with schools liaising in staging joint concerts with the Hadley choir in a bid for a renaissance of the joy of singing, now much depleted in many junior schools.

Obviously, longevity is a factor of the Hadley choir. Bass, Peter Cooile, has been with the choir for 53 years; James Mansell easily tops 40 years of service but the 'gamble' to organise a musical workshop had changed the choir's membership from being almost all pensioners to an average age of around 50.

But what of the 12 new 'recruits' who gathered for that musical workshop experiment in March? All have stayed and will be as proud as the older members when the 110th anniversary concert is staged in Wellington on Saturday 8 October.

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Leadgate Gleemen Male Voice ChoirNorth East

The Leadgate Gleemen is a male voice choir based in Consett in North West Durham. 2011 is a special year for the Gleemen as we celebrate our 70th Anniversary.

In the autumn of 1941 the choir, originally called the Leadgate Male Voice Choir, was formed by George Griffiths in response to an invitation to present a concert in aid of a

wartime charity, the Leadgate Comfort Fund. The original sixteen members were drawn mainly from the choirs of the two Methodist churches in the village. Following a successful concert it was decided that the choir should continue but under the new name of the Leadgate Gleemen.

It was not long before the choir was reaching a wider audience. In January 1943 the choir appeared

with Wilfred Pickles on BBC radio. Further radio performances followed and in 1966 the choir appeared on Tyne Tees Television with Owen Brannigan. In 2008 members of the choir, along with other choristers from the area, performed with Graeme Danby in a programme for Tyne Tees Television celebrating the centenary of Owen Brannigan's birth.

The choir has always attempted to maintain high standards in performance and this has been reflected in its many successes in musical festivals.

The Gleemen have been fortunate to have had talented musical directors. George Griffiths was followed by John Walton who was succeeded by Alan Marshall. In 1964 Bill Williams took over the baton and served for seventeen years. Our present Musical Director, Pat Boustead, has been with the choir for thirty years.

The Gleemen continue to support charities. From the wartime charities of the 1940s to the present we have followed the example of our founding fathers in supporting worthy causes including the Sir Bobby Robson Foundation, the Great North Air Ambulance Service and Macmillan Cancer Support.

Since 1948 the highpoint of our choir year has been our celebrity concert. To celebrate our 70th Anniversary the choir presented a combined 70th Anniversary and 64th Annual Celebrity Concert on Saturday 9 April 2011 in the Empire Theatre, Consett with guest artistes Rachel Orr (soprano) and Robert

Seaton (bass-baritone) accompanied by Ruth Armishaw. A most enjoyable evening was had by all who attended.

Walsall Harmonic Male Voice Choir

Midlands West

Walsall Harmonic Society was founded in 1897 '... for gentlemen to cultivate a taste in music'.

For many years, the Walsall Harmonic Society met at the old Chuckery Mutual Sports & Social Club, in Walsall's Beacon Street. Sadly, the Harmonic Society disbanded in 2009.

A men's choir had been formed from that Society's membership in 1970, since when it has continued to perform in a range of musical styles. The Choir met at the Chuckery Working Men's Club in Lincoln Road, where good facilities were available for rehearsals and performances; it was located just around the corner from Beacon Street. Unfortunately, the Working Men's Club also struggled to survive and closed in April 2011, and a new home was needed for the Choir. Luckily, the Beacon Street club has been renovated and renamed 'The Chuckery Club'. The Choir has therefore decided to relocate to The Chuckery Club, in order that they can continue to develop their musical skills in comfort (and, incidentally, with a pint in hand). So, from May they returned to the newly-refurbished club in Beacon Street.

The Choir will offer some free concerts at the Club each year, as a way of thanking the management there for the hospitality, and a good rapport has already been established with the club's 'regulars'. A significant advantage to the move is that now the rehearsals and performances will all be on the ground floor – some of the Choir members and guests struggle to negotiate stairs. There is also plenty of local, dedicated parking available to the members and any guests that they may invite.

'The Choir has had a long association with the Chuckery area of Walsall,' Chairman Paul Smith said. 'Whilst we were sad to leave the rehearsal space that we grew very fond of over time, we are glad to have found

somewhere so close. We hope to be able to continue to provide music in Walsall for many years to come.

'Any men who can hold a tune are invited to join the Choir – we will find out where they will fit best into our line-up and encourage them to learn the music we sing. We meet at 8.00pm every Monday evening and will be thrilled to welcome you.'

A number of 'new' members have recently joined the Choir, partly as a result of the sad closure of two other men's choirs in the area. The Choir is still a relatively small one, led by one of the original members, Bryan Jeffreys, who returned as Musical Director in 2005. He is helping them to develop a good sense of harmonic singing — that's where we came in!

As a result of choir closures, a number of surplus copies (originals) are available. A list can be obtained from the secretary, Bob Share.

The choir's next appearance will be in September, at the premises of Chamberlin and Hill, a local engineering firm abutting Beacon Street, as part of the National Heritage Open Day. Shortly following that, they will be performing with youth members of Birmingham Conservatoire, in a special concert in the Methodist Central Hall, Walsall. Before then, in August, they spend a weekend in the city of Durham, where they appeared as guests of a local music group.

Radcliffe Ladies Choir Midlands East

Radcliffe Ladies Choir is celebrating twenty years of friendship through singing!

It was an impromptu sing-song following a Radcliffe Male Voice Choir concert in May 1991 that sparked the idea of starting a ladies choir in Radcliffe. Following it, Vivienne Havery approached Pauline Howarth (wife of Richard, the then conductor of the Male Voice Choir) who agreed to lead the choir if enough people were willing and consequently a small group of 14 ladies met for the first time on 11 September 1991. Twenty years on and the choir continues to meet each Wednesday at 7.30 in St Mary's Church Hall in the village and regularly performs in and around the East Midlands region. Our most recent engagements have included the NAC East Midlands Group Concert in May and our highly successful 20th Anniversary Summer Concert in June.

In addition to our regular concerts and social events, each September I lead a Vocal Workshop in Radcliffe which is open to the public. This is an excellent opportunity for non-members to come and explore what we get up to in rehearsals and test-drive the choir but also allows me to develop the choirs singing technique — an ongoing component of our warm ups.

The choir library has varied over the years from classics such as 'Waltz of my Heart' and 'It's a Grand Night for Singing' through to medleys from shows like Les Misérables and The Sound of Music. Since starting as Musical Director in May 2010 I have tried to explore wider stretches of the repertoire, introducing part-songs by Edward Elgar and some more 'popular music' items, such as Tina Turner's 'Proud Mary'. As a composer myself, I like to champion music by contemporary composers and as such have introduced pieces by Karl Jenkins and Eric Whitacre. In the upcoming months we will also be learning my setting of 'Irish Blessing', commissioned by the Ripley Music Festival, and I will begin composing a new piece especially for the choir in 2012. A musical director is lost without an accompanist and I feel blessed to be working with Judy Holborow, a fine pianist with an inspiring personality, who adds a certain je ne sais quoi to our rehearsals.

Like many choirs, Radcliffe Ladies Choir isn't just about the music. Our motto, 'Friendship through Singing' couldn't be more appropriate and the feeling of community has been one that I've constantly experienced since I started. We have regular social events (not including our post-rehearsal beverage each Wednesday) and are currently planning a choir tour to Wales in May 2012.

The upcoming months are building to be very exciting indeed for the choir. We will shortly be launching a particularly special 2012 calendar which we are preparing to raise money for charity. Our online presence is also growing to include a YouTube channel which we are developing (www.youtube.com/radcliffeladieschoir). Despite the busy programme of major concerts we still found time to support other local events and provided the music at another splendid wedding in Inkberrow Church.


