know what YOU have been doing, and what YOU have planned for the future. Can I also point out Crawford's plea for feedback on the new cover for the magazine, and any ideas you may have for a possible new name for News & Views. I will forego my usual roam round the items in the magazine this time, as there are a few things I want to bring to your attention:

Does your choir have adequate insurance? The issue of public liability is one which can lead choirs into deep problems in all innocence. Did you know that if you arrange (for instance) a social event where the choir members are present, you are covered by your choir insurance even if you are not singing? Speak to our Insurance Provider, TIP, if you are in any doubt.

If your choir is a Registered Charity, you need to be aware that the Charity Commission has brought the Charity Act 2006 and its various amendments into a new statute, the Charity Act 2011. As this drastically amends what is defined as Public Benefit, it would be wise if your Trustees made themselves aware of the statute.

If you work with children or vulnerable adults, you should know that from 10 September 2012 there are new definitions of regulated activity. Some of these changes are quite far-reaching.

I am pleased to say that the NAC has set up communications with the Schools Music Association, with a view to working much more closely together in the future. As you will realise, average ages of our choir members are by and large increasing year on year, and we have to do something to encourage younger singers to join us. We are looking to encourage closer working between school choirs and local adult choirs, so that young people come to realise the natural progression of their singing, rather than leaving school and dropping choral singing until later in life when they eventually return to it. My thought now is that it might be an idea to look at the name, News & Views. Is it a bit last century? Could we come up with a better, more modern title? I discussed it with the Officers and have been given permission to explore this further. I decided to hold off on this until after issue 200. I may ask you to come up with a new name. I may even make a competition out of it, with a valuable prize.

What do you think?

World Choral Festival of Adults & Seniors

Mon 3 to Wed 5 Dec 2012

Venue: Vienna

9 – 11 October 2011, the Second World Choral Festival of Adults and Seniors was once again successfully held in Vienna. The cultural diversity of the Choirs, the abundance of songs, and the traditional costumes, which were presented on stage, enchanted the Viennese audience. The Choirs performed in well known Viennese institutions, such as the Austria Center, St. Peter's Church, Steinhof and in the famous Golden Hall of the Vienna Musikverein. Since its premiere in 2010, the Festival is under the patronage of Dr. Michael Häupl, the Mayor of Vienna.

The Festival is a platform for intercultural exchange between choir members of advanced age. As a new concept of musical exchange, the Festival aims to give a new path. For the participants of the Festival, the City of Vienna turns into a giant stage first time. The World Capital of Music let the choir members not only feel its charm from a perspective of audience, but give them the chance to turn the whole City into their own stage.

Besides the slogan 'Music is our life', community and new friendships form the most important part of the Festival. Under the artistic instruction of Prof Walter Zeh, who was a member of the board of directors of the Vienna State Opera for many years, the choirs have jointly rehearsed carefully selected songs and performed on stage.

The Festival is supported by the Austrian Choir Association, the Organization for Promoting the Austrian-Chinese Relations, CCTV (Chinese National Television), Eurovision, the Confucius Institute at the University of Vienna, Uniart Media (ICT Management GmbH) etc.

Donaghadee Male Voice Choir Northern Ireland

Based in the picturesque seaside resort of Donaghadee in County Down, Northern Ireland, the Donaghadee Male Voice Choir celebrates its 80th Anniversary this year.



In the early 1920s Donaghadee had a thriving Choral Society which gave numerous performances locally. The Society disbanded towards the end of the decade but a few of the men continued to give recitals at church services. They sang at the 1931 Harvest Service in Shore Street Presbyterian Church, Donaghadee, when the then organist Jim Savage suggested that this group should seek more members and form a male voice choir. In 1932 thirty potential members were identified and the Donaghadee Male Voice Choir was duly formed with Jim Savage as conductor.

Finding a place to practise caused problems for the choir and, during the pre-war years, they used a number of different rooms in the town including a school classroom, a hotel, a local manse, an army cadet hut, and even a room above a café. The availability of a piano at practice was a luxury. It was not until 1982 that the choir had a permanent home in a disused telephone exchange in the town. From the beginning, Jim Savage believed that the discipline necessary to succeed in competition was an important factor in improving the choir's performance and the choir duly entered local musical festivals up to the outbreak of war and achieved encouraging success in gaining several second places.

In the early forties, with membership now much reduced by the demands of war, the choir struggled for survival. Practices were held whenever possible. Jim Savage had taken up another appointment and several temporary conductors were in post during this time, including the wife of the local Methodist Minister. An American Army unit was stationed in the town, and for a while numbers at practice were augmented by the presence of a few interested US Marines.

In November 1948 Val Smiley agreed to take over the duties of conductor and once again the choir undertook many church engagements while preparing for Festival competition. In 1950 the choir gained 1^{st} place at the local Holywood Music Festival and a prize of £5. The strength and popularity of male voice singing at this time is reflected in the entry of 10 male voice choirs from Northern Ireland competing at festivals.

Val Smiley emigrated to Canada in 1951, and up to 1968 he was succeeded as conductor by Norman Gamble, Walter Wood, Ernie Brown and then Cecil Thompson.

In 1968 the committee appointed Robert Wilson as their new Musical Director. At his first practice there were 18 members present. Robert immediately instilled a new enthusiasm in choir members and within 6 weeks the number had grown to 38. Today there are almost 80 members in Donaghadee Male Voice Choir, making it easily the biggest male voice choir in the island of Ireland.

One of Robert's first tasks was to maintain and improve the choir's success at music festivals and within six months of his appointment he guided the choir to success in the 1969 Belfast Music Festival. This was the start of the choir's illustrious period of accomplishments as they went on to win an amazing total of 40 first places over the 1970-2006 period at festivals in Morecambe, Whitby, Cheltenham, Chester, Wharfedale, Cork and New Ross in addition to the local festivals of Belfast, Carrickfergus, Portadown, Bangor, Portstewart and Coleraine. It should be remembered that this success came about as a result of the dedication and commitment of the members and the Musical Director during 'the troubles', the most unsettled time in Northern Ireland's history. That the choir continued to expand in both success and numbers over this period is a remarkable achievement.

One of Robert's goals for the choir during this period was to compete in Festivals in mainland UK. The choir won the Morecambe Festival in 1970; the Eskdale Festival of Song at Whitby in 1972 and again in 1973; Wharfedale Musical Festival in 1978; the Cheltenham Gold Cup in 1980 and again in 1990; and the Chester Choral Festival in 1996.

Participation in The National Male Voice Choir Championships in Huddersfield in 1992 and 1993 was a learning experience for the choir where the adjudicators were placed in a 'box' and unable to either see or identify each performing choir. Another ambition was realised when the choir's application to enter the International Eisteddfod at Llangollen was accepted in 1991. The choir returned to compete in Llangollen in 1997 and 1999.

In May 2009 the choir took part in the

Cornwall International Male Voice Choral Festival where there was a magnificently organised competition and series of concerts for participating choirs. This was followed by a return to Eskdale In April 2010 for the Festival of Song competition.

Another of Robert's goals was to undertake a concert tour further afield. In 1987 the choir traveled to Georgia and South Carolina for a two week tour of twenty eight public performances. They were proclaimed Honorary Citizens of Georgia by the State Governor in recognition of outstanding achievement in the music field, and were also presented with the Ceremonial Key to the City of Columbia, the State Capital of Carolina, by the City's Mayor. The choir returned to Georgia in 1989, 1995 and again in 2005. In addition to these USA tours the choir visited Ontario, Canada in 1998 and 2000 for extensive concert tours.

In between these festivals and USA/Canada tours the choir competed in several overseas Music Festivals. In 1981 the choir took part in the XIV International Choral Festival in Varna, Bulgaria; the Malta International Choir Festival in 1992 and 2002; the Athens International Choir and Lyric Soloist Festival in 2007; and the Lake Garda Music Festival in 2010. More recently the choir has returned from the Krakow International Choir Festival in June 2012.

In 2008 the choir visited New York and had the privilege of performing in Carnegie Hall, New York and singing in St Patrick's Cathedral.



Robert is now commencing his 45th year as Musical Director. His dedication is undiminished, his vision for the future of the choir is without equal and he remains THE inspirational driving force, striving for the excellence which continues to take the choir to greater heights and further horizons. In 2008 Robert was awarded the MBE for services to music.

Over the years Donaghadee Male Voice Choir has established strong links with choirs from Yorkshire. The Retford Male Voice Choir, and their conductor the late

Michael Bullars, came to the North Down Music Festival in 1978. The 'Dee Choir reciprocated in 1979 with a visit to Retford and so began a series of exchange visits over the subsequent years. During these Yorkshire visits contact was established with South Yorkshire choirs, including Thurnscoe Harmonic Male Voice Choir who, as a result, came to N Ireland in 1991 for a short concert tour. A strong friendship has since been established between Donaghadee and Barnburgh Village Singers, formed and conducted by Michael Bullars' widow, Julia. The two choirs currently undertake very successful exchange concert tours on a biannual basis.

Ivan Black, a very versatile and accomplished musician in his own right, has been the choir's accompanist for the last 20 years. Ivan made his first public appearance at the age of 5, made his professional debut at the age of 11, and has been working as a freelance multi-instrumentalist, composer, conductor and adjudicator ever since.

The breadth of his performing experience is considerable. He has played the clarinet with the Northern Ireland Light Orchestra; the saxophone with the Humphrey Lyttleton Jazz Band, the piano with the Ulster Orchestra (most recently in Friday Night is Music Night) and features in many recordings of all kinds of music, including Jazz, Country and Western, Gospel and has three solo albums to his credit. He is also a featured saxophonist in the chart-topping 'Jive Bunny' album.

Much of his composing is for the BBC and includes writing signature tunes and background music for programmes. His 'Irish Rhapsody' for accordion orchestra has been published by Hohner. If you go to the Ulster Folk Museum, visit the cinema there where you will hear specially commissioned piano music in the period style to accompany the Charlie Chaplin Films.

Ivan is widely experienced as an examiner and adjudicator. He was a chief examiner for CSE music in Northern Ireland, and examined both O and A level music for that board. He is the only British adjudicator ever to officiate at the Coupe Mondiale and he has regularly adjudicated at the National Accordion Orchestra (NAO) championships and at vocal and instrumental classes at festivals throughout Britain. He has recently examined final year degree students for the Royal Irish Academy in Dublin.

Donaghadee Male Voice Choir has come a long way and travelled a long way and achieved many honours since its early days in Shore Street Presbyterian Church and this could not have come about without devoted service and leadership, and it could not have continued through the darkest days of Northern Ireland's recent history without men of vision, determination and personality within the organization. Not only has the choir sought the highest standards in music over the past 80 years, it has also maintained a close rapport with the people of its home town, and today Donaghadee and Northern Ireland is justly proud of its famous choir.

This is summed up in a message from Lady Sylvia Hermon MP, President of Donaghadee Male Voice Choir:

'Throughout the past 80 years, there has been no greater ambassador for Donaghadee and Northern Ireland than the town's internationally renowned Male Voice Choir. It is truly hard to believe Donaghadee Male Voice Choir had its origins 80 years ago and I have no doubt its founders, if alive today, would be immensely proud of the magnificent choral tradition it has maintained throughout its illustrious history.

As Member of Parliament for North Down, I am immensely proud of the Donaghadee Male Voice Choir and wish its members my heartiest congratulations upon achieving this remarkable milestone in its distinguished history.'

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Letter from NAC in Oz

The days are getting longer, the sun is getting warmer, the birds are nest

building – it must be Spring. It's a welcome relief after what seems to have been a cold miserable winter. Everything is relative, of course, and our winters are nothing like those experienced in the UK and the rest of Europe. However to us they seem cold! The weather over the winter has led to bumper grow of vegetation in the bush and a bad fire season is being predicted. Indeed as I write this I can see a plume of smoke from a bushfire. This is very early in the year but is probably what they call a controlled burn to clear the under-storey of inflammable material. Unfortunately all controlled burns are not controlled. A sudden wind change can prove disastrous.

However enough about the weather! The Sydney Male Choir is almost at the end of a full programme of events. Since my last epistle we have performed in eight concerts and in addition have had several recording sessions with a view to issuing a new CD in time for our Annual City of Sydney concert at the end of September. In addition the choir was invited to sing at the War Memorial in our capital city, Canberra, to mark the 70 anniversary of the sinking of the HMAS Canberra in the Battle of Savo Island in August 1942. Serving on the ship and lost during the sinking was the son of Horace Keats and he wrote several pieces of music to commemorate this. The pieces have recently been arranged for male voices by Brennan Keats and with words by Herbert Brandon form a suite of four songs. See picture of the choir at the War Memorial. The choir also sang this suite of songs at the Portrait Gallery of Australia in Canberra.



We are working hard to hone our performance for the Annual City of Sydney concert where we will be showcasing many of the items we will sing on our visit to France and England next year, our centenary year. This involves some songs in French and we are lucky to have a

French speaking choir member to help us change those Aussie vowels to as close an approximation to French as we can get!

New Mill Male Voice Choir Yorkshire West

The choir is 21 years old in November and we have written a book in celebration. Here is some background on purpose and content and information on how you can buy it.

New Mill Male Voice Choir has a tradition of writing, so the 21st Birthday seemed the ideal opportunity to review this writing in some sort of choir history. We were not tempted to write a formal date-to-date account, rather, we chose a series of moments that illustrate choir development. Whilst the approach may seem to lurch from rehearsal to concert to tour, it nevertheless reflects the real life of a choir; a background of relative peace interspersed from time to time with short sharp bursts of action.

The book, entitled 'Let All Men Sing', contains pieces on the following themes:

There are as many reasons for joining a choir as there are members. An affinity with music is a good start. Some singers enjoy a weekly two hours away from day-



to-day pressure in the company of men who sing. Others thrive on the company and the camaraderie that spills over into social activities like cycling, crown-green bowling, clay-pigeon shooting and trips to the brewery.

Whatever their starting ability and confidence, most singers improve and want to keep improving, striving for their personal best. These private meanings find their ultimate expression during rehearsal weekends away in Llandudno or Scarborough. Our professionals also have their thoughts and feelings.

The short sharp bursts of action are the concerts where we entertain in public. Some are free, but many are not and attracting a paying audience can focus the mind. Receipts may go to local projects, charities or fund-raising for other choirs and musical ensembles. Our programme peaks at the Huddersfield Town Hall when we share the stage with a high profile guest (Willard White, Aled Jones, Morriston Male Orpheus Choir, Julian Lloyd-Webber, Alison Balsom). Singers, conductor and pianist are all on their musical mettle and the choir and supporters alike work hard to ensure a commercial success.

Touring (Italy, Catalonia, Czech Republic, Poland) combines the best of the personal and the public, and we and our supporters also get to go on holiday.

We were not a competition choir until 2009 when we became South Yorkshire Champions at the Don Valley Festival held at the Elsecar Heritage Centre, near Barnsley. We repeated the success in 2010 and came second in 2011. Performing with others helps to measure development, but being judged by a professional adjudicator is something else.

The next 21 years is a crystal ball moment, combining the current trends in music, choral singing and male voice choirs with a best guess as to where New Mill might next develop.

OBITUARY – Philip Ashworth (10 October 1932-25 April 2012)



It will be recalled that Phil Ashworth – then Chairman of the Hull Male Voice Choir – wrote an article 'O Ye of Little Faith' in the Summer 2012 Edition of *News and Views* recalling some of the financial aspects of promoting a one-off prestigious, and potentially expensive concert *Sounds of Celebration* that took place in October 2011 to celebrate the Centenary of Hull Male Voice Choir, and the concert became an outstanding success.

Around the time of the concert, Phil had complained of feeling 'off-colour' and not fit enough to sing with the Mass Male Voice Choir at the concert, but few of us realised just how serious Phil's 'off colour' feeling was to become that prevented him from singing in the choir on that memorable occasion. Despite all this, Phil carried out his Front of House administration role, and in particular to welcome the many VIPs with his usual military precision to which we had all become accustomed.

After participating in subsequent concerts, including one in February 2012 when he sang two solo items, and attending a NAC Steering Group Meeting, Phil was taken ill and shortly afterwards to our great shock he announced that his end was nigh as he had been diagnosed with a cancer that had attacked his vital organs and it was very unlikely that he would come out of hospital. With further military precision, Phil summoned Choir Secretary Reuben Hird to his bedside, being told to take pen and paper. Little did Reuben know that he was to be asked to take note of the funeral arrangements required by Phil which were bravely outlined.

Very sadly, on 25 April 2012, Phil passed away, having been a Choir Chairman of outstanding commitment. He had influenced greatly the support for my idea to stage the *Sounds of Celebration* concert to celebrate the centenary of the choir - this against much pessimism and concern that its failure could bankrupt the choir. But they need not have worried because as outlined in Phil's article, after the essential precision planning, a very substantial sum of money was raised for charity and Hull City Hall was filled to capacity for the concert which was a rare occurrence, even for concerts promoted by professional artists, we were told!

On 30 April 2012 the Hull Male Voice Choir fulfilled the wishes of its late Chairman and attended Phil's funeral to sing his requested item *Gwahoddiad* and to lead the singing of the three hymns carefully chosen by Phil for his Service of Thanksgiving and Celebration for his life. One can only think that Phil bravely fought his cancer over those final days with the great comfort of the immortal words that are contained within *Gwahoddiad:* 'I hear thy welcome voice, that calls me Lord to thee!'

Phil must rank amongst the top chairman of Hull Male Voice Choir for his great enthusiasm, persuasion, experience and commitment to the choir: he had worked very hard indeed with great conscientiousness at all times to promote the aims and expansion of the choir and was greatly admired by all. He will be greatly missed for many years to come as he most certainly made his mark. Included in the party were four widows of former choir members, who had previously visited Rotenburg in 2007. The visit was organised and supported under the auspices of the Gedling/Rotenburg twinning arrangement.



Thursday, our first full day in Rotenburg, began with an invitation to an Ascension Day service in Stiftskirche, a beautiful red sandstone church in Rotenburg. The service formed part of the church festival, which included a barbecue and a variety of musical entertainment. Originally, Bestwood MVC was invited to sing inside the church after the service, but the sun shone so brightly and the large audience were so settled outside the church, that the choir quickly re-arranged plans and sang outside. Jakobi Church, in Rotenburg market square, was the venue for the choir's last official performance. The climax to the visit was the Sunday evening Farewell Party, held in the newly built 'Burgerzentrum' in Rotenburg. Over 150 English visitors and German friends enjoyed an extremely emotional time of more food, drink, fellowship and singing, interspersed with goodwill speeches and votes of thanks. New friendships were made, old friendships strengthened and a true sense of a warm, sincere bond was experienced by all.

Add to this, optional excursions to the GDR-Border Museum, Merkers Salt Mine, a Mediaeval Banquet, a relaxed evening in Hollerbach's Beergarden (complete with large screen to view the Chelsea victory), Rotenburg Town Festival and it all added up to a truly magnificent and memorable visit.





The choir comprises in excess of forty members. They perform at the request of locally based charities to help them raise funds. These charities have included RNLI, Children's Hospice - South West, Save the Children, Age Concern, and the League of Friends for Paignton Hospital.

Over the past three years alone they have help raise over £10,000 for these and similar good causes by performing at thirty concerts in the South Devon area.

Our current accompanist with over 30 years' experience of working with choirs is retiring in the autumn and we are seeking a suitable replacement.

This person will need to be accomplished at the piano and have the ability to read music, but no formal qualification is necessary. The country has been fired up by the Olympics and the Paralympics over the last few weeks. It seems that our members have also been caught up in the fun and games. Here are three articles about our members who have been getting involved.

Elmbridge Choir Thames South

Choir's Charity Single aids Paralympians

A large local community choir is lending its substantial voice to a national charity, 'Get Kids Going!' in its bid to fund and build a sports academy to support the UK's budding future Paralympic champions.



Surrey's Elmbridge Choir has recorded and released a charity single featuring the fabulous soul singer and X-Factor runner up, Andy Abraham and Yorkshire singer Katy Haymer. Taking inspiration from the values of the Paralympic Games, 'Light the Flame' was written by local author Judith Kelly and arranged by Elmbridge Choir's Musical Director, Cliff van Tonder. To help reach the charity's fundraising target of £200,000 and to raise awareness of 'Get Kids Going!', Paralympic champions from Beijing and competitors for London 2012 have thrown their support behind the single which is available for download from I-Tunes and Amazon.

David Weir MBE, Dame Tanni Grey-Thompson, Mickey Bushell, Danielle Brown and the entire wheelchair rugby team are just some of the Paralympic athletes backing the charity in its aim of building a sports academy. The charity, whose President is Lord Sebastian Coe, has already helped many young people become Paralympic athletes but is now looking to help the next generation realise their dreams as part of the 'Inspire a Generation' legacy of the Games.

15-year-old Jack Binstead who was born with brittle bone disease and has suffered over sixty fractures in his short life, is one of the youngsters who has already received help and support from 'Get Kids Going!'. Thanks to the wheelchair donated by the charity he is aiming to compete in the 2016 Paralympic Games in Brazil. 'It's going to be a lot of hard work, but no pain, no gain', says Jack.

David Weir, MBE, Vice-President of 'Get Kids Going!', World Number One Paralympian, six-times winner of the London Marathon, and 2012 winner of the New York Marathon says that 'Get Kids Going!' has been a massive help and support to him over the years. 'Without the equipment supplied by the charity I wouldn't be where I am today, competing in London 2012. 'Get Kids Going!' has had a major impact on Paralympic sport. Buying the single of 'Light the Flame' will help towards setting up the David Weir Racing Academy.'

'The aim is to build a sports academy to reach and help more kids who want to develop sports skills,' explains Jane Emmerson, CEO of 'Get Kids Going!' 'Without our funding and support these kids would struggle to realise their potential and to maximise their opportunities within sport. We are hoping that sales of the 'Light the Flame' single will go some way in helping us achieve our goals.'

By courtesy of Kingston Borough's Cultural Olympiad programme, the single was recorded at the Hook Studios in Cheam. The track features delightful solos from Sam Wilson aged 13 and Olivia Wilson aged 11, both of whom are children of one of the choir members.

'Our choir is extremely proud to be supporting the vital work of 'Get Kids Going!", says Cliff. 'As a music charity ourselves, we aim to enable and provide access to music for all, and so the values and aims of this amazing sporting charity are truly in alignment - or should I say harmony! - with ours. It's all about giving opportunities.'

My Moment to Shine - Olympic Torch Relay 2012

Tuesday 26 June was the day the Olympic Torch was coming to Grimsby, and I was one of the honoured and lucky people to carry it through the town. Everyone had a 'collection point' where we had to meet - mine being the Oasis Academy at Immingham. My time to carry the torch was 5.57 (very precise, as was the whole operation!) from Dabuney Street to Blundell Avenue. This was the culmination of eight months anticipation and excitement. My final instructions and special suit had been received the previous week and I duly arrived in Immingham at 2.30 as requested.

We were met by LOCOG staff and a representative from our special sponsor company, in my case this was Samsung, and were immediately put at ease and made to feel welcome. There were 16 other torch bearers on my coach, and at 4.00 exactly, began the journey through Immingham, dropping each person off at their allotted spot. Immingham was crowded, and the atmosphere on the coach was friendly, excited and expectant. The journey to Grimsby along the A180 was memorable, with the Metropolitan Police motorbike outriders patrolling the cavalcade all the way. I was second to last to get off our coach, so was able to get a real feel of the occasion, and when I arrived at my drop-off point, all my family of children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews and greatnieces and -nephews and friends were there to cheer and take photographs.

There was about ten minutes before the torch would actually reach me so there was plenty of time. The crowds were unbelievable, and everyone wanted to be seen with 'The Torch'. Our chaperones, the grey-clad people who ran alongside all the torch bearers, made sure we were certain of what to do, and kept the crowds at bay. These people were mostly, again, metropolitan policemen and policewomen, specially trained to do the job. When the flame finally arrived, one of these helpers who had a key, turned the gas on, and 'the Kiss' took place. This is

when one torch is lit from another. That moment was even more emotional, and big cheers went up. After a slight hesitation, to savour the moment and hold the torch aloft, I began my 300 metres of steady jog (we had been asked to do this if possible, as apparently it had been found that the crowd responded better to a jog than a walk). With waves and cheering all the way, and tears in mine and many others eyes, I proceeded to cover my allotted distance, to hand the flame over to a seventeenyear old young lady from Lincoln. It was almost an anticlimax, as my flame was speedily extinguished, and I was ushered on to the following 'sweep up' coach. Then everyone was taken back to Immingham, where we waited to have the gas canisters taken out of the torches (for safety) before we took them home. Samsung kindly allowed us to keep our torches, and the suits we wore were also ours to keep. To end the day on a high note, I drove back to Grimsby to my daughter's house, where all the family were waiting with a bottle of champagne on ice - what more could you want? What a thrilling and exciting day one to stay in the memory for ever. But the torch has gone on to greater things. I have visited schools, where it lead the children of Scartho School out in procession at the start of their Olympic Week, the Hospice, the Linkage Centre, Westward Ho Barracks, Brownies, Rainbows and even the Lifeboat Station at Cleethorpes. Many people have asked if I was putting it on E-bay, (tongue in cheek I think) which I wouldn't dream of doing, but I have raised some money for the Breast Unit at Grimsby Hospital, as many people have asked to have a photo taken with the torch, and have been quite happy to give a donation for the privilege. Certainly a day to remember!

On Tour with `Merry England'

In Accord - Singing for Pleasure - was formed two years ago by a small group of experienced and enthusiastic singers. We now have 30 members in our mixed voice choir and over 80 patrons. Each spring our patrons are invited to a free informal concert, followed by afternoon tea. These have proved to be a huge success, with approximately 70 attending - an ideal way of saying 'thank you' for their loyalty as well as giving the choir members a chance to become acquainted with those who support our efforts.

We decided to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee by giving a 'Last Night of the Proms' type of concert, choosing Hits from the Shows, inviting the audience to participate in the traditional flag waving while singing our national songs, and to perform an abridged concert version of Merry England by Edward German and Basil Hood. This operetta is rarely heard today, but it evokes the drama and pageantry of the reign of the first Queen Elizabeth. It was an ambitious and challenging project, which involved a steep learning curve for a number of our members, who had little or no experience of singing to this level. We invited two guest singers, friends of the choir, to take the roles of Sir Walter Raleigh and the Earl of Essex, the female principal parts were sung by some of our very capable members. During our Charity Concert we presented a cheque for £500 to Marie Curie Cancer Care, bringing our donations to local charities to £1,500 in less than two years.

Word spread of our ambitious programme and we were invited to take our 'show' on the road - first to a church in Monkseaton, who were raising money to fund their roof repair - they raised £700, on the evening, and then to another church in the area, who were raising money for their annual project - Haiti Earthquake Survivors Appeal – this performance raised over £600.

Our initial aim was to bring music to the



people, while 'singing for pleasure' and to raise funds for local events and charities. So far we have given 10 fund raising concerts for local events and performed three charity concerts in addition to the above. In two years I feel we have done much to promote the pleasure of music through singing.

This year our Christmas Charity Concert will be supported by the local Reunion Brass Ensemble, and we anticipate giving a further donation to a local charity Pathways4All, which is a local group working to provide accommodation for children with learning and physical disabilities.

Saddleworth Male Voice Choir North West Group

The choir has performed in concerts and music festivals throughout the UK and overseas for more than 57 years. The choir's repertoire is typically male voice with songs about *Drunken Sailors* and *Comrades in Arms* with a little Palestrina thrown in for good measure, but those of you who are not familiar with the Saddleworth area will not be aware that at 7.00 on Saturday 22 December 2012 the choir will present its 50th consecutive annual performance of Handel's popular oratorio *Messiah*.



The picture shows the chorus and orchestra during their traditional warm up with Christians Awake prior to the soloists taking the platform. For 50 years, 32 members of the male voice choir augmented by a ladies chorus of 48 sopranos and altos recruited from local church choirs and musical societies have overcome every conceivable type of winter weather to assemble at the Civic Hall in the Saddleworth moorland village of Uppermill.

At the beginning of November the ensemble will commence rehearsals under the direction of Damian J Cunningham the choir's MD, and accompanied by the Pennine Orchestra and with four soloists from the Royal Northern College of Music their performance will herald the start of Christmas in Saddleworth.

Saddleworth's Messiah was first performed under the baton of Denis Jones, the choir's founding MD with the intention of bringing first class soloists to Saddleworth. The four years from 1966 to 1969 saw a young Thomas Allen (now Sir Thomas) perform and in 1970 Valerie Masterson CBE graced us with her presence. Other soloists include Barbara Siddelley, Marjorie Thomas, Barbara Robotham, Joy Roberts, Roger Stalman, Michael George and Thomas Round and there are many others too numerous to mention.

Following the performance, the hall is transformed into a giant Christmas party when the whole ensemble and audience enjoy supper and join together to sing Christmas carols.

To celebrate the achievement of 50 years of *Messiah* the choir will hold a dinner in the Civic Hall in February 2013.

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
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

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

Many of our contributors love to show their prowess by sending in wonderful finished articles with coloured headlines, five different fonts and many <u>underlinings</u>, *italics* and **bold** bits. Then, of course, I have to spend time taking them all out before I can set their article up the way you will see it in the magazine. KEEP IT SIMPLE!

House Style

- Use Calibri 10pt to write your article. (If you don't have this, don't worry I can soon change it.
- Set your paragraphs to single space with no spacing before or after paragraphs.
- Start with the name of your choir.
- What NAC group is your choir in?
- Write your article.
- Say who has written it.
- Quotes use single speech marks (same key as @ but without the shift).

- Dates do not include st nd rd or th
- Abbreviations do not have full stops.
- Song title are shown in italics.
- Do not put photos in the text.
- Unless the word 'choir' is part of a title it should NOT have a capital letter.

Send me pictures as high res .jpegs of between 1 and 5Mb.

Attach them to an email.
