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

The concert was to celebrate the choir's 21st Anniversary and the 60th Anniversary of Her Majesty The Queen. They were joined by the Korbinian-Aigner Gymnasium Choir from Bavaria who they had visited recently.

I was invited to attend as a guest of the choir founder, June Keyte, and her husband and associate director Christopher. Both Pam and I enjoyed the very entertaining concert which was of an extremely high standard, with all five choirs of the Children's International Voices taking part, with an age range of 4 to 24+. We will never forget the contribution of the children's younger voices who were aged 4 to 6; they not only sang with great confidence and

enthusiasm, but sat quietly through the rest of the concert (over 2 hours) in their little chairs at the front of the audience applauding every act.

The quality and variety of items in the concert made it very entertaining and June should be congratulated for what she has created and achieved with this youth choir.



We all appreciate the importance of youth for the future of choirs and choral music; the Children's International Voices of Enfield are an example of the wealth of talent in the youth of today that can be nurtured and developed to a very high standard. Unfortunately not all children

get the opportunity or encouragement to develop their talents. On behalf of the Department of Education, the Arts Council is investing in a network of music hubs across England. One of the aims of music hubs is to develop a regional singing strategy to ensure that every pupil sings regularly and that choirs and other vocal ensembles are available in the area. 123 music hubs have been created, their primary activity being to liaise with all music oriented organisations in an area to actively encourage an integration of activities to support the development of children's involvement in music.

The NAC is actively working with some music hubs to support and help them; individual NAC choirs should approach their local hub and see how they can help.

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Music and Festivals

2014 will bring many opportunities for choirs to explore repertoire that is linked to ceremonial events, anniversaries of major world events and remembrance, so this edition's music features on that area.

Amazing Day - an Oratorio by John Brunning

John Brunning of Classic f m fame has a life as a composer which predates his radio life by many a year and has sent me a sample score and recording of this 32 minute Oratorio for Soprano, Baritone, Choir and Piano, although a version is also available for Orchestra.

The text of this 7 movement work stretches from the opening title, Amazing Day, To a closing Hallelujah by way of The Lord's Prayer, a Pie Jesu, an Introit Kyrie and Sanctus, Ave Maria and The Lord Is My Shepherd. For that reason some choirs may find that dipping into the score and presenting single movements, (may be interspersed with poetry) may provide a more effective and flowing performance. That said the music has a definite charm about it and is by no means difficult. It is tonal and melodic and poses few problems to a choir of moderate abilities.

Of the movements, The *Pie Jesu* is very effective with a restrained beauty, the opening of the *Ave Maria* exudes a simple delight but the opening sentence is interspersed by Gloria in Excelcis so that makes this piece difficult to stand alone, both these movements are in a style not dissimilar to Rutter though the rest of the piece probably is more romantic and film score inspired.

The *Introit* and *Kyrie* outstay their welcome for me, and the setting of *The Lord Is My Shepherd* whilst having a rather nice tune and some effective modulations is cast much in the same slowish mould which makes one long for something rhythmic and exciting.

The last movement, *Hallelujah* again demonstrates the composer's gift for writing a melody and along with the *Pie Jesu* this probably makes the best one to stand alone.

Having said all this, It's worth a look and with careful attention to dynamic and speeds a complete performance would certainly be an achievable and satisfying event.

And finally... I am resisting the temptation to plug any music of my own, but I am offering two pieces from the above series, which I edit and publish, for your consideration. The pieces in this series range from unison to SAB and SSA and are designed to provide new repertoire within the framework or moderately easy piano parts and well written voice parts for the smaller choir, though of course they can be used by any number of voices

Falling neatly in to the category of Remembrance is the powerful; moving yet extremely simple 'for the fallen' by Peter Thompson, this Unison piece was used in a workshop at a NAC Midlands South West group singing day and received universal acclaim! – You can hear it on Youtube and it is available through all good music shops and also www.musicroom.com.

Also in the same series comes 2 Festival Glorias for 2 part choirs (upper and lower voices) by the Lichfield based composer David Barton, ideal for a concert opening (and it has one by me thrown in for good measure).

Late News

As I was writing this a Press release arrived from Novello announcing the arrival of a New Carol Book combining children and adult voices, but with the ability to also use them separately, this seems like a very good idea to me. The book is called Carols For Everyone and is backed up by Making

Music. I haven't yet seen a copy but it will be worth a look.

While this year is a largely celebratory one it is also tinged with some sadness as our wonderful accompanist, Eleanor Gair, is retiring after the '100 Years of Music' concert. We have been honoured and privileged to have been accompanied by Eleanor since 1998 and we will sorely miss her sensitive and talented presence at the piano. We wish her well for the future and I'm sure that we will continue to see her from time to time — Peter Gair, her husband is our current President.

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Cannock Chase Orpheus Male Choir Midlands West

It's been six years since our last entry in NEWS & VIEWS and quite a lot has happened in the intervening period.

Three years ago, in October 2009, the choir carried out a major recruitment campaign. Numbers had dwindled to such an extent that, what was at its peak a 70 strong group, could rarely muster more than 30 choristers for a concert performance.

Over 100,000 leaflets were distributed around the local neighbourhood. The campaign was specifically targeted to attract 40 new members and as a consequence the choir's numbers virtually doubled. Then commenced a concentrated period of twice weekly rehearsals, every Wednesday and Friday, with established members supporting and helping to guide the new recruits through their apprenticeship.

It was almost nine months before the combined choir was considered to be integrated to the extent that performances met required standards, such are the demands of the choir's Musical Director, Alan Jones. Many new members were amazed at the thoroughness of the musical team and how long it took to properly learn the four part harmonies. Then there was the discipline and professionalism expected at concert performances. The choir's reputation was at stake.

During that time, the existing choir carried on performing at concerts without the support of their new colleagues.

So, where are we now? Well, since then, the choir (we no longer refer to ourselves as the old or the new choir or to choristers as old or new members) has staged over a dozen concerts each year, usually with support from established guest artistes, commencing with the opening performance of the Brewood Music Festival, Staffordshire in the summer of 2010. The integration is complete.

The choir has a reputation for enhancing special occasions and were honoured to have been invited to sing at the memorial service of world famous organist Carlo Curley who sadly passed away on 11 August at the age of 59. The service took place at Pershore Abbey on Friday 26 October 2012.

Although some longer serving members can get a little frustrated at the time it takes to perfect songs which they have



known for many years, nothing makes the concert repertoire until Alan Jones and his Deputy Conductor, Frank Morris, are totally satisfied. However, along with the professionalism of the rehearsal techniques, there is still time to have a laugh and make new friends. Group social outings are arranged on a regular basis.

At the beginning of 2013, in our quest for continuous improvement, a feedback survey of the choristers was carried out with a view to improving the choir's performance and the enjoyment of the members. Opinions on issues such as song choice, quality of performance, choice of venue, general discipline and professionalism were sought together with other suggestions for improvement. An action plan was produced to address the issues throughout the year.

One of the key actions arising from this was to offer all members the opportunity of a voice test with our Musical Director, Alan Jones to provide feedback on general competence, areas for development and to re-assess vocal range and type. Most of the members have taken full advantage of this and found it to be very constructive.

In addition, our Stage Manager, Dave Owen is well connected with two very distinguished singers having sung with them in his youth and he arranged for them to attend our rehearsals and give us the benefit of their voice coaching experience.

As a result, the choir has recently enjoyed sessions with two of this country's finest Opera Singers: soprano Yvonne Howard and tenor Barry Banks.

Both were originally from Staffordshire and were members of the Staffordshire County Youth Choir in the 1970s. Barry and Yvonne have gone on to a career singing in the world's best Opera Houses and other prestigious venues and concert halls.

Yvonne did our first session and it was a great night. She performs regularly with all of the major UK opera companies. Her critically acclaimed performances include Siglinde in 'Die Walklure' with Sir Mark Elder and the Halle, Leonore in 'Fidelio' and Mother in 'Hansel and Gretel' for the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden. She was nominated for 'Best Actress' award for her role as 'Marylin Klinghoffer' in Penny Woolcock's film 'The Death of Klinghoffer'.



Yvonne had no problem holding the attention of over 50 men! She gave us great tips on breathing and diction, the effects were immediate. Yvonne sang *Weeping Mary* for us at the end of our rehearsal. It was just beautiful.

We were very lucky indeed to have a session from Barry Banks. Barry lives in New York and has been principal Tenor at the New York Metropolitan Opera for more than 15 seasons. His very busy schedule takes him all over the world. We managed to grab him on a Friday night before he sang the Tenor part in Verdi's 'Requiem' at Lichfield Cathedral on the Saturday. He flew to San Francisco on Sunday for a Beethoven concert conducted by Michael Tilson Thomas.

Barry gave us great advice on singing through the vowel, breath control and demonstrated the techniques fantastically well. Barry is a wonderful character and we had a really fun time with him. He sang a couple of songs for us at the end. You wouldn't believe the power of his voice, the choir was stunned by his fantastic singing. His rendition of *Danny Boy* made grown men weep.

The choir continues to hold its annual concert in the Cannock area, and this year is no exception. However, this time we have chosen a new venue. The new Aquarius Ballroom in nearby Hednesford, recently completed as part of the redevelopment works surrounding the new Tesco superstore, will host the occasion on Saturday 12 October.

The emphasis for the annual concert is concentrated on a more light hearted mood with lots of laughter. To this end, the show will, as usual, be compered by and feature the popular black country comedian, Doug



Parker. Doug is well known to the choir's regular followers and always leaves 'em laughing.

The choir's special guest artiste this year will be the ever popular local soprano Sharron Burns. Sharron is a regular guest artiste at the choir's concerts and a principal of the Cannock Wood and Gentleshaw Musical Society. This 27 year old society is well known in its home area, and in between gigantic shows like 'The Sound of Music' presented at the Prince of Wales theatre in Cannock, they also do a musical tour every year raising money for good causes.

The continued success and development of the choir depends on a progressive recruitment policy and so the quest for new members continues. The choir still has vacancies in all sections, but particularly for Baritone and Bass singers.

Royal Tunbridge Wells Opheus Male Voice Choir

A personal view of the NAC Thames South
Joint Concert

Chatham, 22 June - a chance to perform at a new venue, meet other choirs, and reacquaint ourselves with the delights of the town. And we were singing the *Hallelujah Chorus* together. It had to be a special day. It was, but not entirely in the way we expected.

Own pieces selected - check.
Coach ordered - check.
Pick-up locations & timings agreed - check.
Choir briefed - check.
Own pieces rehearsed - check.
Joint numbers practised - check.
Shirts laundered & pressed - check.

Despite the usual planning, for various reasons we arrived 45 minutes late. Dumping our bags in the one remaining small changing room the 25 of us began rehearsing on stage straight away so as not to lose our slot. We had 20 minutes remaining, and made good use of it. It was certainly different from our usual rehearsal venue, but with the lights full in our faces we ran through enough pieces, we hoped, to give us the confidence we needed for a polished performance.

With the impossibility of all of us squeezing into our changing room, many of us stepped out into the town centre for a quick breather before the joint rehearsal. In my limited experience, these occasions can present all sorts of unwanted challenges, not least of which in this case was whether we could all fit on to the stage. At one moment when the stage looked full, I looked along the row of basses in the back row to see a long line of familiar faces in increasing shadow waiting to climb on. How could they possibly all get on? Answer - not easily, but with much squeezing, pushing and line shuffling they managed. Then of course we had to be able to see the MD, so more shuffling and craning was required. We all envied big Chris his height. And by this

time, crammed together, the heat of the lights was making itself felt. Claustrophobia and heat exhaustion were not an option.

The actual performance went pretty well, we thought. Over weekend Friday-Sunday 19-21 April, I attended the National Association of Choirs annual Conference near Chester. I arrived at the Llyndir Hall hotel, Rossett, Chester late Friday afternoon. Joined other delegates for an evening meal followed by an impromptu evening of

Liz Moulder, a long time Midlands East NAC choral music director together with Annette Wood, a professional Mezzo Soprano and singing tutor, ran two workshops; 'It Isn't Just The Singing' and 'Explore The Voice Together'. Both workshops were very informative.

At 3.30 we held the NAC Annual General Meeting. Patrick Hawes, a composer, ran another workshop, 'The Composition Of Music'.

Roger Hagarty of Roger's Music bought along and demonstrated a selection of music instruments.

After an evening meal, we attended an evening's entertainment at the William Aston Hall at Glyndŵr University, Wrexham, by the six or seven Ladies, Mixed, Youth, and Male Voice Choirs of North Wales & West Cheshire NAC group.

Sunday morning, the members of the attending four choirs in Thames North Group held a short meeting to restart activities in our group, more about this in News & Views, I hope.

Saturday 27 April, sang at concert in the Central Methodist Church Dunstable with Vauxhall MVC being the guests of the Luton Concert Orchestra.

Sunday 28 April, It was off to Leigh-on-Sea for a joint coiert with Leigh Orpheus MVC, over 90 strong, & Sidney (Australia) MVC well over 60 singers.

Friday to Monday 3-6 May, my German chorister friend Rudi Frank and I Attended the 'Cornish International Male Voice Choral Festival', where over 60 choirs, (nine international), held 40 concerts, in 20 Cornish venues across the county. My German friend had come over specially for the festival.

We arrived in Truro Friday afternoon and that evening attended an International Gala Concert in Truro Cathedral, where 7 choirs, (three from abroad) sang a total of 40 songs. There were four other concerts that Friday evening elsewhere in Cornwall.



Festival programmes were freely available at each concert.

Saturday morning & afternoon (9.00 to 6.00), there were two choral competitions, with 16 choirs in the 'up to 40 singers' and later, 6 choirs in the '41 singers and over' group.

The overall best choir in the festival was; Harmone Lindenholzhausen' from Germany with 79 singers. They also took the first prize of £1000 for best choir in the 41 voices and over group. 'Colne Valley' were FESTIVAL best UK choir and second in the 41 and over class, 'Peterborough' came third.

In the 40 voices and under, 'Euga' from Finland took first prize of £1000, with 'Synergy' from South Wales and 'Eight In A Bar' from Cornwall sharing second place. Of the 22 choirs competing, we missed the singing of about 6 choirs.

Saturday evening, we attended our second International Gala Concert, in the 'Hall for Cornwall' in Truro. With a concert of 32 songs. 7 choirs sang in this concert, which including the winners of both competitions.

There were also six other Saturday evening concerts spread around Cornwall.

Sunday, At the Eden Project, from 10.30 onwards, 10 choirs each sang for 25 minutes, (half hour slots). We missed about 3 choirs.

On Sunday evening, Rudi and I attended a Regional Concert at St Michael's Church Newquay, (where The Vauxhall MVC and I will be singing later in the year when we have our away weekend in Cornwall).

There were 5 choirs, singing in this concert, (including Newquay MVC and a

Dutch Choir). There were 6 other regional concerts across Cornwall that evening.

Over the Cornwall weekend Rudi and I saw and had the pleasure of listening to over 40 male voice choirs. We attended three concerts and the daytime singing at the Eden Project. Something I would like my choir to do in the near future.

The Festival continued on Monday with daytime singing at three locations, a lunchtime concert in Truro Cathedral,

and the Final International Gala Evening Concert in the Hall for Cornwall. Rudi and I missed the last day to return Rudi to Heathrow for his return to Germany Monday afternoon.

Saturday 11 May, I attended a Stevenage Ladies Choir concert where they hosted The Rowland Singers, an SATB choir of over 40 singers from Worthing.

Friday evening 17 May, I visited my old choir Churchdown MVC who were hosting The Forest of Dean MVC in a concert in Cheltenham. Brings back many happy memories of when I was a Churchdown member.

Saturday 18 May, Singing with the Vauxhall MVC at Helen and David's wedding at Breachwood Green Methodist Church, Hearts.

At rehearsal on Wednesday 22 May, we

heard that Josie our longstanding 80+ year old accompanist who had been away for a few weeks wasn't feeling too well, and since she only lived close down the road, the whole choir went to sing to her. Instead of just standing outside, we were invited in, all 40+ singers, in the front room, back room, kitchen and on the stairs. We sang many of her favourites until it was time to go. As we left, we met her neighbours who had come out to listen.

Saturday 25 May, singing with the Vauxhall Male Voice Choir at St Ann's Church in Luton, to celebrate their 75th anniversary.

Friday 31 May, off to Limerick via Aer Lingus to 'Limerick Sings' Music Festival. Due to a delayed take-off at Heathrow, it was after 10.00 when I arrived at 'The Savoy Hotel', too late to go to their introduction evening get-together, sing-song, I'm told it was a great success and went on till about 3.00.

Saturday morning was free time, then off to 'The Hunt Museum' where a local choir gave an afternoon recital, which included *The Elizabethan Serenade*, a favourite of mine, brought back memories of singing with my late wife. Then after refreshments

at the Museum, and a short walk to St Mary's Cathedral, (founded in 1168, and Limerick's oldest building), for an evening's Inaugural Concert. At least 200 to 250 choristers and audience, found our way back to 'The Savoy' where the hotel put their three lounges at out disposal. And surprise surprise, the singing went on well into the early hours. I can't remember what time I went up to my room.

Sunday morning was a bit of a haze, (the Guinness of last night?).

Sunday afternoon and A Choral Extravaganza at Limerick University Concert Hall, where all seven choirs joined for the finale with *The Londonderry Air* and Verdi's *Va Pensiero (Speed Your Journey)*, well over 200 singers. I must mention one choir, The Dalkey Active Retirement Association Choir; a choir of almost 100 singers, but only 42 came to the Festival. Ages range from around 60 to 94, with an average of 74 years.

After the concert, a grand BBQ was laid on at 'The University Stables' and guess what, singing broke out again and went on 'til way after 9.00.

Monday morning was free time and I took the opportunity to recover before returning home with fond memories of a very successful choral festival weekend and am looking forward to next year. This is a choral festival weekend that choirs should consider very seriously for next year and the future!

In just over seven weeks I have attended a weekend Choral Conference, two choral festivals, some 15 concerts, singing in two, and at a wedding. Saw and heard over 40 choirs at the Cornish International Male Voice Choral Festival and 14 choirs (seven twice), at the Limerick Festival.

I have been busy learning the ropes since the last issue of News and Views, starting to put some faces to names among the many delegates and members of our very large organisation. My thanks must go to Brenda and Celia for helping me with information about various aspects of the Association and the role which I have undertaken.

My immediate concern was to clarify the position with regard to the 2014 conference in Scarborough. I did take on board many delegates concerns about the cost of parking if the Grand Hotel was chosen as the venue. I must say that I had reservations about this hotel as the venue on another issue, that being the suitability of the hotel for our conference with regard to privacy when you consider the hotel caters for eight hundred guests. Our delegates would account for a small proportion of this number, the majority of the guests being holiday makers, many with children. With this in mind I suggested that we consider the Crown Spa on the Esplanade as a better option.

The hotel has a four star rating and accommodates 175 guests, so we would be the majority occupants of the hotel during the conference. It has adequate conference facilities and very comfortable accommodation throughout. The parking is free and is situated at the front of the hotel along the whole of the Esplanade. It is assigned solely for the use of the hotel by Scarborough Council and is safe, being



overlooked by the hotel. There is an 18 space secure parking lot behind the hotel which can be booked in advance at a cost of £10 per night for those who may prefer this option. I have used the hotel four

times in the past and have had no issues with parking.

The National officers are delighted to be able to tell you that we have two distinguished guests as speakers at conference next year. Manvinder

Rattan is Head of Music with the John Lewis Partnership, and Development Director and Head of Conductor Training for the charity Sing For Pleasure. I am sure his addresses will be very entertaining. Tim will be taking a spot on Saturday to talk on his specialist subjects. 




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The Glasgow Phoenix Choir Scotland West

The choir's AGM in early June saw a number of changes in the office bearers.

Bowing out after a highly successful stint as Choir President was Janette Walker who, as well as chairing Council Meetings and representing the choir, also presided with great skill over the choir's Diamond Jubilee celebrations; with three major concerts in the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall along with many other concerts throughout her five year term. Janette's cheerful disposition did much to bring some brightness to the proceedings. To succeed her the members voted overwhelmingly for Lady Jan Bonomy (more below). Janette then became Honorary Vice-President as is customary for retiring presidents.

The new Vice-President is former Librarian Angus Leitch whose previous post was taken up by Douglas Gale. Other changes were Ann Kay who became Publicity Officer, while her husband Ronnie became Bass Steward. Brian Dunnachie became Tenor Steward in place of Douglas Gale. The Honorary Patron remains The Lord Provost of the City of Glasgow, Cllr Sadie Docherty.

New President - Jan Bonomy has the distinction of being the first 'Lady' President. Although she is the third female to hold the position in the choir's history, Jan is the first titled President. She has sung in choirs since primary school days including church choirs. Jan joined the Phoenix as a teenager 48 years ago and has seen the choir progress over the years, has been to North America three times, enjoyed winning the Cork International Choral Festival with them and took part in annual concerts in Croydon, Manchester and Newcastle. She met her husband lain Bonomy (a young aspiring lawyer) in Motherwell, they married and moved to East Kilbride where they set up home and had two daughters, Ann and Jill. Iain rose through the ranks of the legal profession in Scotland to become eventually a Senator of the College of Justice for Scotland with the title The Rt Hon Lord Bonomy. Iain is an associate member of the choir and is an ardent follower having enjoyed concert tours around the UK, Germany, USA and various other countries. Jan is a stalwart of the alto section and has served on Council as Secretary and Vice-President. She is sure to be a highly motivated and popular President and we look forward to her wise and witty counsel.



The 2013-14 Season commenced in late August with the Ceremony of Investiture of the Sovereign Order of St John of Jerusalem Knights Hospitaller in Orchardhill Parish Church, Giffnock with the choir leading the praise and singing various choruses. This was an afternoon event and was a most spectacular and moving ceremony with members of the order coming from many parts of the world. This was followed in the evening by a concert in the same venue in aid of church funds and Rotary. The end of August saw the Phoenix taking part in the Bathgate Festival in West Lothian.

On 2 September there is an open night where potential choristers are invited to come along and listen to the choir in a short rehearsal followed by refreshments so that they can mingle with members. The choir is particularly looking for men and especially basses.

At the time of going to press the Phoenix is about to embark on another Irish tour over the Autumn Holiday weekend at the end of September. The members are privileged to be invited as guests of the First Minister of the Northern Ireland Assembly - The Hon Mr Peter Robinson to give a concert in the Grand Hall at Stormont Castle. The following evening the venue will be Strean Presbyterian Church in Newtownards. On

the Sunday the coaches will take the choir down to Dublin where they will sing in the magnificent Corpus Christi RC Church. At this series of concerts it is hoped that three new recordings will be released which will include the second volume of 'Songs of Comfort', and also a live recording of Faure's Requiem in Iona Abbey which was recorded in the middle of a gale. The sound effects as a result were very interesting and added to the atmosphere of the performance. The third recording is a postcard compilation which, along with the Faure album, was recorded live in Iona Abbev.

Two concerts will be given in October - the first being held in Bishopton Church of Scotland in aid of Erskine Home, a home principally for ex servicemen and, at the end of the month one in St David's Church, Kirkintilloch.

During the month of November, two concerts will take place to honour Scotland's patron saint - St Andrew, the first in Cadder

Freestone Masonic Lodge in Bishopbriggs, and the second in Clydebank Town Hall in aid of St Margaret's Hospice in the town.

The Christmas season will be as busy as usual with Christmas concerts in Freemasons' Hall in Edinburgh for the Grand Lodge of Scotland, followed by our annual Christmas concert – 'The Sounds of Christmas' in the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall, with guest stars and old favourites, the Co-operative Funeralcare Band, and introducing Choir of the Year 2012 - Les Sirenes. The year will end with an annual Christmas concert in another favourite venue - Moncrieff Parish Church in East Kilbride.

Exeter Policeand Community Choir Devon

The choir reaches a highpoint in its history this year when it celebrates its 50th anniversary.

The event was marked by a special concert on 28 September in Exeter where members were joined by the Con Brio mixed choir from Bradford-on-Avon. The two choirs have performed joint concerts several times in the last few years.

What's more the concert - staged at the Salvation Army Temple, Friars Gate - was FREE as a big thank you to all the choir's supporters and followers over the years.

Exeter Police and Community Choir was originally formed by serving police officers in Exeter in 1963 but for some time has attracted members from the wider community.

The Musical Director of the Exeter Police & Community Choir, David Williams, has led the choir since October 1995 and before that fulfilled the same role for the Torbay Police Choir.

Choir accompanist Margaret Chave has

performed as accompanist with many choirs and groups in the South West and elsewhere, ranging from Northampton Regional Opera to smaller ensembles and solo recitals.

Choir rehearsals take place on Monday evenings at 7.30 at St. Boniface Church, Whipton, from September to May (allowing for a summer recess).

Gippeswyk Singers Anglia group

The Gippeswyk Singers are approaching the new choral year with considerable excitement, not only are they moving to a new base for their future concerts but also embarking on their first trip overseas.

The Singers are a non-audition choir of about forty members who perform several concerts each year, supporting local charities. Their repertoire includes a wide range of vocal genres from the sixteenth to the twenty-first centuries and includes madrigals and other a cappella works to accompanied standard repertoire pieces such as Faure's *Requiem* and Haydn's *Maria Theresa Mass*.

The choir was started in 1972 by Geoff Lavery, who was teaching at Ipswich School in Suffolk. He formed a small chamber choir of teachers, parents and friends. The name comes from the Anglo-Saxon name for Ipswich. Geoff conducted them until 1986, when he took up a new post outside the county. The baton then passed to Barry Salmon who conducted the choir until 2010. In recognition of his long service, Barry is now our president. In January 2012, Geoff Lavery returned to Suffolk upon his retirement from the teaching profession and once again became the conductor of the choir he founded 40 years previously.

Now after eighteen years, the choir moves to St Augustine's Church, Ipswich in September. This will be its new rehearsal venue and, although the choir will be happy to perform at other venues throughout Suffolk, this church will provide their primary concert platform.

Having just completed their second successful season under Geoff's direction, the choir is looking towards a new and exciting season ahead, beginning with their own celebration of Benjamin Britten on Sunday 24 November 2013 at Levington Church, Suffolk. Appropriately there will be a performance of Britten's *Hymn to St Cecilia* as well as one of Purcell's own works in celebration of the Patron Saint of Music and Musicians. The choir will be accompanied by a small string orchestra - this will be a new challenge for the Singers who have not worked with such an ensemble for many years.

On Saturday 7 December the Singers will celebrate Christmas with their traditional Christmas concert featuring a local primary school children's choir plus seasonal readings and carols both old and new. Their Christmas concert is particularly popular with local families who enjoy joining in the singing. On this occasion, the Singers will be performing at another local church, St Andrews, Rushmere, Ipswich.

The year 2014 will prove to be a landmark one for this chamber choir, as arrangements are well in hand for a short tour to Holland in June. The Easter concert on 28 March is but a taste of things to come! As well as a performance of one of Hummel's little known Masses, there will be some smaller

pieces in preparation for our Dutch visit. Our programme for the tour will be a cappella English Music through the Ages, ranging from early English madrigalists, through Sullivan, Parry and Elgar, to the Beatles and beyond. There will be a pretour concert on 16 June and then a post-tour celebratory performance of the programme on 27 June.



Golden Anniversary 1963 - 2013



On Friday 3 May 1963, a group of friends and wives of the Daleian Singers met to discuss the formation of a ladies choir in the village of Silverdale in Newcastleunder-Lyme. The 38 ladies present decided enthusiastically to go ahead with the venture, with Doris Ford (wife of the Daleian Singers' conductor) as conductor and Dolly Jones as Secretary. The choir went from strength to strength, giving concerts and achieving success at music festivals locally and around England and Wales under the baton of Doris Ford, Fred Payne and, since 1969, Joan Audley. The Daleian Ladies Choir currently numbers 36 members. Whilst we have only one original founder chorister, there are many who have been with the choir for 3040 years. The choir has joined the Daleian Singers on several occasions to give Gilbert & Sullivan concerts, sometimes with D'Oyly Carte principals. More recently, the ladies have sung with the Newcastle Male Voice Choir. The choir's rehearsals are still held in Silverdale Methodist Church with Edith Edwards as its excellent accompanist, and it continues to have strong support from the local community.

The Daleian Ladies celebrated 50 golden years of singing by giving a concert at Newcastle-under-Lyme Methodist Church on Saturday 11 May, with The Daleian Singers joining them as their guest choir. The concert was a great success, with the church filled to capacity, and both choirs on fine form. It was great to see so many Silverdale residents in the audience.

The Daleian Ladies continued their celebrations the following Thursday, with an excellent meal at a local hotel. Nancy Ellams, the only original founder member still singing with the choir, was presented with flowers after giving a splendid speech about 'The Early Days'. Joan Audley, the choir's conductor for the past 44 years, received a thank you gift for her unstinting leadership. Joining the current choristers

were several former members, and it was lovely to reminisce about past concerts and festivals.

This mixed voice choir, with members aged from 7-21 was founded in April 2009. We have since performed at countless venues, including the ${\rm O_2}$ Arena for the 'Voice in a Million concert', the 'Gordon Craig' in Stevenage three times singing with Blake and Earls Court for the 'Ideal Home Show' at Christmas. We meet weekly in Stevenage, Hertfordshire for an hour during term time, singing a range of music, in 2-3 parts.

This August, we held our 4th Summer Camp. The theme remains a surprise to the members until we arrive on the first day. 'What a wonderful job, and how grateful I am to have persevered with it.'

Not my words and not my job but the words of our new Deputy Conductor, Hayden Thomas. Like many choirs we are reliant on a few key people and Nicolas Wright, our Musical Director and Conductor and Sheila Leatherland our Accompanist are two such people. However to rely just on them was neither a sensible or practical strategy.

In 2009 the hunt therefore started for a new member of the music team. Strenuous external efforts were made with little success until our then Vice Chairman, Hayden expressed an interest. He had a go at conducting at an evening rehearsal but it came as a quite a shock even to someone accustomed to standing up in front of people and delivering courses and plays; the faces watching with trepidation, not knowing what to expect but willing him on. With many choristers not reading music the challenge was considerable and his aspirations were dented.

A few weeks later his baptism of fire arrived when the Musical Director was unavailable and the choir was due to sing three pieces on live radio. He survived and since then he has conducted in numerous public venues including at the Eden Project, Lanhydrock House, numerous weddings and in May this year his first full concert with the Musical Director acting as accompanist.

Hayden remains an important member of the First Tenors, leads our Welsh contingent and does a great deal of work producing practice CDs for choristers. As he has remarked he can now enjoy the best of both worlds and we have a stronger team able to cope much better with the growing choir commitments.

The early Summer period saw the choir hold a very successful local concert in Kempsey Church just outside Worcester and situated in the heart of the area which made the international news headlines earlier in the year with the massive flooding from the River Severn despite new flood defences.

We then launched into a series of visits to other counties starting off with an invitation to perform at the annual SHENFEST Music and Literature Festival, in Shenington near Banbury, Oxfordshire. The Festival has a number of significant patrons including BBC presenter Ken Bruce and amongst the world class music (their description) the choir was in the company of the Haffner Wind Quartet and Ronnie Scott's regulars, performing an Evening of Sinatra. Not to be outdone the choir showed its versatility by singing, amongst many other pieces, the French composition Cantique de Jean Racine. The concert was held in a packed local church and singing continued until late in the evening in the local hostelry. This was followed a few weeks later by the EAMVC Concert in the splendid Tewkesbury Abbey where a massed choir of over 300 voices entertained an excellent audience.

Then back to the coaches for another visit, this time to Lister Hall, Chantry Centre, Dursley. It was a very hot July day and despite full uniform being the order of the day, white shirts sufficed. We joined our very good friends the Dursley MVC for a return joint concert this time on their patch. As well as performing their own pieces the joint choirs produced a great sound with Rhythm of Life, Morte Christe, You'll Never Walk Alone and American Trilogy. It was

good to hear Dursley's rendition of the *Hallelujah Chorus* a version of which we are currently working on.

Various coach companies have been busy accommodating our visits and this will continue in early September when the choir goes on tour to Durham; more about that in our next update.

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JUST WAVE YOUR ARMS AROUND AND LOOK CONFIDENT? How to be a conductor



At 10.00 on Saturday 18 May, a slightly nervous group gathered in Biggleswade, Bedfordshire to attend a unique conducting course led by Dr Douglas Coombes MBE.

This one-day course comprised three parts. In the morning the participants had a Masterclass from Douglas. He began with the fundamentals of posture and ensuring that conducting won't damage your back in particular. Next came a discussion as to whether conductors should 'mouth' the

words - in this group the consensus was a definite 'yes' in order to help the choir with vowels etc. This led on to the importance of facial expression. After that we explored the pivot points (wrist, arm, shoulder and their different effects) followed by the 'mystery of the upbeat' and all experimented with how you can give your accompanist and choir the tempo, style etc just through the upbeat. Douglas also talked about the need to be reading ahead as you conduct, keeping your fingers together to increase the power in your beat, how vital it is to colour the words and ensure intensity in soft singing.

With all of that ringing in our heads, it was then time to start looking at the music for the course. Each of the six attendees had been allocated, in advance, two pieces based on their previous experience. These songs were all in the repertoire of The Amici Singers, a women's choir founded by Douglas in 1978, which he still conducts. Each song was intensively analysed to help the conductors with their performance of it.

Then after a half-hour lunch break it was time to move down to Trinity Church to meet the choir and accompanist and start the second part of the course. Each conductor was allowed 25 minutes to rehearse the choir in their two pieces. This was when the fun really started! What had seemed quite easy when we were just talking through the music suddenly became utterly different when standing in front of 35 singers who knew the music extremely well, but had been instructed to follow each conductor minutely.

The six conductors were of varying levels of experience. Three of them regularly conduct choirs of their own, two do so on an occasional basis and the sixth had never conducted in her life before! Douglas



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helped each conductor in his easy, friendly manner, so no one felt too out of their depth and the choir also did their best to make the experience a really positive one. It was fascinating to see and hear the effect different conductors had on the choir - the sound changed perceptibly, according to the way they were conducted.

During the tea break the conductors were able to chat with the choir which broke the ice all round. Then it was time for the third part of the day, the concert. With a paying audience to listen, this was an opportunity to experience concert conditions under which to perform their two songs. Douglas opened the concert, explained what had been going on all day and introduced each of the conductors and their pieces.

Unlike the rehearsal, this time there was no chance to stop and do something again. Each of the participants gave of their best and the choir responded to them, as did the audience. The look on the face of the lady giving her first ever performance was a picture when she managed a diminuendo and brought the choir off - a mixture of utter incredulity and delight.

After an interval (more tea and wonderful cakes kindly supplied by members of Trinity Church) everyone went back again to have a half hour forum, where the audience and choir asked questions on conducting. This led to some really interesting discussions and showed that everyone had had their knowledge of conducting considerably improved and their respect for those who attempt this most difficult art greatly enhanced.

This day was organised by Douglas Coombes in conjunction with ABCD (the Association of British Choral Directors), Your General Secretary was one of the six volunteers taking part, and she tells me it was a very enjoyable day, if slightly scary in places. Elizabeth Gammell sings with the Amici Singers, and was another one of the conducting volunteers.

At no time did Douglas suggest that you simply had to just wave your arms about and look confident. That's just my attempt at humour in the title.

On the evening of Wednesday 8 May, the band practice room at Drybrook became alive with the sound of music as the Drybrook and District Choir held its annual audition for the Margaret Rose Bursary. The bursary, now valued at £750, is awarded annually to a talented young musician from The Forest of Dean to assist the development of a professional career in music.



Reflecting the enormous musical talent in the forest, the bursary auditions attract a high degree of competition and this year was no exception. This year, no less than eight talented young musicians contested this coveted award, pursuing not only the financial assistance it brings, but also the highly valued accolade that it brings to its recipients reputation. This year's contestants presented a wide and diverse range of talents, not only reflecting the variety of musical instruments with which they gave their performances, but also a staggering degree of virtuosity in the use of advanced computer technology.

The panel of judges were set a challenging task in choosing this year's winner from amongst the amazing performances based on such a wide range of musical genre, ranging from rock to classical, with a truly eclectic list of inspirational influences thrown into the mix. To meet this task, the panel, Clive Lewis, Linda Speed, Fiona Crawley and Paul Speed, were able to call upon their own wide range of musical diversity and after much deliberation were finally able to announce the winner of the Margaret Rose Bursary 2013 as Kieran Ball.

In addition to his virtuosity as a drummer, Kieran is also a talented composer and songwriter. The bursary caries forward Margaret's love of music to the future generations of the people of the forest and stands as a fitting tribute to her contribution to the community.

After their much acclaimed performance at St Ethelbert's, on behalf of the MOOSE charity fundraisers, the Drybrook and District Ladies Choir (aka The Pink Ladies) have spread their wings.

By special invitation, the popular ladies choir was called upon to travel far away from their customary audience, in and around The Forest of Dean. Following the spread of their reputation, the choir members packed their bags and, courtesy of Grindles Coaches, were whisked away to Derby to perform as guests of the Derbyshire Dalesmen Male Voice Choir. The chosen venue for their performance was the spectacular Christchurch in Belper.

The church was designed by H J Stevens in the Early English and built in 1849/50. Apart from giving a visually stunning setting, the grade 2 English Heritage listed building also provided a beautiful acoustic to showcase the choir's carefully crafted harmonies.

The choir's performance, drawn from the ladies' wide repertoire, received a clamorous ovation and they were not allowed to retire before giving an encore performance.

After the performance, still high on harmony and counterpoint the ladies were treated to the delights of the local



cuisine, a pie and a pint. Reinforced by this hearty traditional fayre, the choir received a vote of appreciation before retiring to a well-earned nights rest at the Hallmark Hotel, where they were residing throughout their stay.

Using the hotel as a base, the ladies took full advantage of the opportunity to explore the local cultural sites afforded by their visit, taking in the cathedral and museum, to say nothing of the local retail experience. There was also the opportunity to visit the historic Chatsworth House, although sadly without Mr Darcy arising from the lake as portrayed in the televised version of Pride and Prejudice. Despite this disappointment, the stately house and its grounds still gave much to admire and enjoy.

As is always the case, this good time eventually came to an end and it was time to leave the hospitality of Derbyshire. The ladies took a last look around before reboarding the coach for the homeward trip.

Despite the many attractions still unexplored, there was such an eagerness to return to their nearest and dearest, that the ladies nearly forgot to take their driver with them. In the excitement of the moment, one of their number eager to try her hand at the wheel!

Once the driver overcame the mutineers and retook control of the bus, they finally departed on the homeward journey back to Drybrook, taking in a visit to a garden nursery along the way.

After meeting the challenges presented by this tour, there is no doubt that the Pink Ladies will be looking forward to taking their music on the road again.
