

I started attending NAC Steering Group meetings in the early 1990s, when the Gildenburgh Choir joined the NAC. At that time Norman Williams was President, and Eric Jackson, Chairman, as he had been since 1989. My impression of Eric from the very first was that he was a gentle man who seldom raised his voice, but who knew a tremendous amount about the NAC and choral singing, through his own long experience both in singing and in the organisation of the Association. He was occasionally at a loss to know how to deal with some fiery attendees who were intent on having their say, but order prevailed when he finally managed to be heard.

In 2002 Norman Williams sadly died, and Eric was asked to relinquish the Chairman's role and take on that of President of the NAC.

At the 2005 AGM I became Treasurer. I remember that Eric's expense claims were always in on time, and always moderate, despite his travelling with Jan across the length and breadth of the UK to attend concerts to which they had been invited. He did love going to new places and meeting new people, and if there was a concert at the end of the meetings, so much the better. He was an excellent ambassador for the NAC, and the member choirs were only too happy to have him attending their events.

In 2009 I was elected as the Association's first lady Chairman. Eric was slightly stunned to be dealing with a lady as Chairman, I felt, but he was always so very supportive of all his Officers. I had one or two difficult decisions to make during my tenure, and I was grateful to receive, from Eric, a phone call or an email agreeing with my course of action and endorsing my decisions.

Eric's own singing continued almost to the end of his life, with the Gresley Male Voice Choir, of which he was a long-serving and valued member. I was honoured in November 2012 to be invited to a joint concert with Gresley MVC and Luton MVC, which was staged in order to pay tribute to Eric's years of service to the Choir. It was a very happy evening, with short speeches and a presentation to Eric and flowers for Jan, and I think they both were rather taken aback to realise just how much he was loved and valued by everybody present.

Over the last twelve months or so we have missed Eric's presence and constant encouragement and enthusiasm; there was definitely an empty chair at the Officer meetings. And for the first time he and Jan were forced to miss Annual Conference due to ill health.

We feared the worst, but it was still a horrible shock to receive the news of his sudden death on 25 August after a short illness.

Eric has left a hole in the Association which will be impossible to fill in the same way he did. The best thing we can do in his memory is to take the NAC forward into the future in the way he would have wished; to encourage choral singing across the UK and to ensure that the member choirs are supported in every way possible in their singing.

I will miss him immensely, and my heartfelt sympathy goes to Jan and all Eric's family and close friends.

A CELEBRATION OF YOUTH MUSIC

The Orpheus presented a concert on 12 July 2014 at Central Hall, Grimsby.

'A Celebration of Youth Music' was aimed at serious young musicians aged 11 to 21 years, resident in North East Lincolnshire, and was open to both voice and instrumental performers.

The concert intended to give a platform for the young musicians of the area to display their talents, and at the same time gain valuable performance experience so vital for the development of musical talent.

OMVC was grateful for the support of Central Hall Trust and Soundboard in the presentation of the event.

The concert was part of our continued commitment to youth music and provided young people with a chance to display their skills in a public but relaxed environment. Over the years OMVC has encouraged young musicians to perform with them at concerts. Providing an opportunity for them to perform in their own right is seen as a significant development in the progress and development of young musical talent.

During the concert 84 young musicians performed in ensembles and groups, OMVC felt that this was an excellent way to add to the musicianship skills of performers.

The music ranged from Beethoven and Schubert to modern day Cold Play and concluded with a rousing Taiko Drum performance.

All performers received a memento of a commemorative T-shirt and printed bag to mark the occasion.

The groups ranged from concert bands to a cappella choirs and included a jazz combo, a youth choir and three soloists featuring piano, classical guitar and viola. The event provided two hours of an unforgettable music experience, which was enjoyed by a large and enthusiastic audience.

The event was compèred by Hugh Riches of Estuary TV, received support from local businesses and was attended by the Mayor of North East Licolnshire.

The concert was followed up with Richard Markham (Grimsby born international concert pianist and ABRSM Grades and Diploma Examiner) running a 'Concert Performance Class' on Sunday 13 July at The Central Hall for selected young musicians.

As a teenager Richard was given the opportunity by the Orpheus to appear as a soloist and develop his performance skills. In recognition he was happy to 'Chair'

the 'Concert Performance Class' and offer the benefit of his experience to the young musicians of the area. It was aimed specifically at young musicians who have achieved a minimum ABRSM Grade 6 in their speciality.

The young musicians were invited to set up their performance area, tune up, then make an entrance and perform a piece of about 10 minutes in length and leave the stage just like a concert but without a pressure of a large audience.

Richard then talked them through their performance and gave those attending hints and advice on improving their delivery and technique.

MUSIC & FESTIVALS



My article on copyright issues last edition has trebled the number of calls and emails I get from choirs on the subject of arranging and copyrights, some have been easy to sort out,

others will require more time and some others, probably more time than I have left in office, but it does show a raising of awareness of this complex but important side to choir activities, and for that I am pleased.

The interesting letter that has come as a result of that article raises an interesting point but is a difficult one to answer and I have tried many lines of enquiry, of course there was a motion in the USA to extend copyright to the 'end of time' less one day and there have been many attempts to extend it to 95 years.

Many publishers fear that if there is no copyright beyond the death of the com-

poser, there will be a resultant loss of income with which to fund new pieces, or that they may not recoup the expense of promoting and printing new music, I have to say that the cost of promoting a piece of music, sending out samples, printing catalogues and these days the preparation of give away CDs is a major chunk of the music selling price, composers generally get 10% and on royalties, composers of music used in a sacred setting (services etc) get nothing at all.

The most sensible answer I have come across is that the 70 year rule relates to the extent of time that dependants of the composer and author may be expected to live and that copyright income may then go to the families of the composer, that seems a reasonable answer but I am not claiming it to be the definitive one and I would welcome any one letting me know what is the definitive one.

Your article on page 5 of the Summer 2014 edition of News and Views under the

heading MUSIC & FESTIVALS reiterated the rules regarding the rights attached to the creators of music. I doubt whether anyone begrudges a composer or musician of any description a just reward for their labours but how on earth can seventy years after death be justified and who are the recipients of this largesse during those seventy years? The writer of the unattributed article writes, 'Consider this, the creation of music is, for many people, their living in exactly the same way as working in an office or collecting rubbish'. Very true, however, unlike the creators of music, the vast majority of your members - be they office workers, collectors of rubbish, employed or self-employed - work for many years knowing that when they die, their pension dies with them.

In the real world a patent on an invention lasts for a basic twenty years. If Sir Frank Whittle had kept up his patent on the jet engine, under a seventy year rule, the public would be paying royalties on air travel until the year 2066. Likewise, for example, having purchased a car - imagine paying royalties every time you drove or modified it!

Following the success of the 2014 Annual Conference Concert in Scarborough in April, Hull Male Voice Choir is already busy networking to plan joint concerts for inclusion in its 2015 concert season with other local NAC member choirs that participated in the event which raised a final sum of £2,844 to benefit Marie Curie Cancer Care. In addition, plans are now already at an advanced stage in respect of the previously announced joint concert with Mansfield & District Male Voice Choir on Saturday 6 June in the impressive Queen Elizabeth Grammar School at Mansfield which our Chairman - John Holmes and myself visited when we travelled to Mansfield recently to finalise plans: in the true tradition of male voice choirs, we received a very warm and cordial welcome from its representatives who 'entertained' us after completing the business and prior to us being introduced to their choir at rehearsal in the evening - and having us sing without music.

Meantime, we are greatly looking forward to our special concert to be held in the splendour of Hull's Guildhall on Saturday 18 October 2014 when the fabulous and very popular Maureen Hunter Singers will



be our special guests. They have been giving musical pleasure since being formed in 1984 and now have more than 70 young ladies in the senior choir (as well as over 40 children in the Junior Singers). Every year of their choir's existence has been marked with outstanding concerts, competitions or international tours and 2014 has been no exception, having enjoyed a concert tour to the Rhineland area of Germany and also performed in Cologne Cathedral as part of their 30 Anniversary Celebrations. So Hull Male Voice Choir is delighted that the Maureen Hunter Singers accepted its invitation to participate in this joint concert during their milestone year.

Then follows our annual and very popular 'Sounds of Christmas' Concert in The Guildhall, Hull on Friday 5 December when Westfield Primary School Choir of Cottingham will be our special guests.

Hull Male Voice Choir — which celebrated its Centenary in 2011 - is in urgent need of recruiting more choristers - especially First Tenor voices - since unfortunately, over recent months we have sadly said farewell to some of our long standing members. Until recently, the choir had been enjoying a membership of some 50 voices and whilst during the Centenary period

numbers were boosted above this level, disappointingly they have now fallen back to a level that begins to give some cause for some concern (as does the average age of the choir), particularly since of course not only is it essential to maintain numbers, but there has to be an equal balance of voices across all our four parts - and whilst first tenors are in short supply at present, of course persons who sing second tenor, baritone or bass will be just as welcome to come and join us. Does your choir suffer the same challenges, aiming at younger men?

Complacency is not an option for any choir and recruitment ideas from other choirs will be welcomed and should be sent to me at terrywallis@live.co.uk - but with over 256,000 people living in Hull made up of 50% men and the average age being only 37, I remain upbeat that there must be at least 20 men out of these 128,000 males just waiting to hear about our choir but the problem seems to be in reaching them - ironically, it is almost without exception that all our new members who have delayed coming along to experience the joy of singing in a male voice choir until 'retirement' comment that they only wish that they had joined such a choir many years previously - but why?

Membership of any choir offers great fellowship and friendship and of course the satisfaction of singing in concerts - after all, singing is good for your health, it gives pleasure to others at the same time whilst often raising much needed funds for national and local charitable organisations.

For 60 years, Audley Male Voice Choir has provided audiences with many evenings of pleasure. Initially it was formed by Mr William Bowers, on 26 August 1954, in order to assist churches and chapels by giving concerts and singing at services when required. The choir also then began to compete at music festivals. After his retirement, Wallace Fryer and Geoffrey Statham conducted until the present Musical Director was appointed.

Philip Broadhurst, a local pharmacist, took charge of the baton in 1976. He has been the driving force behind the choir's current successes, and was awarded the MBE in 2001 for his services to the choir and the local community. Under his guidance the choir established a series of Celebrity Concerts, attracting more than fifty world class artistes from the world of opera. The busy concert and festival schedule continued, expanding to include the Northern and National Male Voice Championships, as well as tours to Malta, Cornwall and Scotland.

The men of the choir enjoy the camaraderie of being a member of a choir and that special feeling of singing together, whether that be in one of the many local churches and chapels or larger venues such as the Victoria Hall in Hanley. Over the years they have raised many thousands of pounds for local and national charities, and provide an annual bursary to a music student at the University of Keele.

The choir would not be what it is today without the many people who have helped along the way: accompanists, including lan Riddle who has been with the choir for over twenty five years; committee members; audience, including the support from wives and partners, and of course, the choristers themselves.

The choir's birthday year will include a Gala Concert with the Brighouse and Rastrick Band on 19 October 2014 a Celebrity Concert on 22 March 2015 and a Celebration Dinner also in March.

The choir looks forward to the next sixty years.

Budleigh Salterton Male Voice Choir Devon

It all began on Wednesday 8 May 1974 when seven individuals; Mrs Pamela Jones, her husband Ivor and five other men gathered together and decided to start a Men's choir. Pam Jones was to be the Musical Director. The first rehearsal was held on 10 September when 18 members attended and by January the following year the news had spread and 31 choristers were present. The choir's first major concert took place in Exmouth Pavilion on 13 June 1975 to great acclaim in front of a packed house, and so the Budleigh Salterton Male Voice Choir began its journey culminating in its Fortieth Anniversary concert on 5 July 2014.

In that time the choir has had five Musical Directors, Pam for 18 years; Marian Room (4), Allen Coles from 1997 to 2012, Peter Good for 18 months and our present MD, Michael Graham, who took up the position in September 2013. Michael is a charismatic young man who in addition to being Organist and Director of Chapel Music at Exeter University is an Organ Scholar at Exeter Cathedral. He is in demand as a tenor soloist and has performed with local choral societies in the South West and further afield.

In common with most male voice choirs we sing for charities, both local and national, performing, usually every three to four weeks and over recent times we have raised on average £10,000 to

£12,000 a year. Our present calendar extends into 2016!

The concert took place in our home church of St Peter's in Budleigh Salterton, where we rehearse every Tuesday evening in the church hall. Every effort had been made to invite ex-choristers to the concert, of which some 25 were able to attend. Local dignitaries present included the Mayors of Budleigh Salterton and Exmouth and the Chairman of Sidmouth Town Council. There was a good audience which nearly filled the whole church.

Our two soloists were Val Howells, an excellent mezzo-soprano who has been a regular soloist with the choir over the past twenty years. Not only is she in demand for her vocal talents but she is also an established author of children's books. She sang two pieces in each half firstly by Michael Nyman and Matyas Seiber, the second pair by Ernest Chausson and Stephen Sondheim.

The other soloist was, Edward Woodhouse, a tenor who is presently a lay vicar in the Exeter Cathedral choir. Born in Brighton he started singing at the age of 7, later moving to the back row. He studied at Portsmouth and Exeter University where he completed an MA in History. Edward has recently taken on a number of solo roles ranging from works by Mozart, Haydn, Bach and Handel. His offering for the evening was Till Earth Outwears, a song-cycle by Gerald Finzi.

The soloists delighted the audience with their singing and both received warm applause. The choir staged 63 out of our full complement of 65. We sang many of the favourite Male Voice Choir repertoire, especially memorable was By Babylon's Wave and Schubert's Holy, Holy, Holy, Modern songs from the shows included Les Miserables, South Pacific and New York New York. Finally we have a tradition to finish our concerts with Morte Criste, and we were delighted to welcome our founder and life president Pam Jones to the rostrum to conduct us together with many of the former choristers who were present.

So ended our Fortieth Anniversary concert. The question is 'where do we go from here?' We have a short tour to Yorkshire in September, we are singing in Exeter Cathedral in December and we have been invited to attend and compete in The Seventh International Male Voice Choir Festival in Truro next year. Our diary for 2015 is quickly filling up and we already have a provisional booking for 2016.

Our main concern is 'How do we attract younger men to join us?' At present we, like so many other choirs, don't have the answer to that question. One suggestion is to arrange visits to local senior schools to give short concerts and talks to see whether we can encourage lads in the sixth form to try it out. At present this is just an idea, if anyone out there has other ideas that have worked please advise.



If anything our homeward Channel crossing was even smoother than the outward journey and we returned as a very happy, if tired, group of Thanetians, pleased to have been part of a memorable occasion.

The Amid Singers Thames North

On 22 May 2014 the Amici Singers performed in front of over 1,000 people during the Last Post Service at the Menin Gate in Ypres, Belgium to commemorate those who fell there in World War One. The two items they sang were Anthem For Doomed Youth and Deep Peace (which they also sang at the site of 'Ground Zero' in New York in 2002) It was an extremely moving experience for all and a culmination of a very memorable tour of the area, during which they also performed a full concert in Ghent Cathedral, and in St Georges Chapel and another very moving performance at the Tyne Cot War Cemetery, the largest of its kind. It was a great honour for the Amicis to be involved in all these events, but to sing under the Arch at the Menin Gate which bears the names of 54,000 British and Commonwealth personnel who lost their lives in Ypres and the surrounding area was something very special. After the service, the Chief of the Army of New Zealand, Major General A D Gawn, MBE presented the Amicis with a commemorative medal, which was a very special moment.

As well as the serious side of the tour, there were also two canal boat trips and, on one evening, a somewhat boisterous evening meal was attended by most of the party. The boat trips and the meal were punctuated by bursts of spontaneous singing. Onlookers were left in no doubt that the Amicis were enjoying themselves!

Their founder, Musical Director and Conductor, Dr. Douglas Coombes MBE, who composed much of the music performed, said of the tour:-

'Over our 36 years of touring with the Amicis there have been many unforgettable and emotional experiences, such as singing at 'Ground Zero' in New York, but the singing at Tyne Cot cemetery (nearly 12000 graves) and at Menin Gate was very special and moving. Combined with the full concerts in Ghent Cathedral and St George's Church, Ypres, it was a memorable and wonderful trip.'

REMEMBERING WW1

We had a glorious night of music, poetry and prose at Gloucester Cathedral on Saturday 19 July. 'Remembering WW1' was a concert in which Churchdown Male Voice Choir hosted the combined Military Wives Choirs of Innsworth and RAF Benson, Oxfordshire and with soloists Sue Black and trumpeter Justin Lewis.

In the presence of the Lord Lieutenant of the County, Dame Janet Trotter, the Mayor of Gloucester, Debbie Llewellyn, NAC Chair, Brenda Wilkinson, NAC General Secretary, Celia Johns and the choir president, Ian Mean, and his wife Judy, the evening began with an opening prayer from our choir chaplain, Reverend Marilyn Sharland, before three members of the Royal British Legion, for whom the concert was in support of, presented the standards.

A former member of the choir, 94 year old Norman Auld then read from the Laurence Binyon poem 'For the Fallen' and Justin Lewis played the Last Post and the Reveille. Compère, Sue Wilson, then took over for the rest of the evening. Throughout the concert Sue presented poems and readings that injected just the right amount of reverence into the concert and which made us all think of the tremendous cost of young lives in the 'war to end all wars'.

Ralph Barnes, resplendent in Union Jack waistcoat and with James Quinn at the piano led the Churchdown choir in pieces chosen to reflect the theme for the evening, Comrades in Arms was followed by Battle Hymn of the Republic, Mansions of the Lord and Soldier's Chorus. Sue then introduced the choir's favourite soprano, Sue Black, who reminded the audience that she had been singing for the choir for over 30 years. Accompanied by James Quinn she sang the plaintive Dido's Lament, and Nella Fantasia, from the film 'The Mission'.

The Combined Military Wives Choir was then introduced. Under its musical team of Ralph and James, the choir presented a lovely programme which proved to be a refreshing change from the male voices and which was greatly appreciated by the 500 strong audience. They began with Going Home, a piece written for the wives choir especially by Brigitte Vymer, Musical Director of the RAF Benson Military Wives Choir. This was followed by Wherever you are, the song which is best associated with











the original Military Wives Choir set up by Gareth Malone. *Sing* by Gary Barlow completed their first set.

The first half concluded with a rousing performance of WW1 war songs by choirs and enthusiastic audience and led by Sue Black.

In the second half the Churchdown choir were led by a thrilling trumpet solo from Justin into *Where shall I be* (when the first trumpet sounds) and then the choir sang the wonderful *Bring him home* which as the compère reminded us was the situation during the Great War when there were millions of young men who didn't come home.

In Sue Black's second appearance she sang *We'll gather lilacs*, by Ivor Novello and invited the choir and audience to join in

with her. The Military Wives then returned with another song made famous from the Gareth Malone choir, *Stronger together* and the beautiful *Annie's Song* that John Denver wrote to his former wife. Their contribution concluded with *Rule the World*, a song written and performed by Take That.

To round off this exhilarating evening Sue Black, now dressed from head to toe in a Union flag led both choirs and audience in a second collection of songs sung throughout the war years and with Justin Lewis on trumpet, Land of Hope and Glory and Jerusalem.

All in all a concert which honoured all those young people from that dreadful conflict which changed the face of Europe for ever.

Worcester Male Voice Choir Midlands South West

Huge impact during their very successful 5 day tour to Vernon, France.

In June this year 90 choristers, partners and supporters embarked on a tour to Vernon in France, a commune in the Department of Eure in the Haute -Normandy region. Vernon has a friendship agreement with the City of Worcester but the visit was initiated and meticulously organised by two stalwart members of the choir, Bob Saunders and Chris Horsfall. It was all encouraged by the Worcester Twinning Association who entered into the friendship agreement signed at the Guildhall, Worcester by the respective Mayors of Worcester and Vernon back in 2006. The members of the Vernon Twinning Association provided great assistance in ensuring that the choir had a full and appropriate programme helped undoubtedly by some of our French friends being members of both the twinning association and our French host choir.

2014 was an appropriate time to visit Vernon as it is situated on the banks of the River Seine where in 1944 the First Battalion Worcester Regiment established a bridgehead which led to the eventual liberation of Northern France and the Low Countries. The choir, joined by French civic dignitaries, war veterans, elected representatives and members of the Vernon Twinning Association, met at the English monument at Fontaine de Tilly. The monument is made of Malvern Stone from Worcestershire and commemorates those lost in the liberation of Vernon. Speeches were made by representatives of all parties present and the choir gave a moving rendition of the Mansions of the Lord as well as other pieces such as Bring Him Home and You'll Never Walk Alone. Wreaths were laid by Geoff Ruddock Chairman, the Deputy Mayor of Vernon and other English and French representatives. Prior to the memorial commemoration the choir visited the Church of St Nicholas de Veronnet where they also sung appropriate pieces from their repertoire including Softly as I Leave You and choristers then visited the war graves of soldiers from the Worcestershire Regiment.

During this busy day the choir had already performed at a local school which has links with Stanley Road Primary School, Worcester. Then the choir moved on to a residential and day centre for young people with special needs. A range of popular pieces from our repertoire including *This old Man* and *When I'm 64* were appreciated. In the evening the host choir, Choeur d'Annebault, entertained us to dinner. At this and all the events Geoff Ruddock's excellent command of French and the attentive Vernon Twinning Association hosts ensured a rich friendship was generated throughout the visit and Geoff subsequently commented 'the objectives of the visit for the choir, the two cities and the Twinning Associations were all achieved'.



During the tour an annual country wide event, the 'Fete De La Musique,' took place and the choir were invited to participate at two major Vernon venues. The first was in the attractive gardens at the Au Jardin des Arts Centre where the Archives Tower, the remains of the ancient castle of Vernon, provided an interesting venue for the singing. This was followed by a concert in the Collegiale de Veron, an outstanding example of church architecture and a wonderful place to perform in. The Choir was in great voice and received a standing ovation from the packed audience. A further outstanding concert was held in the same venue the following evening when a joint concert by the Vernon and Worcester Choirs was performed. Nicolas Wright the Musical Director of WMVC commented, 'The Concerts in the Collegiate Church on the Saturday and Sunday were wonderful with the former being exceptional. This tour was something very special and memorable.' On the Sunday the joint singing of Cantique de Jean Racine was special for our choristers as they sang with no music whilst the French Choristers relied on their copies.

The choir's journey home took in one final visit. During 2014 it would not have been appropriate to be in France without also remembering those lost in the 1st World War. The choir visited the Anglo French war

cemetery at Theipval in the Somme. After singing in the Church choristers walked to the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing 72,194 soldiers with no known graves. This Anglo-French Battle memorial is designed as an arch representing the alliance of Britain and France in the Somme offence against the Germans. The choir sang for the final time and laid a wreath to those we all owe so much.

Like most choirs Worcester Male Voice Choir attempts to use all forms of media and its Website and Facebook presence is now well established. Currently its Facebook page has short explanations and several photographs of various aspects of the French tour. These can be viewed at

On our return to the UK the choir visited the Lawns Nursing Home in Kempsey just south of Worcester. It was arranged so that the choir would be able to entertain Derek Chapman a former member of the choir as well as the other residents and staff. This was another outdoor performance and the variety of music was enjoyed by all. The owners of the nursing home have generously sponsored the next choir CD due to be released in late autumn.

An additional engagement was held in July when the choir was invited to sing at the Centenary Celebration of the opening of the internationally famous Morgan Motors Factory in Malvern, Worcestershire. Another open air event with vast crowds of Morgan enthusiasts from all over the world as well as many local people. The outside event is a form which the choir is increasingly experienced in doing and is often a very popular type of occasion. Certainly it was again received very well and members of the management of the Company were near to tears when, accompanying an aircraft fly pass, the choir sang Land of Hope and Glory. To be associated with such an important international company is very important to the choir in terms of recognition, influence and even potential sponsorship.

Finally another new initiative was undertaken this year. Our very own Alan Simmonds, Vice Chairman of the choir (not to be confused with any one else by that name), initiated links with two High Schools; Ridgewood High School, Stourbridge and Chantry High School, Martley. As a result our Deputy Conductor Haydn Thomas had been working for sometime with a group at Ridgewood and with contact having been made with The Chantry, Nicholas Wright MD

devised an evening of singing when students from both schools attending a rehearsal with the choir which included some joint singing. One youngster was independently reported to have been reluctant to attend but after the event confessed to grandparents that the evening was brilliant. In November the choir will have a joint concert with the Chantry High School and we hope that this will encourage new supporters of the choir from parents and grandparents but also new choristers from the students.

Greater Manchester Police Male Voice Choir Cantare Ladies Choir, Rochdale North West

It's been a while since either of the two choirs I conduct has featured in News & Views but our following season will prove to be a very special one for both groups and I wanted to share what we are up to with friends and colleagues.

I have been conducting the Cantare Ladies Choir since August 2011 and the GMPMVC since June 2012. They are both wonderful groups with rich and vibrant histories, both having celebrated milestones recently. The ladies celebrated 30 years last year, and the men celebrated 40 years in June of this year.

Both choirs operate in very different ways. The men undertake many concerts and performances every year (usually more than twenty), entertaining communities across Manchester with male voice repertoire favourites and often raising large amounts of money for local charities. The ladies, similarly, perform for local causes, but take on fewer concerts and aim to do at least one competition a year. We recently won our category at the Mid-Somerset Music Festival in Bath this year singing two unusual and recently written pieces: Andrew Lippa's Hope and Sarah Quartel's Songbird from OUP's new 'Songbird' collection – worth checking out if you are looking for new repertoire!

Looking forward, we have a very ambitious and exciting year in store. The choirs are coming together for a large concert in July 2015 at the newly refurbished RNCM Concert Hall in Manchester to sing some great SATB choral works. Many members of both choirs only have experience of singing in single sex choirs and I wanted to give them the opportunity to sing some of the brilliant music that is available for SATB in addition to their usual repertoire.

We will be performing Fauré's Requiem and Bob Chilcott's A Little Jazz Mass, alongside a new commission from University of Manchester and Royal College of Music alumnus, Chris Roe. We held a composers' competition, inviting samples of music and proposals for a new work to complement the Chilcott and Faure, from composers under 30, with links to the North West. We received some exceptional entries which made judging very difficult. Luckily, we had the expertise of conductor, Manvinder Rattan, and composer, Gabriel Jackson, on hand to assess the applications. Chris's proposal, and the portfolio of works he submitted, demonstrated an excellent understanding of choral writing, as well as having a strong and interesting compositional voice.

Chris will be visiting both choirs soon in order to get to know them better before embarking on composing this new work. It is a really exciting chapter in the history of the choirs. Those who are in the Greater Manchester area, please put 18 July 2015 in your diaries. We hope to see you then.





THE RENAISSANCE OF LEEDS MALE VOICE CHOIR

Leeds Male Voice Choir is in the midst of its most successful year in decades after a spectacular summer concert. Following the triumph of June's 'The Best of British' in Leeds Minster the choir is hard at work on the festively themed 'The Spirit of Christmas' under the direction of the NAC's own Music and Festivals Officer, Tim Knight.

At the helm of Leeds Male Voice Choir since January Tim articulated his vision for the choir at an early stage 'We are just two years away from our centenary and are already developing plans for what is going to be a spectacular year for us'. Instilling a renewed focus and energy into the choir Tim drew on in-house talent to advertise, brand and market the choir and concert using social media and a range of local press, drawing in record audiences. Tim said 'Like all my choirs I wanted the primary focus to be on delivering the highest quality sound. But you can't overlook the importance of attracting as wider audience as possible. 'The Best of British' gave us the opportunity to create an original programme with a popular theme featuring a mixture of music that was both familiar but crucially that offered our audience something new.'

Lee Wallace, who sings in two of Tim's other choirs and joined Leeds Male Voice Choir in 2013 said, 'The choir is buoyant under Tim's direction and his detailed tuition has bolstered the confidence of those newer to singing. He brings a great sense of fun into rehearsals, encouraging





and cajoling us whilst mixing challenging pieces into the repertoire. Concert day was terrific and a three hundred strong audience waving Union flags was quite a sight!'

Tim is keen that the choir tackle a whole range of pieces including the unfamiliar to keep things fresh and relevant: 'I wanted our summer concert to be a spectacular and celebratory affair so we planned musical tour of Great Britain alongside a commemorative look back to 1914 with a number of songs from the First World War'. The Best of British concert in June featured a range of music including All Through the Night, Tydi a Roddaist, Carrickfergus, Highland Cathedral and Jerusalem with Tim's own arrangement of The Skye Boat Song taking centre stage. Songs from the First World War included Keep the Home Fires Burning, Roses of Picardy, Over There, Pack up your Troubles and It's a Long Way to Tipperary. During the Last Night of the Proms style finale, the choir were joined by Leeds' very own Britannia and Leeds Minster was awash with red, white and blue flags and bunting as far as the eye could see. Tim said 'I am delighted with the success of the concert and the enthusiasm and passion it has brought from the choir and our audience has been amazing!'

Formed in 1916 at Broom Colliery in Middleton in Leeds, the choir has been singing across Yorkshire for almost a century. Since the millennium the choir struggled to attract new members, but in recent years there has been a turnaround. Now with a membership in excess of forty, there is an increased interest from established singers in the area and those men seeking to join the choir who are keen to learn to sing. The success of the

Best of British concert and has drawn new members into the choir, both from the audience and the extensive press coverage.



With members aged 19 to 89, the choir attracts a diverse range of men from throughout the city and is proud of its inclusive approach. With a strong use of social media, the choir has been able to draw in many younger members and there is now a gathering momentum leading into their centenary year. Lee said 'We have some fantastic plans for 'The Spirit of Christmas' on 13 December, where we'll be seen and heard as never before. With a different theme for each of our major concerts so we are providing something new each time for our audiences. The journey to 2016 is going to be one hell of a ride'

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Mevagissey Male Choir Cornwall

LIFE AT 40 BEGINS WITH A BANG!

'What a fantastic concert. Everything came together perfectly. Well done everyone.' That was Cornish Guardian columnist Alan Cooper's comment on leaving his seat at Mevagissey Male Choir's 40th Anniversary concert at the Eden Project on 30 May.

Long-serving members of the choir – no fewer than eight founder members took part - said they couldn't remember a concert like it, while our most regular followers said we'd never sung better. And those hearing the choir for the first time professed themselves astonished at the quality.

As the audience took their seats in Eden's Gallery Room, with its glass wall overlooking the world-famous Biomes, they were greeted with a magnificent slide display of the choir's history, masterfully put together by second tenor Des Honey, to the accompaniment of an overture by the Cornish Sinfonia Orchestra.


Mevagissey's music programme, chosen to reflect each of the choir's four decades, began with *Comrades in Arms*, the first song ever sung in concert. This was followed by other favourites, from *Goin'* Home and Verdi's *Speed Your Journey*, to *Whispering Hope* (with soprano Alison Harvey as guest soloist, reprising her CD performance); *Nessun Dorma* and the choir's latest triumph, *Au Fond Du Temple Saint*, the popular aria from Bizet's *The Pearl Fishers*. The audience was brought to its feet several times, including for *Bohemian Rhapsody*,



with guitar accompaniment by choir second tenor Graham Hoskins.

But there was more! Guest artists included the Plymouth Military Wives' Choir, under musical director Rob Young, who sang with great precision and gusto, and Ralph McTell, an old friend of the Choir whose Streets of London smash hit was enjoying its own 40-year anniversary. He led the choir in the song that made him famous. The Cornish Sinfonia, directed by David Frost, accompanied the Choir on many pieces, as well as playing a number or two from their own repertoire and the whole was compèred admirably by Nick Hart, former MD of the County of Cornwall Male Voice Choir and Loveny Male Voice Choir, and a great friend to Mevagissey for many

The concert concluded with a rousing version of *Morte Criste* by the choir and the PMWC in unison, a fitting finale to the evening. Although of course, it wasn't over. Singers and audience had a couple of hours in very delightful surroundings to



And yet, in the afternoon, it had all looked so unpromising. Our rehearsal with the orchestra threw up one problem after another. Had we bitten of more than we could chew? It required all the musical expertise of Graham Willcocks and David Frost, and the technical knowhow of sound engineer John Cornfield from Sawmills Studio, to overcome the numerous difficulties; but overcome them they did and the 400-strong audience got a show.

Going Down a Storm at The Minack

Three weeks earlier, Mevagissey and the Military Wives were entertaining a full house of 700 at Cornwall's Minack Theatre. This time, though, we decided to seek the services of a respected professional recording specialist, Steve Swinden, (Chorum Records), and when we arrived at Appledore Community Primary School - our usual rehearsal venue - he had duly transformed the hall with baffles and microphones, into a recording studio, complete with red light.

Our Musical Director, Pam Beechey, conducted us whilst her husband, Chris, accompanied us on the piano - occasionally swapping roles when Chris and another 'husband of', Anthony - joined our small close harmony group, 'The Pips', to provide the bass line for three numbers.

Following a mention of our choir in the 2011 Spring Issue of News and Views we were fortunate enough to have been invited to take part in the Festival of Brass and Voices 2012 at the Royal Albert Hall, leaving many of us with enough happy memories to last a lifetime.

As a busy and in demand choir we do not have a lot of time to rest on our laurels as we seem always to be rehearsing and preparing for yet another challenge, and the past three years have been busy ones for us, helping, with our concerts to raise money for many well deserved causes. The ceremonial Mayor of Hartlepool paid our choir the compliment of hosting a civic reception on two occasions as a thank you for our efforts in helping to raise a large sum of money for his local charities.

The Musical Director of our choir, David Gibson, who also directs the other well known Hartlepool Male Voice Choir is to be honoured for his dedicated work in promoting choral music in the area, and will be made a Freeman of the town which of course confers many privileges, not least of which is the right to graze his sheep on the Town Moor.

Among the many performances we have been involved with during the recent past have included a concert at the Sage, Gateshead, combined appearances with the Male Voice Choir as well as our own summer concerts which have now become a feature of the Hartlepool summer season. The most fun and relaxed evening was on the occasion of a fiftieth wedding celebration for one of our members, when we took part in a 'flash mob' event, much to the astonishment of the hundreds of guests and the surprise and pleasure of the happy couple.

In the coming months we look forward to taking part in several concert performances at various churches and other venues in and around Hartlepool, in particular one in aid of the charity Lepra, now in its ninetieth year and doing a lot of good work in helping to raise funds to aid in the control and spread of the crippling disease of leprosy.

As the start of the First World War is remembered nationally, here in Hartlepool the Bombardment of the town in December 1914 will also be



commemorated, as it was the first town in mainland Britain to be shelled from the sea by the German Navy, resulting in the deaths of 112 men, women and children, and over 200 casualties, as well as killing Theo Jones who is acknowledged to be the first British soldier to die on British soil in the Great War. A concert to commemorate this historic event will be held in December featuring our ladies choir as well as the Hartlepool Male Voice Choir, respectfully remembering in song the bravery of those who faced the onslaught of 1000 shells fired during the 45 minutes it took to wreak such devastation and death.

Looking ahead to 2015 our diary is filling up nicely and plans are already in hand for return concerts to the Sage as well as a much anticipated visit to the Royal Albert Hall for the Festival of Brass and Voices, where it is hoped old friendships will be renewed and new ones forged.

- Then say the NAC group your choir is in.
- Write your article.
- Say who has written it.
- Quotes use single speech marks (same key as @ but without the shift).
- Dates do not include st nd rd or th
- Abbreviations do not have full stops.
- Song titles are shown in *italics*.
- Do not put photos in the text.

- Don't use am or pm in times.
- Unless the word 'choir' is part of a title it should NOT have a capital letter.
- Your choir is singular so 'the choir is' not 'the choir are'.

Send me pictures as high res ipegs of between 1 and 5Mb or more, minimum 300 dpi.

Attach them to an email.

If this is hard to understand then ring me and I'll talk you through it.

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
