





Highfield Male Voice Choir Wales North / Cheshire West

Based in Runcorn, Highfield Male Voice Choir was formed in 1911. The name comes from the original Highfield Tanning Company and our choir emblem shows three figures carrying 'bends' of leather – each 'bend' consisting of half an animal hide after tanning. Of course the Tannery has been closed for many years but the choir survived and last year celebrated being in existence for 100 years.

Being based in Runcorn, the choir mainly performs around the Runcorn / Widnes and North Cheshire area but concerts have been performed further afield and the choir has performed on tours in France, Germany, Holland, Ireland, Spain and Malta.

In the UK the choir would typically perform 12-15 concerts per year. Over the years the choir has performed at some very distinguished venues including the Royal Albert Hall, Manchester's Bridgewater Hall, Glasgow's City Hall and Liverpool's Philharmonic Hall.

In 2012 the choir celebrated its centenary year with a number of special events including joint concerts with Port Talbot MVC and Warrington MVC. Also in 2012 the choir appointed new Musical Director, Gary Hill. Gary had previously sung with and subsequently conducted the Haydock Male Voice Choir. His appointment has given the choir new impetus and certainly audience reaction to our concerts with Gary conducting have been very encouraging.

In 2013 the choir has its annual Spring and Autumn concerts at Runcorn's Brindley Theatre, as well as appearing at Liverpool's St. George's Hall.

Dursley Male Voice Choir Souht West

Christmas is just a few days away as this report is being produced and, as with many choirs, the recent weeks have been a busy time for us. Singing at residential homes and local hostelries are all grist to the mill for Dursley MVC but in addition to this we sang in the Westonbirt Arboretum and the Regent Arcade, Cheltenham.

All of this, of course, prior to the two concerts the choir traditionally holds the weekend before Christmas. The latter were a huge success being a total sell out on both evenings with well over 600 tickets sold. This is very reassuring in constrained times but in reality normal for the occasion. The people of Dursley and the surrounding area are superb supporters of the choir. So what songs do today's audiences want to listen to?

Audiences have always wanted to hear songs with good tunes that they can identify with. Keeping things fresh and vibrant is fun for both choir and audience, and I believe that means embracing songs from different genres.

I'm amused by a view that I believe is unfounded and fundamentally a wrong, that 'lighter' music is not of the same quality as the more 'serious' classical/traditional repertoire. To sing a pop or musical theatre song well can be just as difficult, in technical terms as well as interpretation, as singing a more 'classical' piece.

A dynamic repertoire also encourages new members to join a choir and creates bigger audiences, so avoiding new songs and sticking to the traditional may be very worthy, but unless change is embraced, there will be nothing to pass on to the next generation

Dynamic and engaging performances are paramount to the continuation of choral singing. Indeed that should really read, the continuation of any form of musical performance. How many concerts have you sat through wishing the choristers would communicate the meaning of the song and their enjoyment of singing. It's a shame but many choral performances can be very self indulgent.

With the exposure TV is giving choral singing, we are all being judged. Are we smiling? Are we communicating? Your audience is expecting to be entertained with engaging performances, so whatever your song choice, be prepared to reach out with your music!

Airedale Male Voice Choir Yorkshire West

The Airedale Male Voice Choir was formed in March 1997 when its conductor and accompanist, John Smith and Ken Brook, respectively, decided once again to weave their magic together. The choir is intentionally small, with a maximum of 50 members, but is of high quality and produces a beautiful yet resonant tone. Music critics have acclaimed its musicality and tender tonal qualities. It has taken tremendous strides in a relatively short time, and is in great demand for concerts not only in its native West Yorkshire, but also in North Yorkshire and East Yorkshire.

Every year the choir holds its charity concert



in aid of the local hospice 'Manorlands' with is part of the Sue Ryder Foundation and Michael Binns the community fundraiser, for the organisation says 'We are extremely grateful for the choir's support every year as we need to raise over £1 million in voluntary contributions every year'. The choir has produced

a CD called 'Music for Manorlands' in honour of the hospice and all of the proceeds goes to support the work. John Smith the choir leader comes from a



family where music was a 'way of life'. He was first introduced to choral music as a young boy when he was taken, along with his two brothers, to Wesley Place Church in Keighley, were the choir is now based, to listen to such oratorios as the Messiah, Elijah and The Creation. At 17 John joined the Keighley Vocal Union and, under the baton of his father, sang in such festivals as the world famous Llangollen Eisteddfod. John picked up the baton in 1976 and after some early nerves, conducting has given him great pleasure. His obvious love and understanding of music has inspired and encouraged all those under his leadership.

Their repertoire is constantly growing and is as diverse in its choice as it is in expression and performance – Mozart and McCartney, Porter and Puccini, operatic choruses, folk songs, spirituals, hymn tunes and songs from the shows, from the rousing sounds of *Nessun Dorma* to the sensitive yet equally thrilling *Sanctus* from Schubert's German Mass, and the poignant message in *You Raise Me Up*.

Ken Brook was born in Leeds, but quickly realised his mistake and insisted, at 18 months of age, that the family moved to Huddersfield, a town with a long established choral tradition. From the age of eight he dutifully attended piano lessons each Saturday morning, and it was not long before he was appointed to the position of Hon Pianist at Dalton St Paul's Methodist Sunday School. In his teens he played for a local teacher of singing, where he obtained a thorough grounding in the art of accompanying and has played for male voice choirs, ladies choirs, girls choirs, children's choirs, amateur operatic societies, a dance band and numerous solo artistes.

The choir's priority is to raise money for local charities and other causes. It has been successful in raising nearly £100,000

in the first 12 years of its existence.

The choir has something to offer music lovers of all kinds. It will try to stir your emotions, entertain you and send you home from every concert feeling better for having heard it.

Anston Male Voice Choir Yorkshire South

40 years of community singing

2012 will be remembered by most for the London Olympics and the Queen's Jubilee but for many of the inhabitants of Anston in South Yorkshire it will be remembered also for the 40th anniversary of Anston Male Voice Choir.

It all started in October 1971 when David Ward, a young music teacher and recent local inhabitant, enticed a small group of singers to an inaugural meeting and in due course Anston Male Voice Choir, with his wife Lesley as the accompanist, became a reality. When David and Lesley left the district Ben Burgess, another local music teacher, became the new Musical Director accompanied on piano by his wife Winifred Pierce. It is known that Ben commented to Winifred 'I don't know what I'm going to do with that lot', predicting that he would need seven years to knock them into a singing unit worthy of carrying the name. But their hard work, dedication and perseverance paid off. Subsequently, James Thompson followed by Wilf Clarke took up the baton until Howard Thomas became the choir's present MD in 1989 supported by Cynthia Herrington its very gifted accompanist.

40 years on the choir is as strong as ever with around 35 singing members, including one of the original line-up, drawn from the immediate environs as well as Worksop, Retford, Sheffield, Doncaster and Rossington. During an average year it takes part in up to 20

concerts and has performed at around 80 local and distant venues including Sheffield City Hall, York Minster, Liverpool Cathedral, The G Mex Centre, Free Trade Hall in Manchester and The Royal Albert Hall in London, providing much needed support to Bluebell Wood Children's Hospice in the process. It has even ventured to foreign parts including St Quentin, Rotherham's twin town in France and has now made four visits to Germany.

In September this year, the choir held its 40th Annual Concert at The Crossing in Worksop with special guests, Steeton Male Voice Choir from Skipton. It was a sell-out event that everyone felt privileged to be a part of, and included musical interludes by local soprano, Honor Whitfield, a category winner at the 2012 Worksop Music and Drama Festival, and guest organist Simon Corner. The choir's 2013 concert programme is already looking busy, and one special date eagerly anticipated is 16 November, when Anston Male Voice Choir will join with seven other regional choirs and the Band of the Royal Marines, in the 'Sounds Sensational' concert at The Royal Concert Hall, Nottingham.

The Choir holds its rehearsals on Thursday evenings at Anston Parish Hall, between 7.00 and 9.00. New members are always welcome and each is given a settling-in period of two or more months before full membership is decided. Being a community choir there is no audition and the enjoyment of singing to a reasonable standard is considered more important than an

Sue is well known to many choirs for the master-class she ran at the NAC National Conference in Bristol some years ago. Mendip Male Voice Choir South West

Mendip Male Voice Choir came into existence just 6 years ago, but it has a history of 93 years.

On 12 September 1919 a group of men met in the Temperance Hall in the Somerset Village of Timsbury with the purpose of forming a new male voice choir. The choir would be called Timsbury Male Voice Choir. They starting meeting once a week on Fridays in the Church rooms and charged a fee of 2d (old pence) per week. It is unknown exactly how many members there were in those days, but the minute books name at least 17. Oliver Janes was elected as the conductor, starting an association with the choir that lasted over 60 years and two generations.

The first performance was in St Mary's Church, Timsbury on 10 April 1920 and they gave 18 performances in their first year, mostly in local churches and chapels.

The choir grew in reputation and numbers throughout the next three decades with a break of a few years during the 1940s as many members went to help their country. Resuming in 1944, the choir continued under the direction of Oliver Janes until 1951 when he retired and his son, Ken, took over. Ken led the choir for another 34 years. Then Brian Attwood, one of the baritones, was elected to the post in 1985. Brian was still in charge up until 2003. Numbers during that time varied between 30 and 40 members and concerts were performed in many local venues, not only in churches as had been the case before. As well as this, the repertoire had widened during this time and besides singing many of the older male voice pieces the choir sang more modern pieces such as the medley Back to the sixties which included House of the Rising Sun and He ain't heavy he's my brother.

After 18 years conducting, Brian decided to retire to the Baritone section and handed over to Kate Courage on 1 Sept 2003. At the time the membership had dwindled to 28, Kate set several targets for the choir and herself in terms of performance standard, range of venues and, vitally, increased membership. In the last nine years she has met all her targets and now the choir boasts nearly 80 members, quite a few of whom are still at school or university. The choir has instituted a regular annual weekend trip away to perform somewhere in England or

Wales and has sung in Bath Abbey, Clifton Cathedral, Glastonbury Abbey supporting Katherine Jenkins, the Albert Hall and many other prestigious venues.

Kate is musically trained and brought with her lots of contacts from the local music scene, first introducing the choir to some of her young students who delighted the audience by performing solos with us at Bishops Lydeard, (the village at the start of the West Somerset Railway). Subsequently one of her young soloists was adopted by the choir and Hannah Lockwood, at the time a student at Bath Spa University, has been the regular soloist for nearly 8 years. In 2006, when Margaret Russell, the accompanist, decided it was time to retire, Kate brought another Bath Spa student into the choir and Carl Speck joined as the accompanist. Carl is a virtuoso performer with a wicked sense of fun; he is also a hard task master when taking on the mantle of assistant conductor and leading separate section rehearsals. When Carl graduated, he made the decision to apply for teaching posts locally so that he could continue playing for the choir.

The really big change came in 2006; with member numbers now approaching 50 drawn from a much wider area it was decided to change the name of the choir to reflect this catchment and the Timsbury Male Voice Choir became the Mendip Male Voice Choir. Shortly afterwards the choir had its first website www.mendipmen.co.uk

Numbers continued to grow and the choice of music became more catholic, including quite a few of Kate's own compositions or arrangements. One piece, Shining, she composed specifically to support the local Children's Hospice South West. The choir recorded a CD with this piece and all profits from the sale of the CD go to support the work of the Hospice. In addition the piece was published by BaBa Productions in three arrangements for male, female and mixed choirs; again all royalties going to the charity. Audiences at the choir's concerts were also growing during this time so many of the choir's formerly regular venues became unavailable as the choir needed bigger concert halls.

During 2010 the choir celebrated its 90th year with a year of special events, the highlight of which was a concert with three Welsh choirs in Bath Abbey. The following year the choir was invited to support Katherine Jenkins at the Glastonbury Extravaganza held in the grounds of Glastonbury Abbey. The evening was

notable for the heavy downpour which somehow did not deter the audience under their umbrellas! Of course the choir was under cover on the stage and thus did not suffer at all, they just had the best experience singing to this large audience and then when the rain had stopped they had the pleasure of hearing Katherine singing. Bringing readers up to date the 2012 Diamond Jubilee year included many patriotic pieces and culminated in a performance at the Royal Albert Hall in November with over 1500 voices as part of the Festival of Brass and Voice in aid of Cancer Research UK.

Next summer the choir has chosen the theme 'A Summer Of Love' which will be enjoyed with all their usual enthusiasm even though it will sadly be the last year under the baton of Kate Courage. After 9 years with the choir Kate has decided to move on to pastures new and will be leaving on 30 Aug 2013, the tenth anniversary of her appointment. Sportingly she has given the choir 12 months notice so they are now advertising for a replacement with the musical knowledge and charisma to take up the gauntlet left by Kate. The position will be advertised in the press, locally and nationally in January. The choir is always recruiting new members and any readers in the South West region who would like to join are invited to come along to one of the choir's rehearsals on a Monday evening at St Mary's School Timsbury.


The Dalesmen Male Voice Choir Midlands East

A Superb Sing-Out Swing-Out Sell-Out! 25th Anniversary Concert

On Saturday 3 November in the Derby Assembly Rooms a sell-out audience of around one thousand people from all over the East Midlands and as far away as the North East of England enjoyed a wonderful musical night of scintillating singing and playing. 'The best night's entertainment I've had in years'; 'I couldn't stop clapping' and 'Just superb, I can't wait for the next time this show comes to town' were just a few of the enthusiastic audience reactions after the concert. The singing came from 160 men from the Dalesmen Male Voice Choir and four invited choirs from Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire. The music was courtesy of the Syd Lawrence Orchestra, led by Chris Dean and accomplished accompanists to the Dalesmen Male Voice Choir.

This superb Anniversary Charity Concert, compered by James Roberson of BBC TV (and recorded with a clip broadcast to millions on national and local BBC TV), was held to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the formation of the Dalesmen Male Voice Choir in 1987, now based in Belper, Derbyshire, also to celebrate the 110th Birthday of the UK's oldest man and cofounder of the Dalesmen, the Rev Reg Dean, who was born on the 4 November 1902 in Staffordshire. The charity concert also helped raise much needed funds in support of that most worthwhile of charities Derby and Derbyshire AGE-UK (formed from Age Concern and Help the Aged in 2009)

The voices supporting the Dalesmen were from our friends in Chesterfield, Eastwood, Mansfield and Melbourne Male Voice





Choirs, conducted by Richard Hayward, MD of the Dalesmen. The accompanists were Bill Templeman on piano and Lizzie Hayward on organ.

The Syd Lawrence Orchestra, led by Chris Dean, the son of Dalesmen President Reg Dean, played a wonderful foot-tapping selection of favourites from the 'Big Band' era and 'the joint was jumping' as they would have said in that era!

The massed choirs started the concert with the powerful Let All Men Sing which got the concert off with a bang - so appropriate on Bonfire weekend. Two songs followed with an American flavour; the spiritual My Lord What a Morning and a favourite of America's Deep South with Confederacy tones An American Trilogy. All songs were acclaimed by rapturous applause from an appreciative audience which continued when Chris Dean's musicians played their big band sound. Chris then played us all a recorded message from his father saying that he hoped we were enjoying the concert. The SLO continued with In the Mood, a Glenn Miller classic, and Peanut Vendor. Chris and his vocalist Angie Mills sang several numbers including a Lionel Richie song *Truly*. There were several great solos from the orchestra amongst them Colin Skinner on lead alto sax.

We were entertained by two faultless piano solos from Eleanor Kornas. Eleanor is the worthy winner of the Dalesmen Student Award 2012. This award helps music students with financial support (this year £500) in higher education. Eleanor is 18 years old and now reading music at Trinity College Cambridge as their Junior Music Scholar. Eleanor wishes to pursue a career in the music profession, which judging by her performance she should surely

be able to follow with aplomb. Eleanor played Adagio Cantabile-Op 13 Pathetique by Beethoven and My Favourite Things by Richard Rodgers to great applause. She was then presented with the Dalesmen Student Award Trophy and a beautiful bouquet of flowers by Chris Dean.

The audience then sang Happy Birthday to Reg on his 110th Birthday and to the Dalesmen on our 25th.

We then heard more from the 160 male voices. *All in the April Evening* our President's favourite; *Gwahoddiad* a Welsh hymn and *You'll Never Walk Alone* by Rodgers and Hammerstein from Carousel, now a modern anthem.

After a short Interval the massed choirs sang, amongst others, another favourite Welsh hymn *Llanfair* and *You raise me up* a modern classic ballad also performed by Westlife. This was followed by The Syd Lawrence Orchestra entertaining us with swing-era standards such as Moonlight Serenade, The Midnight Sun Never Sets and Begin the Beguine including solos from Angie Mills. The finale rounded the concert off with the massed choirs being accompanied by the Syd Lawrence Orchestra for renditions of Unchained Melody, Softly as I Leave You and The Nearness of You all of which were rapturously received by the one thousand people in the Assembly Rooms. Chris then played another wonderful recording he had obtained earlier of his father Reg Dean wishing us all best and saying he hoped to be around to see us on his 111th birthday. This playing and the message warmed-up the still very enthusiastic audience for the fantastic final number. Everyone joined in a truly show stopping rendition of Land of Hope and Glory which was rapturously applauded.

Richard Hayward, Musical Director of The Dalesmen, who conducted the massed choirs, said 'This superb concert tonight was the culmination of my aims for The Dalesmen when I became MD 20 months ago. It was superb and is recognition of all the hard work put in by all The Dalesmen. I see our progress as a journey and tonight's wonderful concert is just one milestone amongst many more that I am sure we will reach if we continue practising as hard as we have been doing'. Fortunately for all concerned, the audience as well as performers, a DVD will soon be available from The Dalesmen so we can all re-live such a wonderful and truly enjoyable night.

Our thanks go to all those in the Dalesmen who worked so hard to make this such a successful event; the Dalesmen Committee members, John England, Stuart Crosskill, Paul Sheward and Rod Straw; also to our sponsors for the evening, Morrisons supermarkets in Belper and Derby. Thanks also to Dalesman David Weston who initiated the sponsorship with Morrisons and many gained other supporting sponsors, as well as some great raffle prizes and Paul Wilde who made an important contribution on sponsorship. Thanks of



course must go to Richard Hayward our Musical Director and conductor for the night as well as to John Lloyd our Assistant MD, our accompanists on the night Bill Templeman on piano and his wife Mary and Lizzie Hayward on the organ as well as to our regular accompanist Patricia Affleck and not forgetting the 'Dalesmen Ladies' who worked so hard selling programmes and raffle tickets. Our appreciation of course must also go to Chris Dean for bringing his wonderful orchestra and adding a real swing and spice to the evening. Lastly our thanks go to all The Dalesmen who sang on the night and all our fellow choristers from the four invited choirs all contributing to making our 25th Anniversary Concert such a success.

Like the Queen's jubilee and the great summer of sport we have all enjoyed, the choir's year ended with a great degree of satisfaction and pleasure. As in previous years The Phoenix was heavily involved in Christmas celebrations. As a prelude to the Christmas season, the choir performed at Cadder Freestone Masonic Lodge in Bishopbriggs with a St Andrew's Night concert, which was very well received by the audience. Almost immediately after we launched into three Christmas concerts - in Moncrieff Parish Church, East Kilbride; Freemasons' Hall in Edinburgh (both of which concerts are now annual events by request) and finally our annual Christmas Concert in the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall all three of which were staged within a week

The culmination of 2012's events was no less thrilling than on previous occasions, where we were joined by the Co-operative Funeralcare Band (formerly the Scottish Wholesale Cooperative Society Band) and the Aberdeen Chorus of Sweet Adelines International. The band (current holders of the Scottish Open Championship) which like us are sponsored by The Co-operative Funeralcare are firm favourites of choir and audience alike and performed two brilliant sets of wonderful music including Prokofiev favourite Troika and two rousing pieces by Paul Ovatt Cooper, You've Been Warned and an up-tempo version of Three Kings - appropriately entitled Three Kings Swing.

In a new departure from our usual Christmas guests, we were delighted to host fifty ladies of The Aberdeen Chorus of Sweet Adelines International whose sonorous tones as they performed their barber-shop routines delighted our audience. Their beautiful scarlet gowns were set off against the white jackets and black dresses of the choir together with

the band's making a great splash of colour over the packed platform.

Accompanist, Cameron Murdoch, was surprised and thrilled to receive a gift from the choir celebrating his twenty five years of faithful service to the Phoenix. Choir President - Janette Walker called him forward to receive a silver Quaich (a Scottish two-handled drinking vessel) and a twenty-five year old bottle of a Highland Park, a special single malt whisky. The President praised his dedication to which he suitably replied. Conductor - Marilyn Smith then invited Cameron - Accompanist and Deputy Conductor to conduct choir and audience in Oh Come All Ye Faithful. With a quiet smile, he commanded the audience - 'Stand'.

The Phoenix's 35th recording *The Glory of Christmas* was released at the concert and is expected to sell well.

Being the end of 2012, Marilyn Smith thanked the members for their dedication and commitment throughout the year which had been one of the busiest years in the choir's sixty one years. Many members are far travelled to rehearsals. Fourteen have round trips of over 40 miles whilst one Alto - Louise McCormack has a round trip of 180 miles travelling from Angus in the East. She drives to Dundee rail station and takes the train to Glasgow (around one and a half hours). Accompanist Cameron Murdoch travels from Kilcreggan on the Firth of Clyde - a round trip of 88 miles and Marie Graham (Soprano) who lives in Dunoon (also on the Firth of Clyde), although only 66 miles, includes a half hour sea trip. In stormy weather she wouldn't be able to make it to the rehearsal. The total mileage clocked up by the top fourteen farthest travelled amounts to 1,046 miles. That really is dedication.

The new year will bring more challenges for the members with concerts scheduled for Erskine Rotary, Kirkintilloch, Ayr, Glasgow Royal Concert Hall, Arran, a tour to the north and Orkney which includes concerts in Dornoch, St Magnus Cathedral in Kirkwall, the Italian Chapel and Thurso West Parish and finishing the season with a proposed visit from Northampton Male Voice Choir with joint concerts in East Kilbride, Glasgow and Largs. Phew!


Some traditional Male voice songs were augmented by audience participation in a

FUN Finale

Golden Rules for Ensemble Singing

- 1. Everyone should sing the same piece.
- 2. Take your time turning pages.
- Do not worry if you do not have perfect pitch you may find singing less stressful without it!
- 4. The right note at the wrong time is the wrong note.
- 5. The wrong note at the right time is still a wrong note.
- 6. A wrong note sung timidly is still a wrong note.
- 7. A wrong note sung with authority is an interpretation.
- 8. A true interpretation is realized when not one note of the original remains.

- 9. If you happen to sing a wrong note, give a nasty look to one of your neighbours.
- 10. If everyone gets lost except you, follow those who get lost.
- 11. If you are completely lost, stop everyone and start an argument about repeat marks.
- 12. Strive to achieve the maximum notes per second - that way you at least gain the admiration of the totally incompetent.
- 13. If a passage is difficult, slow it down. If it is easy, speed it up. Everything will work itself out in the end.
- 14. Markings for slurs, dynamics, ornaments and breathing should be ignored. They are only there to embellish the score.
- 15. When everyone else has finished singing, you should not sing any notes you may still have left.

- Then say the NAC group your choir is in.
- Write your article.
- Say who has written it.
- Quotes use single speech marks (same key as @ but without the shift).
- Dates do not include st nd rd or th
- Abbreviations do not have full stops.
- Song titles are shown in italics.

- Do not put photos in the text.
- Don't use am or pm in times
- Unless the word 'choir' is part of a title it should NOT have a capital letter.
- Your choir is singular so 'the choir is' not 'the choir are'.

Send me pictures as high res .jpegs of between 1 and 5Mb or more.

Attach them to an email.
