

W. A. Mozart - Requiem

The Requiem Mass in D minor (KV 626) by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart is his final composition. Even though only two-thirds actually originate from Mozart himself, it is one of his best loved and admired works. Mozart died while writing the Mass. The piece

was completed by his two students, Eybler and Süßmayr. The genesis and quality of later additions have been hotly debated for a long time. The strange circumstances in which the work was commissioned, and the chronological connection between this requiem mass and Mozart's rather early death has also inspired countless legends.

On Lake Garda the International Oratorio Choir will be using the rehearsal rooms.

The lake presents a wonderful spectacle of natural luminescence and colours for an unforgettable musical event.

The concert will be held in Riva del Garda (Italy) on 17 October 2015 within the context of the 9th International Lago di Garda Music Festival.

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Alfreton Male Voice Choir Midlands East Group

The Early Days

Alfreton Male Voice Choir was formed at the turn of the 20th century but the actual date is not known. The year 1903 has been suggested but the earliest mention in the local press is in 1917. The conductor at that time was Mr John Haslam. The choir's most productive early period was in the 1940s-1960s under conductor Mr Albert Walton, including a win at Blackpool Festival and a notable 3rd at Llangollan.

The Middle Period

In 1971 the choir amalgamated with Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir to form The Erewash Valley MVC under Mr Alan Lindley (conductor of 'Pye Hill'), who tragically collapsed and died on stage at Brownhills Music Festival shortly after the amalgamation. Following Alan's death some of the former members of 'Pye Hill' who felt uncomfortable in the new choir left and reformed 'Pye Hill' which is still going. Alan was succeeded by Mr Roy Annable (deputy conductor), Mr Joseph Clarke and Mr Bert Haddon.

In 1976 Mr Frank C Smith became our conductor and we took the opportunity to change our name to Alfreton & District Male Voice Choir (the 'and District' being added to reflect the 1971 'Pye Hill' connection and the greater catchment area for members). We had some notable success during his tenure including Bidulph Music Festival. During his time with us he also became the conductor of Alfreton Ladies Choir and founder conductor of Alfreton Choral Society (now The Alfreton Singers) with some members from the 'Ladies' and 'Male' choirs. In 1988 because of the deteriorating health of his wife he sadly relinquished the post. Frank was asked to be one of our Vice Presidents which he accepted. Frank was succeeded by Mr John Wheatley.

Into the 21st Century

In 1997 we were lucky to obtain the services of Mr Louis Spencer who has built the choir



up to its present high standard. In 2000 we hosted a visit by the Polperro Fishermen's Choir from Cornwall returning the visit in November of the same year. In 2001 and in May 2002 we hosted a visit by Betws-Yn-Rhos MVC from Colwyn Bay in North Wales. At our Centenary Concert on 27-9-03 Louis retired as Musical Director. All the members wish him a happy retirement. Louis consented to be a Vice-President of the choir.

Kathryn Haslam took over from Louis, leaving the choir in March 2006 and our Deputy Musical Director Mr Alan Randall took over until March 2007.

The Present



Our Musical Director is Mr. Terry Clay TD a widely experienced director. We are fortunate to have two experienced accompanists, Lisa Smith and Michael who do a tremendous job.

In 2008 we applied for and were awarded a grant from the National Lottery Awards for All scheme. This has enabled us to replace

our uniform, a new keyboard and to buy new music.

A suggestion was made that we simplify our name, it was agreed to change the name to Alfreton Male Voice Choir.

In April 2009 we were granted charity status.

The scheme of annual charity concerts started in 2011 with a nominated charity identified.

In 2011 and 2012 the choir supported Cancer Research.

In 2013 the nominated charity was the 'Mending Broken Hearts' appeal of the British Heart Foundation.

This year (2014) our concert was entitled "Lest we forget" and all proceeds were donated to The Alfreton Branch of the Royal British Legion. The programme also featured the Shirland Brass Band and Lily Taylor-Ward (a very talented young soprano). The programme featured music and songs from the First World War. It was a huge success and voted the highlight of the evening was the audience participation when they joined Lily, the band and the choir in a joint performance of First World War songs. The paper programme that was issued free on the night contained a full roll of honour for Alfreton's fallen in the First World War 1914 - 1918. Please see photograph taken at the concert. The grand total of the donation to the Royal British Legion was £1,000.

Looking forward we have now decided that with effect from 2015 we shall have two major concerts every year April and October. We shall be committing to more concerts with other choirs. Also next year we are looking forward to participating in a major choral event at the Albert Hall in London.



Les Dorey Publicity Officer If you look carefully at the choir photograph you will notice, as I did, that there is a babe in arms in the lap of the choir's accompanist, Lisa Smith. I contacted Les to ask about the baby as I was intrigued.

I learned that this is Amelia, born on 28 March 2013, weighing in at 9lbs 13oz. Marvellous, we share the same birthday. Here is Zoe, the latest edition, born on the 9th August 2014, weighing in at 7lbs 11oz. Neither are eligible to join the choir but, I understand that Lisa's other children are, Joel 4 and Ethan 3.

CHOIR RULES IN THE GOOD OLD DAYS 1915

The practice shall commence at 8.30 or at such later time as a sufficient number shall have gathered together. Members are thought more of if they arrive late.

The choir meets one evening a week for the following purposes: to discuss politics, tennis, scandal, or church affairs; to arrange socials, excursions, etc., and to flirt. NB – If there is any time not occupied in the foregoing manner, and if the members feel inclined, it might be desirable to have a little singing.

The choir shall consist of sopranos, altos, tenors, and basses. All those ladies who cannot read music shall sing alto. Should any lady with a high voice object to singing alto, she is recommended to consult a voice specialist, who will be almost certain to pronounce her a deep contralto, with a faulty method of production.

The tenors shall consist of many fair gentlemen, who do not mind straining their voices. All the gentlemen left over are required to sing bass.


Basses are at liberty to sing tenor, if they feel that their extensive compass is not duly

recognised. He must be a poor worm of a bass who cannot sing tenor if he likes.

No notice should be taken of the conductor. Do not trouble to look at his beat. He should tap. What your next door neighbour is saying is sure to be of greater interest to you.

The conductor is always pleased to receive advice from individual members. He likes to receive hints as to choir management, suggestions as to tempo and expression, and is delighted to be instructed in the elements of musical grammar. If you think he has made a mistake, tell him so!

Members of the choir are recommended to take home copies of music to look over at their leisure. It really doesn't matter if they don't bring them back, because choir funds are usually in a flourishing condition, and more copies can always be bought.







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Letter from NAC in Oz

Happy New Year! May 2015 bring you peace, contentment and harmony.

It's at this time of year that the differences in climate in Australia compared to the UK become so obvious. Christmas and New Year in the summer do not sit easily when we are



used to the Northern Hemisphere winter. Traditional Christmas fare also seems out of place and we have now adopted the fish approach for meals on Christmas Day. So it was Salmon and prawns for our family at lunch time followed by a visit to the beach at Manly. Some of us swam while others walked along the water's edge paddling and managing to get our shorts wet. I was a paddler!

You may have read or seen on TV that the bushfire season has started with Victoria and South Australia being the first states to suffer. Many homes have been lost but, thankfully, no major injuries. Firefighters have been battling with 100 kph winds and temperatures over 40° C.

I mentioned in my last letter that I had joined another choir, the Men's Shed Chorale. I'm not sure how well the Men's Shed movement is known in the UK, although I'm sure it exists. It has long been a tradition in Australia that every man had his shed which was a hideaway from the cares of domesticity - sorry ladies I'm not sure of a female equivalent. This has blossomed in the last few years so that there is now a national network of Men's Sheds where men meet to undertake various activities woodworking, metal work, electrical work, etc using communally owned equipment and gaining knowledge from other Men's Shed members.

Two ex-members of the Sydney Male Choir approached the association to see if there was any interest in choral activities. Despite the pessimism of the association the Men's Shed Chorale was formed and now has almost 30 members. We are led by maestro Alan Thrift who was MD at the Sydney Male Choir for over 20 years and he has made it possible for us to produce a good mellow male choir sound.

All of the members are ex or current Sydney Male Choir members and we enjoy being together again with the camaraderie that brings. We have a less stressful schedule now, meeting every two weeks in the morning followed by lunch at a local club – very civilised. We sing at local churches, retirement villages and our last gig in 2014 was the dedication of a healing garden at Sydney Adventist Hospital.



This will be the fifth joint concert that the Thames South Group has staged and at each one it has supported a different charity with the proceeds from the raffle and retiring collection. Over the years we have donated well over £1000 to worthy organisations in our region. This year we are supporting Hounds for Heroes who provide specially trained assistance dogs to injured and disabled men and women of both the UK Armed Forces and Emergency Services. Through this provision they aim to provide help and practical support leading to an enhanced quality of life.

Conference is fun. After checking in on the Friday afternoon the weekend begins with a Gala Dinner followed by entertainment

So, why come to Worthing? This is a lovely seaside town, close to Brighton to the east and Chichester and Arundel to the west and bordered by the South Downs National Park to the north. Worthing itself has a lovely pier with a recently refurbished Southern Pavilion in art deco style where you can eat, drink (and be merry too if you wish) whilst appreciating the sea views. The Chatsworth Hotel is in the centre of town enabling you to abandon your car and walk everywhere. All the facilities that you will need for the weekend are within short walking distance. Christmas is past and the New Year is underway. It is time to turn our attention to the Annual Conference in Worthing by the sea. Some of you have already paid deposits for

the conference and a few have sent full amounts to me.

Now is the time to ensure your place as delegates at this year's conference. The conference timetable and booking form are within this edition of News and Views.

The Chatsworth Hotel is a comfortable hotel adjacent to the sea front in Worthing. It is the only hotel large enough and the only one with conference facilities within the area. It is a short taxi ride from the railway station.

There is a multi-storey car park near to the hotel for which I am in the process of negotiating a lower costing. Negotiations are ongoing at the moment and are not available at the time of going to press. For those of you, who would like parking at the multi-storey, please see the information below. The multi-storey is a secure parking area. There is also on street parking outside the hotel similar to the parking we had at Scarborough last year.

Following negotiation with the hotel I have managed to peg the cost of the weekend at the same price as last year at £185. The South Coast can be expensive and I am pleased I am able to achieve this costing.

Extra nights' stay at the hotel can be arranged for you, with the Association, through me. I have set out the costs here for day and full delegates.

Our main speaker this year is the Rev Ronald

Corp MBE who will talk on the subject of ways of attracting the young into choral singing, a subject I think most choirs are interested in and also his many interests within the musical world together with an introduction to singing technique. Helen Emery will be taking our second seminar spot on Saturday to teach a piece of music for presentation by the delegates within the Saturday evening concert.

Following popular request I have asked Roger Hagarty from Rogers Music to demonstrate his instruments and wonderful software to us on Sunday morning.

Donaghadee Male Voice Choir on song from Catalonia to Co Down

Choir President Lady Sylvia Hermon MP, Baroness May Blood, Chair of the Integrated Education Fund, Northern Ireland, and 10 supporters from Barnburgh Village Singers from South Yorkshire were among the guests of the choir in a packed Ulster Hall on Saturday night, 20 September 2014, when Donaghadee Male Voice Choir performed in concert with the legend that is Phil Coulter.

The appreciative audience were treated to a magnificent evening of wonderful music and memories by Phil Coulter at his best. His relaxed delivery almost camouflages his genius at the piano and the audience were treated to some of his famous 'hits' including The Town I Loved So Well; My Lagan Love; Carrickfergus and of course Puppet On A String and Congratulations, all interspersed with brilliantly delivered anecdotes from his life experiences.

The choir was on top form, giving one of its best-ever performances. It was indeed an honour and privilege when the choir performed *Ireland's Call* (the 'national anthem' of the Ireland rugby team) and the famous *Steal Away*, both accompanied by the composer - the great man himself.

We witnessed Phil Coulter at his best -composer, pianist, singer, and raconteur. It was a memorable evening, and Phil Coulter along with the choir thoroughly deserved the audience's standing ovation.

Less than a month later, during which the choir led the praise at a local Harvest Service, the choir headed off on 15 October 2014 to Barcelona to participate



in the XI Cantate Barcelona, a music festival attended by choirs from Norway, France, Denmark, and England, together with local choirs from the Catalonia region.

Donaghadee MVC had the wonderful

experience of singing to packed venues including the Teatre Municipal in Blanes, the Palau du Congressos in Girona, The Poble Espanyol de Montjuic in Barcelona, and Iglesia De Sant Roma in Lloret. These were four magnificent concerts which were very warmly received by large and enthusiastic Catalan audiences who were totally spellbound by the 'Donaghadee Sound', and were particularly moved by the 'Dee's singing of Danny Boy.



During the visit to the Festival there was opportunity to take in a bit of sight-seeing, including a short tour of Barcelona, and visits to the Bodegas Torres winery outside Villafranca, the Salvador Dali Museum in Figueres, and the coastal town of Tossa de Mar.

But if there was to be a highlight of the tour it must be the visit to the Santa Maria Monastery at Montserrat, dating back to the 9th century, where the men from the 'Dee had the privilege of singing in the simply magnificent Basilica at a lunchtime concert with the world-famous Montserrat Boys' Choir. DMVC was the only choir from the festival to be accorded that honour. It was an unforgettable experience in front of an estimated audience of 1,500 - one of the biggest audiences for which the choir has ever performed.

At the close of the festival all the participating choirs held a final concert in Girona, where each choir sang two pieces from their repertoire. This was followed by an unforgettable Gala Dinner for all choirs where many more songs were heard from each choir - impromptu and representative of each country.

Musical Director Robert Wilson MBE summed up the visit 'The Cantate Barcelona Festival has been one of the best that Donaghadee Male Voice Choir has ever experienced. The audiences were amazing, the hospitality was second-to-none, and the festival organisers were top-drawer. We all had the most enjoyable and memorable time in Catalonia, and the reputation of the choir has once again been enhanced beyond these shores'

Four days after returning from Catalonia, Donaghadee Male Voice Choir took part in a special Centenary Gala Concert in a packed Queen's Hall Newtownards, Co Down to commemorate the start of the Great War and honour those who served. The concert was organised by Ards Borough Council and also featured Festival Brass and soloists Siobhann Petit and James Huish.

Exeter Police And Community Choir Devon

Singing is good for your health – so why not make a lifestyle change and join a choir? It is good for your heart – and that's official according to Heart Research UK. And it is a great way to relax from today's stresses and strains.

Exeter Police and Community Choir is testimony to the fact that singing is good for all ages with three members near or just over the age of ninety - with the youngest in their thirties. Professor Graham Welch, Chair of Music Education at the Institute of Education, University of London, has studied developmental and medical aspects of singing for 30 years and he says the health benefits of singing are both physical and psychological. 'Singing has physical benefits because it is an aerobic activity that increases oxygenation in the blood stream and exercises major muscle groups in the upper body, even when sitting. Singing has psychological benefits because of its normally positive effect in reducing stress levels.

'Psychological benefits are also

evident when people sing together as well as alone because of the increased sense of community, belonging and shared endeavour.' Regular exercising of the vocal cords can even prolong life, according to research done by leading vocal coach and singer Helen Astrid, from The Helen Astrid Singing Academy in London. 'It's a great way to keep in shape because you are exercising your lungs and heart,' she says.

A recent study by AXA, the insurance and asset management group, found that 50 percent of people relaxed by singing or dancing to music.

The hotly contested Composers' Competition ended with Ian Assersohn's setting of Tennyson's 'Crossing the Bar' moving an audience at a Truro and Penwith Collegesponsored prize evening almost to tears when it was performed for the first time by Alastair Taylor's newly formed 'Celtic Male Ensemble'.

The Composers' Composition is one of the jewels in the crown of Cornwall's biennial world Choral event which will take place from 29 April to 4 May next year, with more than 60 choirs converging from around the globe for 50 concerts in 40 venues in every corner of the Duchy.

Surrey-based Ian, who studied composition and piano at the Royal College of Music before embarking on a 25 year career as a senior IT director, recently came back to his music – with outstanding results. Announcing him as the winner among 40 entries by 31 composers, adjudicator Dr Alan Bullard said he had created 'an effective and moving work which represents the best of the Male Voice Choir tradition, with shapely melodic lines, a sense of musical climax, and a traditional but effective harmonic control. It will appeal to performers and it sets a well-known text will which will win the audience's hearts.'

lan, the Musical Director of Epsom Male Voice Choir, Leatherhead Choral Society and Concordia Singers, was presented with a silver cup and a cheque for £1000 by joint president of the Cornwall International Male Voice Choral Festival, Michael Galsworthy.

As the evening closed Ian declared, 'Returning to music has been a very positive and successful career move for me. I always love hearing my music performed, especially for the first time, and The Celtic Male Ensemble did a great job.'





'Crossing the Bar' will have its world premiere during the 2015 Festival which Director Peter Davies says is already set to be the biggest in the event's 14 year history.

The Mayor brought along many of his colleagues from other local authorities and sitting in the front rows their chains helped dazzle the choir into a stunning performance! In all the proceeds exceeded over £3000 Two days rest and the choir were off to Stourport to raise funds for the Cardia Rehabilitation Unit at Kidderminster Hospital. This consisted of a full carol concert including readings and we were immediately booked again for 2015

Time for a couple of rehearsals and then ten days later perform in the BBC Radio Hereford and Worcester Celebration of Worcester which was being performed live at Malvern Theatre in front of a full capacity audience and recorded for transmission on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. In fact the public were treated to some snippets on the radio and BBC Midlands Today TV the next week, just to whet the

appetite. By now the choir was in full flow with their Christmas carols and together with the Worcestershire Symphony Orchestra, Bromsgrove Chamber choir and very talented soloist Charlie Green, of Britain's got talent fame, provided a simply magnificent concert. Humorous readings from the BBC presenters and hosted by Michael Collie BBC TV. The programme provided entertainment of the highest quality.

The emphasis then moved subtly from the formal concert or event to community singing. The move started with a Community carol concert in Norton Village Hall where we shared the limelight with pupils from the Norton First School. What a delightful evening it turned out to be. We met and surprised a lot of new people with our repertoire and everyone enjoyed the infectious readings and delightful singing of the young children

The next stop in the busy schedule was the Worcestershire Royal Hospital where we sang in the main foyer as patients, visitors and staff alike went about their business cheered by the choir carol singing. Later that week the choir visited a local nursing home in nearby Kempsey and sang to the residents who included our ex-chorister Derek Chapman who moved into The Lawns some twelve months ago. Not quite an ex-chorister as Dereck donned his choir jumper and joined in with some of the pieces. It was a thoroughly enjoyable visit and together with the hospital visit a few days earlier reminded us of the contribution that we can make to those less fortunate than ourselves.

We reached the final festive event on the Saturday before Christmas, singing in Crowngate, the main shopping centre, in Worcester. Again it was in aid of local charity and provided entertainment and cheer as the crowds went about coping with 'Panic Saturday', Guess what; Father Christmas joined the choir for part of the singing-yes the real one who was plying his trade elsewhere in the city-but he did remind us of a certain 1st tenor by the name of Brian Pensom; but was it? We will have to wait till 2015 to check it out ;but will time permit? We already have 14 Concert bookings for 2015 with more to follow. Just as well we now have a full musical team. Scott Wolfendon, a talented young musician, has joined as Assistant Accompanist which should help reduce the workload of Haydn Thomas, Deputy Conductor, and Nicholas and Shelia. One of the highlights of 2015 will be the tour to Cornwall in the spring for the International Music Festival. More about that next time.





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How I like to receive articles for News & Views.

The first thing is to send your article **attached** to (not in the body of) an email to

Many of our contributors love to show their prowess by sending in wonderful finished articles with coloured headlines, five different fonts and many underlinings, italics and **bold** bits. Then, of course, I have to spend time taking them all out before I can set their article up the way you will see it in the magazine. KEEP IT SIMPLE!

HOUSE STYLE

- We use Calibri 10pt in News & Views. (If you don't have this, don't worry I can soon change the one you use.)
- Set your paragraphs to single space with no spacing before or after paragraphs.
- Start with the name of your choir.
- Then say the NAC group your choir is in.
- Write your article.
- Say who has written it.
- Quotes use single speech marks (same key as @ but without the shift).
- Dates do not include st nd rd or th
- Abbreviations do not have full stops.
- Song titles are shown in italics.
- Do not put photos in the text.

- Don't use am or pm in times.
- Unless the word 'choir' is part of a title it should NOT have a capital letter.
- Your choir is singular so 'the choir is' not 'the choir are'.

Send me pictures as high res ipegs of between 1 and 5Mb or more, minimum 300 dpi.

Attach them to an email.

If this is hard to understand then ring me and I'll talk you through it.
