RSCM LAUNCHES MUSIC SUNDAY 2013: CHURCHES ENCOURAGED TO CELEBRATE CHURCH MUSIC

Churches throughout the world will celebrate the use of music within their worship - and honour the musicians who make it - by celebrating RSCM Music Sunday later this year. It is an annual initiative of the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM), which itself marks the event on Sunday 23 June 2013.

The RSCM invites churches, choirs, schools and other organisations to put on a fundraising Music Sunday event, with proceeds shared on a 50:50 basis between the hosting body and the RSCM. 'Some very successful events have taken place in the past when churches raised funds for something they care about in their church or choir', says Catherine Clark, Head of Development at the RSCM. 'Music Sunday is also about celebrating and honouring the music and musicians who make worship so precious to us all.'

In 2012, many churches used their Music Sunday event as a musical celebration of the

Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Some churches and choirs will be commemorating the 60th anniversary of the Coronation in June this year. 2013 is also the centenary of the birth of the composer Benjamin Britten, which some churches will mark with performances of his sacred music.

Those looking for ideas and material can see a list of last year's events and those already planned for 2013 on the Music Sunday page of the RSCM website www.rscm.com/musicsunday.

Events ranging from special collections at services to full-scale choral concerts raised anything from £30 to £1,000, with an average of £100 shared with the RSCM. 'Every contribution helps,' says Catherine Clark. 'If every affiliated member of the RSCM were to hold a Music Sunday event and raised just £50, that would still be a remarkable £22,000, bringing us that much closer to our £125,000 annual fund goal!'

It has attracted cultural icons like Dylan Thomas and the great Italian tenor Luciano Pavarotti, who began his international career as a member of a choir from Modena at Llangollen in 1955.

In recent years artists of the stature of Bryn Terfel, Katherine Jenkins, Kiri Te Kanawa, James Galway and Montserrat Caballe have performed at the final Sunday Evening Gala Concert.

Most importantly the competitors have continued to come from all over the world – this year they will be here from Alaska, the Philippines, Russia, South Africa, Hong Kong, Australia, Canada, China, India, New Zealand and Ghana as well as from all over Europe and the UK.

This year's event runs from Tuesday, July 9, when the colourful traditional procession through the town will be led by Eisteddfod Patron Terry Waite, through six days of competitions and concerts to Sunday's spectacular fireworks extravaganza.

Music & Festivals

As a firm believer that the choice of repertoire goes hand in hand with keeping singers and engaging with audiences, I relish the opportunity to take on the role of Music and Festivals Officer.

As well as establishing contacts with publishers and composers, I will be reviewing pieces for you, not only from the major publishing houses but also from the myriad of smaller catalogues. I hope in time to prepare some recommended repertoire lists for choirs and even some 'come and sing' new repertoire workshop days, however I have to make a start somewhere so I am pleased to bring you this selection of pieces and let you know in advance that for various reasons 2014 is a year when many choirs will be featuring the subject of remembrance, (100 years since World War I and 70th anniversary of D Day) so repertoire in the next News and Views will be based around that subject.

Songbird Series OUP Upper Voice Choirs

This is a new series of titles and I have been looking at pieces by the Canadian composer, Sarah Quartel. This is music with a distinctive edge and every one of the samples I received was of high quality, ranging from the simple, lyrical but effective *I Remember* for SA and Piano, to the rather more advanced but well written *Songbird* for SSA with a piano reduction — not without some rhythmic challenges but its learning would be well worth the effort and both these pieces, and the others in the series are recommended as fresh and engaging repertoire for upper voice choirs.

Voice Junction Series OUP SAA TTBB a capella

A Cradle Song - Joel Nilson

Setting words by W B Yeats this piece is in the new voice junction series designed to provide music for modern mixed voice groups, and indeed the voicing of this one suggests the bigger choir but it does not need to be.

What we have here, in my opinion, is a strikingly beautiful and original piece using a mix of major and minor chords and a simple melodic line against a thicker chordal texture which with careful tuning and sensitivity to words would make a stunning piece.

I am extremely grateful to OUP who sent me a whole range of samples and I will be reviewing others in a later edition but for those choirs looking for something completely different, I was struck by the sheer beauty of the *Furusato*, 5 arrangements of Japanese songs, arranged by Bob Chilcott, definitely worth looking at.



For the last 30 years or so, I have been carving out a career in composing and although I have had and continue to have a stream of performances worldwide, it was not always like that and any composer will tell you how hard a musical path it is, but it has brought me into contact with many other fine composers and I am going to help them along their way just as others did me, so you may find pieces reviewed by composers you have never heard of, but I assure you the music will be worthwhile!

Tim Knight has been involved with choirs all his life, from being a York Minster chorister under Dr Francis Jackson to over 25 years directing choirs.

He has long term relationships with many Northern Choirs and also founded the Leeds based choirs, The Heritage Singers and The Masterworks Chorale, (the first of these now celebrating 20 years has presented concerts in the USA, Holland, Hungary, Norway and Ireland).

He is Principal of the Yorkshire College of Music and Drama in Leeds, a consultant to the Royal School of Church Music in the Ripon and Leeds area and an award winning and widely published composer, his music being distributed worldwide by Spartan Press. In addition he leads Choral Holidays for a number of Organisations.

His knowledge of the Choral repertoire is particularly wide ranging from the cornerstones of the repertoire to long lost gems and he brings to the NAC a fresh, dynamic and down to earth approach which has made him a popular conductor and workshop leader.

He will be known to many choirs through his choir survival and revival workshops which have taken him all over the UK and indeed to the NAC's own Conference at Retford in 2004, presenting choirs with ways that they can increase audiences and keep and attract new singers.

Tim is a long-serving Associate Member of the NAC and looks forward to a closer working relationship with the Officers in the post of Music and Festivals Officer.

Barnsley Youth Choir Yorkshire South



The Barnsley Youth Choir last appeared in this publication four years ago when still in its infancy, and has since gone from strength to strength with a membership of over 200 young people

aged from 7-18. Having established a healthy programme of winter and summer concerts, 2012 saw the choir perform at the London Olympic Stadium prior to its official opening. During their London visit, the choir also performed at Stratford Circus Arts Centre in the Olympic host borough of Newham and at the Lord Mayor of Newham's show. Having witnessed the choir at one of their Christmas concerts, musical director of the Sing Live! Organisation, Steve Roberts, invited the youth choir to Manchester's Bridgwater Hall, where they joined their hosts in front of 2,000 audience members for some rousing renditions of famous sporting anthems.

Hungarian Visitors

This summer, The Barnsley Youth Choir is once again set to host a group from the renowned Kecskemét Kodály School in Hungary. The Aurin Girls' Choir, the ensemble for teenage students studying at the educational establishment, will be making a five-day trip to the South Yorkshire town at the end of June. They will conduct several workshops as well as a headline concert and special performances alongside the Barnsley Youth Choir.

The legendary teacher and composer Zoltán Kodály devised methods of musical instruction that revolutionised the way in which children are taught. The Barnsley Youth Choir has deployed the Kodály method of vocal tuition since their inception in 2009. In that year The Miraculam Children's Choir, also from the Kodály School, visited Barnsley for a similar period, helping to inspire many of the young children who are still part of the organisation.

Barnsley Youth Choir's musical director, Mat Wright, spoke about the impact he thinks the forthcoming visit will have on his own choir.

'The standards of perfection achieved by the Aurin Choir really have to be heard to be believed. They have toured all over Europe to participate at the highest level of choral competitions and have established a reputation as a world-class choir. Our own young people have a real opportunity to develop their own technique but most of all to be inspired and uplifted by the quality of singing that they will witness first hand.'

Capturing the Choir

In February this year the choir undertook the mammoth task of recording a Christmas single, with the aim of generating much needed funds for the Barnsley Hospice. Supported by local MP Dan Jarvis, the choir spent an entire day in Barnsley's Emmanuel Methodist Church to capture the choir in a fully live environment. The recording process was guided by wellrespected record producer and engineer Simon Humphrey, who has over 30 years experience in the industry and was the recording engineer on The Clash's debut album. The recording of 'Winter Wonderland' was a project that was first mooted in 2012 and has come to fruition through lots of hard work, as the choir's Chairperson Keith Norton explained.

'As a choir with an excellent reputation

within the local area, we had talked for some time about recording the choir professionally', said Keith. 'The opportunity not just to record, but also to do so under the watchful eye of such a well respected professional as Simon Humphrey, is one that the children involved in the process will all remember for a very long time.'

The Barnsley Youth Choir Concerts featuring the Aurin Girls' Choir will take place between Friday 28 and Sunday 30 June. Further details and ticket information can be found on the choir's website

Backworth Male Voice Choir North East NAC group

2012 was an eventful year for Backworth Male Voice Choir.

Formed in 1951 by miners in the colliery village of Backworth in Northumberland, the choir went from strength to strength, and by 2012 had around 60 members.

Early in 2011 the choir participated in a choral competition organised by the charity St Oswald's. This culminated in a concert staged at the City Hall, Newcastle upon Tyne.

Our performance at this event drew the attention of `scouts` from a film company, `Steel Mill Pictures`.

Filming started in July of that year, and we were asked to perform, taking part in the film 'Song For Marion', starring Vanessa Redgrave, Terence Stamp, Christopher Ecclestone, and Gemma Arterton. Five members of our choir auditioned, and were taken on as extras. They spent a considerable number of hours working in and around Newcastle.

The choir itself was required to perform a short piece on stage at the Tyne Theatre,

Newcastle, to an audience of 800. During our participation in the film we collaborated with Laura Rossi the musical director who is well known for her musical scores to a number of film productions.

The plot of the film centres around the character played by Vanessa Redgrave, who, learning that she is terminally ill, decides to join a choir, against the wishes of her husband, Terence Stamp.

Although I believe the choir's part in the film ended up largely on the cutting room floor, our name does appear on the credits! The five extras had more luck!

Our brief brush with movie-making went on general release in the UK in February 2013.

2013 promises to be a busy year for Backworth Male Voice Choir. We have a number of concerts arranged, and in June we are visiting old friends in a German choir in Solingen.

So what songs do today's audiences want to listen to?

Audiences have always wanted to hear songs with good tunes that they can identify with. Keeping things fresh and vibrant is fun for both choir and audience, and I believe that means embracing songs from different genres.

I'm amused by a view that I believe is unfounded and fundamentally a wrong, that 'lighter' music is not of the same quality as the more 'serious' classical/traditional repertoire. To sing a pop or musical theatre song well can be just as difficult, in technical terms as well as interpretation, as singing a more 'classical' piece.

A dynamic repertoire also encourages new members to join a choir and creates bigger audiences, so avoiding new songs and sticking to the traditional may be very worthy, but unless change is embraced, there will be nothing to pass on to the next generation

Dynamic and engaging performances are paramount to the continuation of choral singing. Indeed that should really read, the continuation of any form of musical performance. How many concerts have you sat through wishing the choristers would communicate the meaning of the song and their enjoyment of singing. It's a shame but many choral performances can be very self indulgent.

With the exposure TV is giving choral singing, we are all being judged. Are we smiling? Are we communicating? Your audience is expecting to be entertained with engaging performances, so whatever your song choice, be prepared to reach out with your music!

Conductor and Director of Music – Marilyn J Smith MBE LRAM

After a fairly hectic Christmas season, the choir entered the New Year with a relatively fallow period, which allowed our Conductor, Marilyn Smith, to introduce new and exciting repertoire and being someone who asks of the members to 'get the music off the page ASAP', she makes sure the space is filled. This has been quite challenging particularly for some of the older members (including the writer), but the ability and dedication of the members ensures that the new music is ready for performance.



The first concerts of 2013 were held late in March. The first, a most memorable and successful one in High Blantyre Parish Church in front of a packed audience who were most enthusiastic, who cheered and clapped demanding more. This is always very encouraging for the members and adds to their enjoyment.

The following evening the venue was very different being in the magnificent surroundings of Glasgow Cathedral (a building whose foundation stone was laid in 1136 by King David I) the choir took part in 'Hymns for Soldiers' in aid of the Army Benevolent Fund. The service/concert was particularly inspiring and was attended by senior members of the armed forces together with civic dignitaries and large audience. The programme included several favourite hymns such as Vaughan Williams great arrangement of *The Old*

Hundredth - All People That On Earth Do Dwell, I Vow To Thee My Country, Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah to the tune Cwm Rhondda, and Onward Christian Soldiers. The Choir's contribution included many favourite choral potboilers - Parry's I Was Glad When They Said Unto Me, Benedictus from Karl Jenkins' The Armed Man, Howard Goodall's lovely arrangement of Love Divine All Loves Excelling, Libera Me and In Paradisum from Faure's 'Requiem', John Rutter's A Clare Benediction, Wilhousky's Battle Hymn Of The Republic and finally The Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's 'Messiah'. Most of the items were accompanied by the choir's Deputy Conductor and Accompanist – Cameron Murdoch on the wonderful four manual cathedral organ which was a very satisfying and exhilarating combination. The service/ concert ended with Cameron playing Crown Imperial with great gusto.

In the last issue we reported that Cameron had been honoured by the choir for his 25 years' service as Accompanist. We are very lucky to have such an accomplished musician who works so well with Conductor — Marilyn Smith. We are conscious that they make a great team and greatly enhance the choir's reputation.

Cameron Murdoch was born and bred in Glasgow (which he insists on telling everybody). His parents relocated to Exeter where Cameron received his secondary education, before returning to Glasgow to complete his education. It was in Glasgow that he attended the University of Glasgow and obtained the degree Bachelor of Music (Hons). He had further post graduate studies at the RSAMD (now the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and nowadays teaches piano there). Married to Christine - a Church of Scotland minister, and with a young son lain, Cameron regularly plays harpsichord and piano with various musical ensembles throughout the UK, has taken part as accompanist in BBC's 'Young Musician of the Year' and his playing can be heard on the sound track of the film 'Chocolat'.

Apart from his playing skills, Cameron is a prolific choral arranger and some of the choir's much enjoyed repertoire has been arranged by him. Indeed the well-loved pipe tune *Highland Cathedral* was arranged by him in four parts for mixed voices. It has been requested by many other choirs who may have heard it performed on one of the Phoenix recordings. When asked if he had it copyrighted, he replied that he hadn't and was only happy that choirs are singing his arrangements.

The season continued with a concert in early April in St Andrew's and St Marnock's Church in Kilmarnock – again an enjoyable and successful concert. The annual Spring Concert 'The Spirit of Scotland' in Glasgow Royal Concert Hall will take place near the end of April with special guests 'Breabach' – one Scotland's most accomplished folk groups, voted best group of 2011 BBC Radio 2 Folk and Scots Traditional Music Awards and promises to be another fantastic evening.

The remainder of the choir's 61st season will see concerts in Ayr Town Hall, Whiting Bay on the Isle of Arran, and St John's Renfield Church in Glasgow for the West End Festival.

Persain is a ladies' choir which meets in the Ammanford area of Carmarthenshire. The word 'Persain' is Welsh for 'pure sound' - we are ever optimistic! The choir celebrated its twelfth anniversary last year, having been formed in the autumn of 2000, meeting for rehearsals in the Village Hall, Tycroes, and gaining an established reputation in the area with the help, in particular, of conductors and accompanists Nancy, Andrew, Glyn, James, David and Catrin.

Persain has performed at events at various venues in South West Wales, and travelled further afield. In 2007 the choir undertook its first overseas tour, to Torre Vieja in Spain, and in October, 2010, visited Cornwall, to sing in a concert at St Austell. The Imerys Male Voice Choir from St. Austell returned the visit to Ammanford the next year.

The choir has a varied concert programme throughout the year, singing at a number of concerts, weddings, harvest suppers and St David's Day events, and has entertained at the National Botanic Gardens of Wales, the Llandeilo Festival of the Senses and the Cenarth River Festival, as well as the annual Carols by Candlelight each Christmas. Choir members also enjoy a number of social occasions, holding craft fayres, dinners and visits to concerts and musical events.



Saltash Ladies' Choir Cornwall

The Saltash Ladies' Choir was formed in 1948 by the late Betty Pawley with the late Elsie Stoneman as their accompanist. In 2008 they celebrated their Diamond Jubilee with a lunch at the Hannafore Point Hotel in Looe. This year with a change of venue they are celebrating 65 years as one of Cornwall's leading ladies' choirs with a lunch at Whitsand Bay Hotel when hopefully their first Musical Director's son and his wife will be able to join in the celebrations.

At present, the choir has 36 singing members, but will always welcome new members to its practices at St Nicholas and St Faith Parish Church Rooms at 7.30 on Wednesdays.

Over the years the ladies' choir have been privileged to have sung with HM Royal Marine Band (Plymouth) on three occasions as well as the Loughborough School Band who were visiting the area in 2010, and with whom the Ladies joined in Concert in St Nicholas and St Faith Church to raise money for the church's restoration Fund. In 2012 the superb Tamar Valley Male Voice Choir came to sing with the ladies in a concert which again was for the Church Restoration Fund.

Since 2003 each year, at their Annual General Meeting, the ladies choose a

charity to support over the ensuing year, by holding concerts and coffee mornings, and to date they have raised £20,823 in Saltash alone. Some of the leading choirs from Devon and Cornwall who have helped towards this total are City of Truro Male Voice Choir, Holman Climax Male Voice Choir, Newquay Male Voice Choir, Liskerret Male Voice Choir, the Brixham Orpheus Male Voice Choir, the Riviera Singers from Paignton the popular Plymouth Area Police Choir and the Essex Police Choir to name but a few.

This year for 2013/14 the choir has chosen the Derriford Hospital Children's Cancer Services and the choir is singing with some choirs they have not joined with before one special one being the the Sydney Male Voice Choir who are visiting Saltash for a concert following their participation in the Cornwall International Male Voice Choir Festival. This concert has been organised by our President. The other 'new' choirs are Pelynt Male Voice Choir, The Cornwall Junior Choir, which is based in Truro, and the Wyndham Singers from Collumpton. In July the ladies are off to Essex to join forces again with the Essex Police Choir for a return concert.

In 2014 they are again travelling to Wantage to join with the Wantage Male Voice Choir who they met during their first visit to the Royal Albert Hall when they sang in the Festival of Brass and Voices in 2006. Wantage have already visited Saltash for a concert. The ladies have been invited three times to sing at the Royal Albert Hall, 2006, 2009 and the last time was in November 2012 and they are delighted to have already had an invitation for 2015 which they have accepted. The choir is already accepting bookings for concerts in 2014.

Over the years, the Ladies' Choir has taken part in the Paignton, Plymouth and Saltash Music Festivals winning many trophies.

At the end of 2009, Eileen Hatch, the choir accompanist for 20 years had to retire due to ill health, and sadly in 2012 she passed away after a long illness. We were grateful to Carolyn Varcoe who had been the choir's Deputy Accompanist, for taking over the main role on Eileen's retirement. Carolyn, who is an accomplished musician both on piano and organ, is married and lives in Plymouth. Linda Eastlake, our Director of Music is also married. She too lives in Plymouth, is also a talented musician in her own right, and an excellent contralto soloist. Pam Hensman, one of

the choir soprano soloists, is the Deputy Musical Director. The choir have as their President, Councillor Sue Hooper MBE.

If any choir should feel they would like to join the Saltash Ladies' Choir in a concert, on a one for one basis, whereby we help each other out with a concert in our own respective areas, you would always be sure of a real Cornish Welcome! The Appledore Singers Devon



The Appledore Singers, a choir of some fifty ladies, based in Appledore, North Devon, perform at several venues throughout the year. We're always conscious of the need of various local organisations to raise money for projects — or simply to keep going. Two such organisations are the North Devon Hospice and the North Devon Chemotherapy Appeal.

Last November, the North Devon Hospice appealed for people to hold a 'Bring & Share' meal to raise funds for the charity. One of our members, Lynda Armstrong, organised the event at a day centre for teenagers with special needs, which she runs. The young people helped prepare and serve the food on offer, and the event raised a magnificent £280. We presented the cheque at the Hospice on a very wintry January morning.

The North Devon Chemotherapy Appeal is based at the North Devon Hospital in Barnstaple and its aim is to create a self-contained unit catering for the needs of all referred patients from North Devon. At present, most patients from this area have to travel to Plymouth or Exeter hospitals for their treatment, a journey of several hours. It is a local charity dear to the hearts of most North Devonians and folk are only too pleased to donate to it.



As with most choirs, the Christmas season is a very busy one for us. We usually start rehearsing carols and festive music at the beginning of September, alongside our secular repertoire. From November onwards we perform festive concerts at various venues throughout North Devon. Last December we were invited to sing carols at a branch of the local Tesco to raise money for the Appeal, and a small

group was formed to do this. We were also asked to perform at three local care homes – again collecting for the Appeal.

Our small group of singers relished the opportunity to don our red capes, tinsel and Santa hats, rattle our collecting tins in Tesco and eat all the lovely mince pies, cakes and sandwiches prepared for our delight by the care homes. These two events alone raised over £100.

Our primary fundraising event last year was the annual Charity Christmas Concert, held on 16 December which played to a packed house in Northam, a village between Westward Ho! and Bideford. Mince pies and mulled wine went down well — as did the excellent raffle to win hampers of produce donated by choir members and well-wishers.

The concert itself consisted of festive pieces and carols sung by the choir and by a group of seven of us: the 'Apple Pips', as well as piano solos by a young student, Freyja Hedisson. Poems were read (to much hilarity), by our Treasurer, Lorna Dorrinton, and the audience joined in with gusto when we sang old favourites such as O Come All Ye Faithful and O Little Town of Bethlehem. I'm sure that we nearly raised the roof with the final verse of Hark the Herald Angels Sing.

The result of all this fund-raising is that, together with a donation, we were able to present a cheque for £1000 to the North Devon Chemotherapy Appeal. A very satisfying year all round!

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
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Wetley Rocks Male Voice Choir Midlands North

Very few of you will have ever heard of Wetley Rocks and the choir has definitely not been mentioned in this publication before. It's a tiny village tucked away on the edge of the Staffordshire Moorlands. An easy landmark is to say its 10 miles from Alton Towers!

The choir has its roots in a Men's Sunday evening at Wetley Rocks Methodist Church some 35 years ago. A group of men had particularly enjoyed their singing that evening, and decided to form a choir. Sufficient new recruits were quickly found, and Wetley Rocks Male Voice Choir was born. We are happy to still have several founder members still singing with us. Since that time concerts have been given all over North Staffordshire and beyond, from Shropshire to the Isle of Arran, and Mitterteich, Germany. Choristers are drawn from all over North Staffordshire and are united by a love of singing and good fellowship. The choir is non-sectarian and non-denominational.

Membership is small (approx 25 members) and like the vast majority of choirs we are always seeking new recruits, but the sound that is generated by these trusty men is utterly amazing.

MD Ian Jones, appointed three years ago, has taken the choir to a new level of performance. Much interesting new material has been introduced, and rehearsals are both challenging and enjoyable, with the men responding very positively to lan's leadership.



The last few years have been difficult for Ian personally. His daughter had her second child just before Ian joined the choir



and he and his family knew things were not well. His daughter (an Intensive Care Sister) fought tirelessly for 2 years to get someone to listen to her, to the extent she was being labelled a 'neurotic mother' On the baby's second birthday the bombshell was dropped that Harry not only had Spina Bifida but other major spinal deformities and issues totally missed by many doctors and several hospitals. Still no help or support was forthcoming for the family and it was only when a relative suggested contacting the Spina Bifida society (SHINE) that a glimmer of light started to shine at the end of an endless dark tunnel. Good news is that Harry is nearly five, and yes has had major surgery with the possibility of more to come, but is thriving and coping well, as are the family. SHINE remain in contact on a regular basis, just asking how things are, just asking if they are in need of any guidance and for that we will be eternally grateful.

Obviously the choir ask lan frequently how things are, and realised just what an impact SHINE had had on the family. Unbeknown to lan, a decision was made to try and organise a concert to raise funds to give the proceeds to SHINE as a token and acknowledgement of what they did for lan's family and what they do for so many other families.

This has been scheduled for Saturday 28 September 2013 in the Central Methodist Hall in Longton Stoke on Trent. The hall will hold up to 800 people so this for a small choir is a massive event. Audley Brass Band who is based a few miles away has generously agreed to appear free of charge to help boost the event.

lan heard a song a short while ago called *Stronger as One*. This was written by Robert Hartshorn in 2012 to help commemorate the Queen's Jubilee. The

final verse Ian thought was so poignant to what Shine tried to accomplish:

In the rise and in the fall
Of echoed words in great halls
Nations may dawn, but it is we who are born
All equal and free with the power to see
Who among many has one heart and a soul
Shining as gold

Under one sun we're stronger as one

Ian has developed a rapport with the great Welsh choral conductor and arranger Alwyn Humphreys, the welsh music and choral genius, and he very generously agreed to do a unique arrangement of this piece for us. Robert Hartshorn was in full agreement to us using his song and the choir will be proud to perform this song for the first time at this concert. Alwyn is going to try and attend, although he does have prior commitments. SHINE are preparing a film to be seen during the singing of the song. I am sure there will not be a dry eye in the house!

We feel humbled, honoured and proud and are so much looking forward to what we feel sure will be an eventful evening.

Conference Report 2013

Croeso i Gymru, Welcome to Wales. Our 86th AGM and 25th Annual Conference Weekend took place at the Llyndir Hall Hotel in Rossett just a few hundred metres over the border of Clwyd. The hotel stands in five acres of landscaped gardens including classical statuary; I liked the caryatids, and the model sheep with a solid sheepdog. The car park was patrolled by a rampaging bull which may well have been searching for the placid fibreglass cow at the other side of the buildings. It sounds a bit weird but the hotel was very attractive, well appointed and exclusively ours for the weekend.

The first official function for our delegates was the Gala Dinner in the Llyndir Suite. The meal was excellent, well presented and eaten in pleasant company. I have had to Google 'ballontine' of chicken but it tasted good and was beautifully served as were all the meals we had during the weekend.

With the coffee John Croft (PRO & Services Officer) offered us a simple music quiz of a mere twenty questions, giving us the choice of teams of four or table teams. We opted for tables and gave ourselves suitable names. Our table had only five people on it by this time so we became the Famous Five. I thought our team did pretty well to get sixteen questions correct and we came a creditable fourth behind 'Paulunas' who got nineteen correct and teams 'El Presidente and the Miami Vice Squad' and 'Team Tanqueray' (I checked the spelling later, they spelled it Tankari, no sour grapes you understand) who each scored seventeen. If you'd like to try it for yourself, the quiz not the gin, I've included the questions elsewhere in this publication. I headed for bed at about the time Trevor, on the keyboard began a version of The House Of The Rising Sun'.

Saturday morning began in sunshine with the trade stands set up and Liz Moulder ready to begin a seminar on 'Vocal Technique'. She said that she hoped in the half hour to give us 'food for thought' and she certainly did. We were led through a warm up session for our bodies, standing correctly and stretching and relaxing to lose body tension. We became young army recruits on parade, old people of 102 and arrogant youth. It was fun and it achieved its purpose. Liz provided us with a sheet with fifteen bullet points on looking after your voice which I think everyone should read and inwardly

digest. I'd like to include it in this issue. If there isn't room I'll put it in the next one.

I can really only give you a flavour of the seminars at conference and I find that a little frustrating. You really will have to get yourself to conference and enjoy what some of us enjoyed over the weekend.

The second seminar was led by our headline speaker the composer, Patrick Hawes, who introduced himself as a Lincolnshire man whose father was the landlord of the Smuggler's Inn in Chapel St Leonards. His parents looked at the pianist who played in the pub and realised that he was paid about five times what the bar staff were paid. They decided to send son, Pat, off to learn to play the piano. When he returned after his first year at boarding school they were a little disappointed that he was more interested in Beethoven sonatas than Roll Out The Barrel but they had started their son on his career path.

Patrick went on to give us a brief history of music and how its effects on him led him to compose the music he does. He also played for us a recording of a new composition which is out in September. We were the first people apart from his agent and the recording artists to hear this music. We also heard the third movement from his Highgrove Suite. He said he would get his agent to play the CD and get him to fade it out after awhile. Fortunately for us the agent didn't work out how to fade the music out and we



were able to hear the whole of it.

Annette Woods in her seminar revised what Liz had told us and expanded on it. We practised breathing with our hands on our hips coughing or laughing to feel the diaphragm. This was an interesting practical session in which Annette was a very positive and encouraging leader. It must have been fascinating and rather amusing to be watching from the sidelines as we sang scales, arpeggios and musical patterns for vowels and consonants. You

should have heard us singing 'Blackberry gateaux and chocolate chip'.

After lunch it was my pleasure to introduce Roger Hagarty of Roger's Music who brought a wide range of keyboards to conference. He demonstrated them to what I'm afraid was a rather small group but I enjoyed it. If I could have afforded the most expensive keyboard I could probably have become a rather good pianist. There was so much computer



help that even I could have managed. Roger has already booked to join us next year in Scarborough.

While I was listening to Roger my mobile phone was recording Patrick Hawes' second session when he was talking about his composing and recording of his Lazarus Requiem. He illustrated his talk with sections of the requiem recording. My, that tenor part is high. He told us that much of the requiem was written in Bray church because he felt it was important to write it in church and he worked on the text with his brother, who is in holy orders, to fit the biblical story into the requiem service.

Patrick's final session was a practical one singing *When Israel Was A Child* from his collection 'Song of Songs'.

The AGM was a quieter affair than last year. Celia had been our Chairman for four years and so had to stand down from that position but moved into the role of General Secretary. Brenda took on the role of Chairman. We were pleased to welcome Clive Lawton to the post of Conference Co-ordinator in his absence. He would be joining us on Sunday for the Member's Open Forum. We were also able to welcome a new Music and Festivals Officer in Tim Knight and also to co-opt Natasha Cole who had shown an interest in joining the team. She will help John with work in the services area.

Our last seminar of the day was taken by Liz Moulder who asked us to copy clapping patterns. She then led us into rounds of clapping patterns. Then we hummed any note we liked changing the note each time she clapped her hands. She then split us into groups of around five. She began by giving us a short song to sing then adding another song for other groups to sing. We had to listen to others and hold our part in the songs.

After our buffet meal we dressed for the Grand Concert in Wrexham, that's Wrecsam to our Welsh readers.

The concert was very entertaining with a wide variety of music from ladies, male voice, mixed voice, community and a youth choir who wore amazing black T shirts with a dragon in the shape of a treble clef. I want one of those. As stage manager for my choir I always have an eye for the organisation of the comings and goings of a number of choirs. It was pretty well done with an MC describing the choirs as they arrived and introducing the MDs and Accompanists. At two points we were treated to amusing poems delivered by a lady. During their presentation there was no stage movement which allowed us to listen but, to my mind did nothing



to advance the concert. The finale saw all the choirs march on to the stage which, of course, took some time. The SM in me muttered, here's where the poems should be. The audience and I joined in the last items with gusto.

At ten, the next morning, after Sunday breakfast, we assembled for a singing workshop with Liz and Annette. First we had to warm up, especially after that breakfast finishing with 'the lips the teeth the tip of the tongue' sung very fast and needing good movement in, you've guessed, the lips the teeth and the tip of the tongue.

We started the real singing with Fair Phyllis a madrigal which I found very difficult to sight read even though Liz used her method to help choirs sight read. I need to get the tune in my head and find that hard with other parts coming and going around me. We then moved to The Lord Bless You And Keep You which I do with a mixed choir so I felt far more confident until the last page where the tenors need to be given the entry. Well I do anyway. We finished with The Habañera where we sang the


chorus with Annette taking the solo; a wonderful finish.

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Three Valleys Male Voice Choir Thames North

This popular choir operates in East Herts, West Essex and North London and further afield. Being only 20 miles from London it is the perfect area for a choir to pay a visit, spend a most attractive long-weekend with a joint concert and to also visit the Great Metropolis.

The choir, consisting of 30+ enthusiastic men, was formed in Waltham Abbey in 1994. Each year, as well as their regular visits to elderly-persons' residential homes and clubs, they appear at an equal number of public concerts. Since their inception they have performed over 400 concerts helping to raise a large amount of money for local and national charities.

In September 2006, they took part in a magnificent 'Festival Of Choirs' in the Alban Arena Theatre, St Albans along with nine other choirs, where some £2,500 was raised for the Paul Strickland Cancer Scanner Centre at Mount Vernon Hospital, in Middlesex.


In 2006 and 2007 they paid return visits to two Kent choirs, namely Snowdown Colliery Male Voice Choir and Thanet Male Voice Choir. In May 2007 they travelled to the Rhine Valley in Germany, on their first overseas concert tour. They performed in the Florinskirch in Koblenz, in the Spa Pavillion in Bad Ems and a church hall in Bad Salzig, to standing ovations!

They entered the BBC 'Last Choir Standing' competition in 2008 and although they were not selected to go forward, they had a two-second spot on the first programme. Fame at last! In 2009 they had concert weekends away in Weymouth and the Isle of Wight. The ancient abbey church at Waltham Abbey was the setting for a combined concert with the Rowland Singers. A return visit was made to Worthing where an outstanding concert took place in the magnificent Assembly Hall.

In October 2010 they spent a long weekend in Great Yarmouth singing in two local churches to great acclaim. At the end of September 2011 they travelled to Weston-Super-Mare where they had another similarly successful weekend. Chester was the area visited in 2012 and a tour is planned to Worcester for October 2013. The choir committee see the importance of including members' partners in visits and social events and are looking at developing a Supporters Club. In

recent months they have embarked on an Outreach Recruitment Programme, holding rehearsals on their regular rehearsal night at different venues throughout their area, Tony Moore, their publicity officer said, 'We are pleased with the results so far, we have recruited eight new members just by going to another area and not waiting for them to come to us'.

With the retirement of MD, Dave Martin, the choir has engaged John Trent Wallace of Men2sing fame, who has ten years experience of directing male choirs. John, also an accomplished sound-engineer, produced the Three Valleys Male Voice Choir's two CD releases, 'Songs From The Valleys' Part 1 & 2, was persuaded to take up the baton with this accomplished Hertfordshire choir.



As the musical director of Men2sing from South Woodham Ferrers, Essex, he has been instrumental in providing the vision and direction for the choir's musical output and performance style. Drawing on songs from many different genres, he has created new choral arrangements and orchestrations, which have underpinned their diverse repertoire and unique sound. John, as an individual performer, first took to the professional stage as a soloist at The Royal Opera House, Covent Garden, alongside Kiri Te Kanawa, and has subsequently been involved with many classical, rock and musical theatre projects, working in venues ranging from The Royal Albert Hall to The Theatre Royal, Waterford. He has composed, arranged and performed a wide range of music, and has been musical director for many shows, concerts and other performances as diverse as Bugsy Malone, We Will Rock You and Les Miserable. He was resident musical director for Brentwood Theatre for eight years, during which time he composed and created orchestrations for their Christmas shows. As a published composer of musical theatre he has many shows to his name, including *All 4 One* and *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*.

Music was a significant part of Howard's life, having been encouraged by his mother, a soprano soloist, to enter competitive music festivals with his treble voice, before joining church and chapel choirs.

He served an engineering apprenticeship at Jos Sankey & Sons (now GKN Sankey), joining their male voice choir at 18 years of age. At 21 years, Howard left his Shropshire home, joining the Civil Service on outstation duties at Morris Oxford, staying there for some three years. He spent happy times there in their male voice choir, becoming Assistant Conductor. Many years followed working from offices in London, living in Middlesex and Surrey, singing mostly in church choirs. During August 1971, Howard was posted to Royal Ordnance Factory, Nottingham and soon afterwards, joined Bestwood MVC. He conducted the choir on many occasions, including tours abroad, making many friends over the years.

In the choir's 2012 Diamond Jubilee Concert Souvenir Programme, Howard was quoted as saying 'Bestwood MVC has a reputation for outstanding fellowship amongst its members, no doubt fostered by its mining roots. As a miner's son myself I am very proud to be President of this magnificent choir, having reached our Diamond Anniversary year'.

Howard was a true gentleman, in every sense of the word and will be very sadly missed by his family, choir members and all those who were fortunate enough to know him.

Pembroke and District Male Voice Choir Wales South

60 year Anniversary

December finally brought P&DMVC's celebratory year to a very successful end. Originally formed in 1952 it has, like any other choir, a chequered history, with large membership at times and drought at others. Close to going under at one period the choir survived the crisis and continues to thrive

One of the choir's founder members was local businessman, Bill 'The Boss' Lewis. Still a successful and popular business today it contains a strong family management structure and is a prominent business and employer in the community.

The Boss was conductor for over 40 years, was honoured with an MBE for his services to music and once had the honour of conducting the 1000 Voices, Association of Welsh Male Voice Choirs at the Royal Albert Hall. Regrettably Bill is no longer with us. His place as conductor is now occupied by his daughter, Christine Lloyd. His son-in-law Phil Lloyd (Choir Secretary) is a key member of the Committee of South Wales Association of Welsh Male Voice Choirs and is the popular regular presenter at all 1000 Voices concerts. His granddaughter, Jenny, is choir accompanist and his grandson, Steven, sings in the second bass section.

There is one other founder member still active in the choir with an unbroken service since choir formation and that gentleman is Owen Jones, now 90 years old, still Principle Baritone and normally at every practice and concert that his health allows; a remarkable record indeed and a tribute to his commitment.

P&DMVC is a wonderful example of a community choir. No official or member of its musical team receives payment of any kind, every chorister pays their own expenses to practice and concerts and in that way every penny that is raised goes directly to that charity or organisation that asks for the choir's services in raising money. The choir had a very heavy celebratory formal programme for 2012 but managed still to maintain its usual commitment to the local community throughout the year.

Pembroke Dock was a military town originally with representatives of all Armed Forces present in large numbers at times.

The Navy established a major dockyard there in the 1800s (Nelson's favourite harbour!). Hundreds of Sunderland flying boats were stationed there during and after WW2. The Army have been present from Napoleonic times, major forts still dot all round the Milford Haven Waterway. The Royal Dockyard contains the Garrison Chapel, a famous local landmark, which had a major renovation costing little short of £1,250,000 recently. This was the location for the first of P&DMVC's celebratory concerts. In early March P&DMVC invited The Band of The Royal Welsh Guards to play there, the concert shared equally between the choir and the band. The Garrison really is a huge chapel and on the night completely packed with supporters of the choir who enjoyed a wonderful concert.

Early March saw the choir with the 1000 voices at Manchester's MEN arena, the Albert Hall unavailable for that concert. April brought the choir to Monkton Church for a major charity event.

P&DMVC have very close ties with Mansfield and District MVC and at times appear in each others 'patches'. In July Mansfield brought down two full coaches to Pembroke to assist and to take part in a combined concert for P&DMVC's the 60 year celebration.

In September Aled Jones of TV fame came as the guest of P&DMVC to Folly Farm where close to £6,500 was raised for a local cancer charity, RWE Npower were major sponsors of this event.

P&DMVC also have close ties with Neyland Ladies Choir and both choirs combined to give a concert in the Torch Theatre Milford in Oct. Another sold out event.

The choir was asked to return to Dawlish Warren Hotel in late October to give a repeat performance of one they gave one or two years previously that raised a very large figure for the local Round Table. There was a repeat of that money raising exercise again. In between all the major events of course the local community could not be ignored and performances of an average of two concerts a month were completed throughout the year.

December brought the choir's Annual Christmas Concert with the winners of the competition for local Primary Schools' choirs to the beloved Tabernacle Chapel Pembroke. This competition sponsored by P&DMVC is a major local event raising large sums for charity.

P&DMVC's Musical Team, its officials and its choristers will admit that 2012 took considerable effort, organisation and commitment to complete and there was a certain amount of relief and satisfaction evident when it finally came to a conclusion. There was a short rest period over the Christmas period to recharge batteries but the choir was hard at it again from early January developing and extending their repertoire for the demands they know will be put upon them by those for whom the choir's services mean so much to the local community. That though is what the choir do and is the reason why they formed in the first place. They are Pembroke and District's community choir and are proud to be so. 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- Many singers fail to use common sense when dealing with their voice.
 The physical demands on all singers, whatever genre, necessitate good health beginning with an awareness of your overall physical well-being.
- Do not attend a rehearsal/concert if you have a throat, ear or chest infection. Resting the voice means exactly that. Do not talk, (that includes a forced whisper) take the necessary medication and stay in a warm, but not too dry, atmosphere.
- Avoid the use of alcohol, caffeine and chocolate especially before or during a rehearsal or concert. Wait forty-five minutes after a meal to sing/rehearse. No singer should smoke.



- Read all instructions and note the side effects of any medicine whether prescribed or bought over the counter. Some can affect the voice.
- Always warm up the vocal chords. The type of warm up should reflect the demands of the concert/rehearsal.
- Pace yourself. Be aware of the length of concert/rehearsal and never sing a programme at full volume.

Vocal Technique

Looking after your voice

- Always check your posture throughout all performances. Poor alignment can produce problems especially for breath control whilst also introducing tension throughout the body. Both will affect the quality of sound.
- Both Pilates and Yoga are excellent in supporting posture as well as giving you an awareness of how to alleviate tension.



- Poor breathing and inappropriate support along with a 'closed' throat will produce poor tonal quality in the voice.
- Listening is one of the most important skills a singer should have and is often not mentioned in articles on voice production. Tuning the ears, as well as the voice, is integral to producing vocal sounds that enhance the tonal quality of a song. Only by 'listening' will you come to realise the sound you are trying to achieve.
- Sitting in rehearsals demands sitting on the front half of a firm chair, with your feet in contact with the floor. Shoulders should be drawn down, spine straight and there should be space for your diaphragm to descend fully and your rib cage expand. Never cross your legs!
- The attack or onset of a note should be produced without too much breath or a hard glottal attack. Over use of a glottal attack can result in nodules on the vocal chords.
- All singers have an optimum vocal range. The untrained voice will normally have a narrow range due to a lack of register use ie, head, chest or falsetto. It is necessary to train the voice to run smoothly from one to the other without a 'break' and to extend

the voice where applicable. Never force the range of a voice.

- Tension in the jaw, lips and palate will affect and result in poor articulation as well as tonal production.
- Lack of confidence is quite common even though we often hear of the 'prima donna' temperament! Most singers remember what they believe to be a poor performance rather than the more successful outcomes. It is the teachers/conductors role to ensure that singers feel confident in the programme they are to perform and have the necessary skills to perform it well.

Liz started singing at the age of five when she was auditioned for the then school choir. Throughout her time at school she was fortunate to have music teachers who encouraged and developed her love of singing particularly at her secondary school which had an incredible reputation for music at that time.

It is this positive experience that started Liz on her vision of trying to attain the highest possible performances for musicians at all times - not just in the competitive or exam situation but to enthuse in all the love of singing and performing which she still enjoys!

Liz, a former student of the Royal College of Music at Manchester, has been involved with choirs from the age of seven, becoming a conductor at 14. Liz studied piano and singing as her main studies at The Royal Manchester College of Music (now the Royal Northern College of Music) studying singing with Caroline Crawshaw.

As I wrote in my Conference report. Liz gave us a help sheet that gives excellent advice for any chorister who wishes to look after their voice and perform well in concert. I am happy to find that I can include this help sheet for you all to read and benefit from it.



Vauxhall Male Voice Choir Thames North

This year the Vauxhall Male Voice Choir celebrates, with pride, its seventieth anniversary. It has become a tradition that, at each decade, the choir pushes the boat out with some memorable events to mark the passing milestones. Our choristers have come a long way since those dark and grim wartime days when, in 1943, two enlightened, musicloving gentlemen started a choir within Vauxhall Motors, with the main purpose of providing relief and recreation away from the strain of the war effort. The choir was soon flourishing under the umbrella of the firm's Recreation Club and offering local concerts and, indeed, radio broadcasts to our forces overseas.

By the end of the war, and during the 1960s and 1970s, the choir was in demand both locally and over the South of England; it entered and won many competitions, performed with famous military bands and made several radio and television appearances. On one occasion the choir ventured into the very heartland of Wales to take part in the annual eisteddfod and managed to win a first prize! Throughout this period, and subsequently, the choir has enjoyed the full support of its parent company, Vauxhall Motors. During those heyday years Vauxhall was a huge establishment within Luton, and made available its massive canteen and staff dining rooms for many concerts, including massed choir concerts so enjoyed by all and which helped to bond the fraternity of male voice singing. It was in the late 1970s that membership of the Vauxhall Recreation Club and hence of the choir was opened to non-Vauxhall employees; this, coupled with the successes of the choir, saw the choir membership rise to its largest ever peaking at nigh on eighty choristers.

During the 1980s, highlights included an appearance at the Royal Albert Hall and an Anglia Television appearance. From 1990 through to the early 2000s, travel was increased and the choir itinerary took it to the Channel Islands, France, Germany, Isle of Wight, Eastbourne, Worthing, Bristol and more. Christmas 1999 saw the choir make three appearances on Anglia Television. The first CD was made in 2000. During this era a policy decision was made within

our organisation concerning the future of the choir. Two routes were open: either to concentrate on competition singing or to focus on singing for charity and the entertainment of audiences. In our experience the two paths are mutually exclusive in that test pieces, requiring so much attention, are rarely favourites of the general public; we opted for the latter permitting a wider repertoire and a route leading to the opportunity of many more charity related events.

Since the millennium year the choir has gone from strength to strength. We have learnt to balance our major fundraising concert events, including Help for Heroes, cancer organisations and local needful causes with functions which help replenish our own coffers enabling us to continue our work. The public can be very appreciative of a choir willing to perform for weddings and funerals — the church choirs are not as common as they used to be! We are currently running with in excess of twenty concert events per year including a significant number around the Christmas period. We are blessed, as ever, with a brilliant and professional musical team to whom we own a major part of our success story over the years.

But enough of our history! What is planned for this year of celebrations? There are two major events which we have set in motion: a massed choirs' concert in the summer and a minitour to Cornwall in the autumn. It has become something of a custom that we hold a massed concert at the passing of each decade of the choir. This year we are delighted that the male voice choirs of Brighton Welsh, Croydon, Welwyn

Garden City and Wycombe Orpheus have agreed to help us celebrate our birthday. The concert will be held in The Methodist Church, The Square, Dunstable, Bedfordshire and will start at 7.30 on Saturday 15 June. Tickets are an affordable £10 and you would be made very welcome if you could attend. We are fortunate to have secured the services of the excellent soprano, Lynn Deacon, from Eastbourne with whom we have shared stage on many occasions.

The choir have made contact with Newquay Male Voice Choir who are an extremely friendly group and have agreed to host our visit to the south-west corner of England; one of the few places we have yet to explore! On Saturday 26 October our choir will be offering a one-hour charity sing in Truro Cathedral at lunch time, followed by an evening joint concert with our new friends from Newquay, in St Michael the Archangel, the parish church of Newquay. Again, should you be nearby please come and support us in this charity event.

In addition to our 'normal' commitments during this anniversary year, we are planning, in close co-operation with Vauxhall Motors, a major event in late 2013 in support of Help for Heroes. It is certainly going to be a year to remember. We extend our very best wishes to any choir celebrating a major anniversary this year. Our thoughts are with those stoic lads of the various organising committees, on whose shoulders rests the burden of success of your chosen ventures!

Letter from NAC in Oz

Centenary event has been a resounding success with enthusiastic welcomes in France and England.

The choir sang in Paris as well as taking in the sights on the Seine, Versailles and Monet's Garden in Giverny. Moving to Amiens there were moving tours of the Allied cemeteries in the Somme and culminating in their appearance, together with 2 school groups from Queensland, at the Dawn Service on Anzac Day in Villers-Bretonneux. Having to rise at 2am was a strain and not conducive to singing. Neither were the layers of clothes worn by the choristers to ward off the effects of the sub-zero temperatures. The village on Villers-Bretonneux is very conscious of the contribution that the Anzacs made to their liberation from German occupation and there are many tributes there to Australia.

The school in the village was largely funded by contributions from Australian people and is a constant reminder of the Aussie generosity. After concerts in that area the choir moved near to Douai where they had a joint concert with the Chorale Mineurs Polonais de Douai. Hope for Tomorrow Concert raised £13,018.51 for Charity.

When half of the tickets had been sold by the end of 2012, it was clear that this concert was likely to be a very successful venture, and indeed that's how it turned out with barely a handful of seats empty on the night. Indeed that may have been due to the snow that had just fallen in Gloucestershire. Mark Cummings, straight from BBC Radio Gloucestershire, proved to be a great compére who entered fully into the spirit of the evening.

A very significant feature of DMVC's concert programmes is the number of 'in-house' arrangements that are sung. This concert was no exception with Barrie Cooper the Musical Director contributing one composition to accompany the words of *The Charge of the Light Brigade* by Tennyson, three other songs and a medley of songs from 'Les Misérables'. His predecessor, Colin Lawrence, was represented by a further five songs and several songs in the medley.

Wynne Evans was an immense presence on stage – mainly for his musicality – not just his physique. Many knew him not only because of his association with a certain insurance company but also international reputation as a singer. His singing drew huge applause and it was a treat for the choir to be able to sing six songs with such an acclaimed performer. His humour was infectious. Needless to say the fact that

Wales had won a certain rugby match in the recent past featured from time to time as did anecdotes about his life in music.

From the discussions amongst choristers it was clear that they had had a great evening and what's more, the press critics' reports were uniformly very positive as seen in a selection that are shown on choir's website www.dursleymalechoir.co.uk.

It should be noted that the website replaced the old one just a few months ago and it is encouraging that it has drawn favourable comments. All constructive comments are welcomed.

The choir was supported splendidly by many groups and credit to them. Once again details may be found on our website. Without this support it would certainly not have been possible to raise the sum we did.

'Hope for Tomorrow' was founded by Christine Mills in December 2003 after she lost her husband, David, to cancer. One of the many stresses the couple endured was travelling from their home to the Oncology Centre — a journey of nearly 60 miles. Christine wanted the charity to focus in a practical way, to alleviate the additional anxieties of travelling. She met Dr Sean Elyan, Consultant Oncologist and Medical Director of the Gloucestershire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and discovered that he had a vision to bring chemotherapy closer to the patient.

The Gloucestershire Mobile Chemotherapy Unit was the first launched in the world in 2007 by Charity Patron Sir Stirling Moss OBE and was named 'Helen' in memory of

a dear friend of the charity founder, who sadly passed away from cancer. In a unique partnership with the NHS, owned and maintained by the charity and operated by highly trained NHS staff, these well-quipped Mobile Chemotherapy Units can travel five days a week throughout their counties of operation to five set locations. These units have the capacity to treat up to twenty patients a day.

Each bespoke unit costs £260,000 to build and maintain over three years, the charity also provides each area of operation with a Nurse's Support Vehicle - this allows the chemotherapy nurses to travel freely between the Oncology Centre and Hope for Tomorrow's Mobile Chemotherapy Unit. Currently four Mobile Chemotherapy Units, and five nurses support vehicles are operating in Gloucestershire, Herefordshire, Somerset, Wiltshire and Hampshire and units five and six are due to be launched during 2013. The charity is currently fundraising to bring its fifth and sixth Mobile Chemotherapy Units into action during our 10th Anniversary year, 2013. It is the supporters that will not only help to raise the necessary funds to launch these two new units, but also keep the currently operating fleet of four units on the road. Singing For A Bright Future





Creating a vibrant choir that has a life and future can be pretty daunting. It seems that this can be made even more difficult when the choir has been categorised in a particular area, such as choral, gospel or male voice. These labels can be a double-edged sword that can often hinder the attraction to new members and audiences, whilst becoming a strait jacket preventing a choir from growing and developing.

I wanted to share my experience of leading an established choir and how over the past 10 years I have been finding a way to broaden its appeal in order to ensure the choir has a strong future. My wide musical background and non-allegiance to a single genre has played an integral part in how I approach music making. I use best practice from all areas of music making and performance, and apply them to drive an ethos of entertaining an audience through good choral singing.

In order to achieve this success I believe there are three main aspects: Vision, Performance Values, and Repertoire. In this article I want to focus on Repertoire and how this can be a fundamental element of a choirs success. However, before doing so, I will touch briefly on the first two elements.

Vision gives a direction to all aspects of the choir - musical, visual, performance style and so on. This sense of purpose defines the group, pulling members and audience to it. It sets the framework in which you operate and ensures that as the choir develops, there is freedom to move forward with less resistance to positive change.

Strong Performance Values are aligned to the Vision, and have a massive impact on the success of a choir. How you look,

present your concert and communicate with the audience are key elements of a good concert, and are driven by things such as: knowing the words to songs (even if you are using music!), having a strong understanding of the meaning of songs and their context; smiling/showing your enjoyment, projecting energy and enthusiasm to an audience, discipline in how to move onto the performance area, standing and sitting, what to wear, right through to more advanced areas such as use of a sound system and lights. In my experience without understanding and developing these areas you will severely restrict the impact and success of your

Repertoire ultimately defines a choir and how appealing it will be to both its members and audience. I have the view that I am taking the choir, and therefore the audience, on a musical journey where we will enjoy the company of old friends, as well as discovering new and exciting personalities. I have found audiences love to hear new songs during a concert, many of which become their favourites and the ones that they talk to their friends about, which is the best form of advertising! Great examples of this are February Song (by Josh Groban), Bui Doi (from the musical Miss Saigon), How Can I Keep From Singing (as featured by Gareth Malone) and Haven't Met You Yet (by Michael Bublé).

This musical journey is best achieved by using songs that develop and progress naturally within an existing repertoire. Unfortunately, I found that for male choirs there was, and still is, a very limited choice of arrangements of songs outside of the accepted norm. Of those that are less 'traditional', many tend not to capture the genre well or translate into exciting choral arrangements. therefore look for songs which are well known, have strong tunes and harmony, with a pulse and vibrancy from which I can create my own arrangements that bring the best in choral singing to audiences.

When learning both classic and new songs, each type should be sung in a style that brings out the best from it, changing and developing areas such as vocal style and use of vowels so that each song makes musical sense. For example, don't sing a swing number as if it were Mozart's Ave Verum Corpus. Stand and sing in a relaxed style, smile and share your enjoyment of the music with the audience. The main factor in a concert should be the choir sound, and not the song type. Taking this approach will help in creating a concert that comfortably includes music from the current charts to early music. A great song is a great song, wherever it comes from.

I'm sure that there will be readers who think that these types of changes would not be possible in their choir. Over the years there have been many arguments presented to me for not singing certain songs, particularly if they derive from outside of the accepted norm for the choir. However, these comments are often made without the full appreciation that audiences are looking to be entertained with songs that they can identify with, and that usually means modern songs.

Through popular TV the fun of choral singing has been brought back into the consciousness of our audiences and with the success of groups like Only Men Aloud there is a growing demand for us to sing well within a concert setting of high production values. If sung well new songs will actually go down better than many older ones.

This musical journey is immensely satisfying as it broadens musical horizons and ensures that your concerts are fresh and entertaining. So do consider exploring new types of songs that will help your choir to grow and reach as wide an audience as possible.

Cymau Male Voice Choir Wales North/Cheshire West

Wales is rightly known as the 'Land Of Song' and North Wales is home to several of the best male voice choirs that Wales has to offer.

There has been a choir in Cymau for almost a century. It was from these old established roots that the current choir was formed and which celebrated its 40th anniversary last year. Whilst not enjoying the international status of some Welsh choirs, we nonetheless join forces with other choirs normally on a bi-annual basis as we did for example by attending the 1000 voices at Manchester Arena in February 2012 and the National Eisteddfod in Wrexham last July.

Our main focus however is on our regular local concerts, almost all of which support locally based charitable organisations where every single penny raised from ticket sales and/or donations is passed to the charity concerned. The choir members, the conductor and our two accompanists all provide their services free of charge although a small fee is charged for attendances at weddings.

For the last six years the primary beneficiary from our charitable work has been the Children's Hospice Tŷ Gobaith (Hope House) in the Conwy Valley. We have donated £50,000 to that very deserving cause. This is in addition to supporting various other charitable causes over many years, but recent donations include the sum of £1000 to The Countess of Chester Hospital to enable them to purchase an ultra sound scanning machine (known as a V scan), and £500 towards the purchase of a new heart monitoring machine. Donations of £500 each were also made shortly before last Christmas to the Mold Hospital League of Friends and Nightingale House Hospice, Wrexham.

As a small choir we are proud of our charitable achievements and hope to be able to continue supporting local deserving causes for many years to come. There was a time when the Cymau Male Voice Choir numbered over 50 members. It made an important contribution to the social cohesion and well being of the local community as well as helping build the reputation still enjoyed today for the uniqueness and richness of the Welsh male voice choir. Times of course change and, sadly, our numbers have steadily declined to the point that there are now

only 15 choristers plus our dedicated conductor, two faithful accompanists and our invaluable secretary. We are also supported by a loyal group of ladies in the background known as The Shadows who support us through thick and thin.

Considering our falling numbers we are still able to successfully meet all our commitments and receive very positive feedback from our audiences. We already have a full programme of concerts pencilled in for 2013 but, if we are to continue to deliver on the high expectations rightly expected by our audiences, we need some new members. All existing members do their best to attend every possible concert and practice but it is inevitable that there are occasions when holidays, illness or other engagements prevent 100% attendance.

A fuller version of this article, including an open invitation to anyone who may interested in joining us at our Monday evening practices at the Cymau Chapel, was published in our local news letters and newspapers.

NORTHAMPTON MVC set to soar with exciting 5 year plan

It has appointed Stephen Bell as its new Musical Director. Stephen started his musical career as a chorister and later, tenor at St Anne's Cathedral in Belfast. He went on to study music at Southampton University and then, conducting at the University of Surrey.

At Southampton, he became the Musical Director of the university Gilbert and Sullivan Society and has since, very successfully, conducted a variety of choirs, orchestras and musical societies. These include Wolverton G & S Society, Company MK, Northampton Chamber Choir, The Guildhall Orchestra and since 2005, he has been the Musical Director of the Northampton Concert Band and more recently, the Rushden Windmill Brass Band. Stephen works as Sales Operations Manager for Mercedes Benz Retail Group UK in Milton Keynes.

The choir was formed in 1946 and was originally called the Northampton Men's Own Male Voice Choir. However, in 1980, in recognition of the choir's contribution to local charities, it was granted the privilege of wearing the Northampton Coat of Arms and the name was changed to Northampton Male Voice Choir. The choir has a current membership in excess of 60 members. In the last 12 months the choir has performed at a large variety of venues including Ely Cathedral and a tour to Chester. It has performed at several Northampton Rugby Club matches at both Franklin Gardens and Stadium MK. It also welcomed the Glasgow Phoenix Choir to a joint concert in Northampton in aid of Macmillan Nurses. The choir has been invited back to Glasgow to perform with them in 2014.

The choir's Associate Conductor is Andrew Howes. Andrew has been associated with a large number of choirs, choral groups and musical society's and has regularly performed at the International Gilbert and Sullivan Festival in Buxton.

The choir's Principal Accompanist is Andy Poole BA MSc. Andy studied music at University of London Goldsmiths, from 1968 to 1973. He spent many years teaching music to secondary school pupils before continuing his studies at the Open University and De Montfort University.

The choir's Assistant Accompanist is Sue Rayment. Sue has studied Viola, Oboe and Piano and has performed at a variety of venues across the UK including Westminster Hall and with the St Thomas' Hospital Orchestra in London.

On taking over as Musical Director, Stephen stated that his target is to double the size of the choir and make it 'admired and respected as the foremost male voice choir in the country' within 5 years. To achieve this aim, he has promulgated a 14 part plan focussing on every aspect of the choir's activities.

To help achieve this target, the choir has started a new initiative called 'Northampton Men Allowed' This is a community based project, where male members of the public are being invited to come and 'sing for pleasure' at a series of pre arranged venues within the Northampton area. As part of this initiative, Northampton will be leafleted; adverts will be placed in the local press and media where possible. Flyers, posters and email contacts will also be utilised.

Hopefully, this will result in a new choir 'Northampton Men Allowed' being formed, to sing two or three songs at a special charity concert being held on 12 October at Northampton School for Boys. Several performers have already been booked for the concert, which is being held in aid of 'Help for Heroes'. These include Northampton Male Voice Choir, Bournemouth Male Voice Choir, guest soloist, Faryl Smith and compere, John Griff from BBC Radio Northampton.



- Don't use am or pm in times
- Unless the word 'choir' is part of a title it should NOT have a capital letter.
- Your choir is singular so 'the choir is' not 'the choir are'.

Send me pictures as high res .jpegs of between 1 and 5Mb or more.

Attach them to an email.
